



Wind Speeds






As the growing season is in its beginning, we will have to watch late Saturday night into early Sunday morning. Portions on the north central and northwestern Panhandles have a chance of seeing 32 deg F or cooler. Take the necessary precautions to minimize potential impacts from the cold temperatures.






A stationary front will remain south of the area with North and Central Texas on the cool side with gusty northeast winds through this evening. Showers and scattered storms will increase and overspread the area later this morning and into the afternoon hours. A few strong to marginally severe storms will be possible, particularly across Central Texas. Hail and heavy rainfall are expected through tonight. A couple rounds of moderate to heavy rainfall with amounts between 1 to 3 inches possible with widespread minor flooding. Heaviest amounts will occur across eastern Central Texas where isolated instances of flash flooding will be possible later today and tonight. Another cool front will combine with the stormy conditions to limit highs to the 60s, which is below normal for mid April.




Scattered to numerous showers and thunderstorms will begin developing tonight and continue through Saturday night. There will likely be periods of light rain or breaks in the rain, but confidence is low in where or when these will occur. A few strong to marginally severe storms are possible late Friday night into early Saturday. Hail and strong winds will be the main threats. Additionally, locally heavy rainfall may lead to flooding issues, particularly Saturday afternoon and evening.



Locally Heavy rainfall is possible Saturday Night as a cold front moves through the area.

Hazardous Weather Outlook

Here are the expected rainfall totals for tonight's potentially strong storms.



Mostly cloudy with isolated showers and thunderstorms along area beaches. There is a LOW risk of rip currents. Isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms will develop over South Texas, mainly this afternoon. Highs will range from the upper 70s islands to around 90 over portions of the Rio Grande Plains.



Isolated to widely scattered showers and thunderstorms mainly over the Edwards Plateau, western Hill Country, and Coastal Plains will become widespread over all areas as the afternoon progresses. Heavy rains and a few strong to severe storms are possible later this afternoon. Flooding, large hail, and gusty winds are the main threats. Cooler high temperatures ranging from the upper 60s north to mid 80s south can be expected.




Cloudy skies with rain are expected across our area today into the evening hours, and eventually tapering off by midnight. Periods of moderate to heavy rain are possible across the southern South Plains and southern Rolling Plains this morning into the early afternoon, with some strong thunderstorms capable of producing small hail.



OUTDOOR BURN BANS





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
