
Wind Speeds








Wednesday brings yet another chance for severe storms in the eastern Panhandles. Right now, the area that's favored the most is the southeast, but strong to severe storms could develop anywhere east of the Amarillo to Guymon line. Hail size with the severe storms could be larger than baseballs. Wind gusts look to be up to 70 mph. A tornado or two is possible.



Critical fire weather conditions are expected Today for much of the western half of the Panhandles, primarily due to very low relative humidity values. Winds will be out of southwest around 15 to 25 mph with gusts as high as 40 mph.



Multiple severe thunderstorms are expected, particularly across western Oklahoma and westernnorth Texas, from Wednesday late afternoon into early Thursday morning. Large hail and damaging winds, along with a low tornado risk, are expected.



Flash flooding risk increasing Wednesday through Thursday, especially areas that have already received previous heavy rainfall.



There is potential for two rounds of thunderstorms, one this afternoon and another tonight. This afternoon's storms will be scattered and mainly across Central Texas. Large hail and damaging winds are the main threats. A line of storms will then move through all of North and Central Texas tonight. Damaging winds will be the main threat with this activity. The highest severe threat will be west of I-35 and before 3AM.

Flood Threat -- Mainly Wednesday Night

There is an increased threat of flooding Wednesday night and \$55 Thursday morning.

About 10% of the area east of I-35 will see rainfall totals of 4-6"

Confidence has increased regarding the potential flash flooding starting for tonight through tomorrow afternoon. The area highlighted in green will most likely see totals ranging between 2 to 4 inches, with a low chance (10%) in locally higher amounts between 4 to 6 inches. This area has also recently had flooding issues and this is likely to be reaggrevated due to additional rounds of rainfall through tomorrow. Stay tuned to the forecast and remain vigilant when it comes to flooding.







Periods of showers and thunderstorms are expected to develop across portions of Southeast Texas today and tonight. There is the potential for heavy rainfall and could result in flash flooding as well as river flooding. Some thunderstorms could be strong to severe and may produce damaging winds, hail and isolated tornadoes. Make sure to have multiple ways of receiving weather updates and warnings.



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Storms are expected to form off of a dryline in West Texas during the late afternoon and grow upscale into one or more lines of storms through the evening. All hazards will be possible, especially with the initial supercell development. The threat for significant severe weather decreases with eastward extent but marginally large hail and damaging winds will remain a threat through the storms' life-cycle.

What to Expect

Storms are expected to form off of a dryline in West Texas and grow upscale into a more linear storm mode. These storms are expected to be efficient rainfall producers and may create flash flooding concerns, primarily in the Big Country and Heartland - locations that have seen several inches of rainfall over the past week or so.

Potential Hazards

Rainfall heavy enough to cause flash flooding of streets, creeks, streams, and other low lying areas.








There is a medium chance of storms becoming severe across the east-central Permian Basin down through the Lower Trans Pecos this afternoon and evening. There will be more storms than what was seen yesterday but will still be quite scattered. Should any severe storms form, large to very large hail and and damaging winds are the main concerns but an isolated tornado cannot be ruled out.


Warning is in effect for Wednesday Flag Red early evening and the afternoon across Sacramento/Guadalupe **Mountains** and the Chaves/Eddy County plains. Do not set any fires on Wednesday and properly dispose of those cigarette butts!



Isolated to scattered thunderstorms should develop along and east of Interstate 27 and Highway 87 late this afternoon, before increasing in coverage this evening as they spread east and off the Caprock. Severe thunderstorms with hail to tennis ball size, winds up to 70 mph, and localized flooding are all possible.



May kicks off with very warm temperatures and mostly sunny skies, but will likely turn stormy later this afternoon and evening as thunderstorms develop near and east of a Brownfield to Lubbock to Silverton line. Severe storms with very large hail, damaging winds and locally heavy rain are possible at times.



Thunderstorms will grow in coverage this evening with severe winds, hail and heavy rain all possible as they move into the Rolling Plains and far southeast Texas Panhandle. Dry and quiet conditions are expected after midnight with lows in the 50s and 60s.






