STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On May 6, Governor Abbott held a briefing with state and local officials and provided an update on the state's ongoing response to severe weather and flooding conditions impacting East Texas communities during a press conference in Conroe.

At the press conference, the Governor pledged Texas' continued support to communities that need assistance recovering from these storms and urged impacted Texans to report their damage using the TDEM <u>Individual State of Texas Assessment Tool (iSTAT)</u> tool. Additionally, the Governor thanked the brave first responders and emergency management personnel who are working around-the-clock to protect their fellow Texans.

Communities impacted by severe weather and flooding conditions are encouraged to complete TDEM's <u>iSTAT</u> self-reporting damage survey to help state and local officials identify damages and determine the state's eligibility for federal and disaster assistance. The survey is available is both English and Spanish and can be accessed by visiting <u>damage.tdem.texas.gov</u>.

On May 2, Governor Abbott <u>expanded the state's disaster declaration</u> to include 59 additional counties in areas at-risk for severe weather and flooding, with the updated disaster declaration covering 88 counties in total. At the Governor's direction, state agencies continue to support requests for state assistance.

On May 1, Governor Greg Abbott announced that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has approved his <u>request for a disaster declaration</u> in Texas

communities affected by severe weather and flooding early last month. Texas counties included in the declaration are Angelina, Hardin, Jasper, Newton, Orange, Sabine, San Augustine, and Tyler counties.

On April 30, Governor Greg issued a <u>disaster declaration</u> for 29 Texas counties impacted by severe storms and flooding that began last week and continues to affect homes, businesses, and the agricultural industry throughout the state

On April 27, National Weather Service (NWS) survey teams assessed 10 tornadoes occurring on April 26 in Hill and McLennan Counties, ranging from EF0 to EF2. Another four EF0 tornadoes on April 28 in Freestone, Limestone, and Milam Counties were assessed on April 29. One EF1 tornado in Travis County was assessed on April 29.

On April 25, Governor Greg Abbott <u>announced that he directed</u> TDEM to prepare state emergency response resources ahead of critical wildfire danger and severe weather across Texas.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- 1. Protect life and property.
- 2. Support rapid & effective response.
- 3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- 4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

NWS Flood Gauges: as of 6:00 AM, May 7.

Major river flooding is being reported at the Trinity River near Goodrich, Liberty, and Moss Bluff.

Major river flooding is being reported at the San Jacinto River near Humble.

Major river flooding is being reported at the Neches River near Saltwater.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties)

Jones County: On May 2, there were tornado reports between Hawley and Hodges. Damage assessments have been initiated in the area.

Knox County: On April 26, damage assessments from Knox City reported 20 damaged structures.

Region 2 (Includes DDs 3, 4, and 22)

DD 3 – Wichita Falls (Includes Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Wichita, Wilbarger, and Young Counties)

Baylor County: On April 28, damage to power lines, outbuildings, and farm equipment to the west of Seymour was reported.

Region 3 (Includes DDs 5, 6, 14, and 15)

DD 15 – Beaumont (Includes Hardin, Jefferson, and Orange Counties)

Polk County: On April 29, A Mandatory Evacuation was issued for the low-lying areas near Lake Livingston Dam. 3.

Tyler County: On May 2, a voluntary evacuation notice was issued.

Region 4 (Includes DDs 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties)

Harris County: On May 2, Harris County issued a mandatory evacuation notice for the areas from Farm-to-Market (FM) 1485 to Lake Houston.

Liberty County: On April 30, there were approximately 30 water rescues from homes and vehicles. The East Fork RV Resort in the city of Cleveland was evacuated and no shelters were needed. On May 2, a voluntary evacuation notice was issued for low-lying subdivisions along the Trinity River.

Montgomery County: On May 2, there were 71 active road closures impacting the County Precincts 1, 2 and 4. A voluntary evacuation notice has been sent to Idle Wild and Idle Glen neighborhoods.

Walker County: On May 2, local fire departments (FD) performed water rescues with the assistance of Texas Task Force (TTF) 1 in affected areas. On May 3, the <u>Lake Conroe Dam</u> began discharging at a rate of 67,778 cubic feet second (cfs), and the maximum reported discharge rate was 20,945 cfs. On May 3, Walker County reported there were two water rescues performed.

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 11 – Waco (Includes Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone, and McLennan Counties)

On May 5, the <u>Lake Limestone</u> gates were opened for a release of 17,560 cfs of water. Rising water conditions could occur in the communities along the Navasota River in Limestone, Robertson, Leon, Madison, Brazos, and Grimes Counties.

Limestone County: On May 1, there were reports of flooded roadways resulting in stranded motorists. A train derailment occurred due to flooding but there was no HazMat incident, or injuries involved.

Freestone County: On May 1, there were reports of stranded motorists in Teague on Interstate Highway (IH) 45 and rural areas. The Texas Task Force (TTF) 1 boat squad has repositioned to assist for future rescues.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS STATE RESOURCES COMMITTED

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM): Mass Care has begun collaborating with our Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) partners and locally impacted counties. There are currently eight shelters that the American Red Cross support with a total population of 21, as of May 3.

Incident Support Task Force (ISTF): On May 1, ISTF assigned three personnel to the SOC. On May 3, the Southeast Texas Food Bank distributed cleanup kits and food boxes to Liberty County. On May 4, Trinity EOC remains activated with one ISTF member. On May 6, two ISTF members were re-assigned to the San Jacinto County EOC and three ISTF members were assigned to the Liberty County EOC.

Texas A&M University AgriLife Extension (AgriLife): On May 2, two AgriLife Extension Agents (Liason Officer) LNOs were activated to support Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 14 Lufkin and 16 Houston. On May 1, The AgriLife Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Unit rostered four DAR Strike Team and a DAR Strike Team has been assigned to provide support to the TAMU Veterinarian (VET). AgriLife DAR Agents are in contact with officials in affected counties to monitor needs and provide support. A DAR agent in Disaster District (DD) 14 is working with the Voluntary Agency Liason (VAL) in San Jacinto County to locate animal supplies for a local animal shelter. The San Jacinto County Extension Agent assisted with the relocation of 10 trailer loads of cattle in floodwaters.

On May 3, AgriLife Extension DAR Agents continue to be on standby and ready to respond to requests. They are monitoring weather situations in their affected counties and maintaining contact with partner agencies and jurisdictions.

Three AgriLife Extension Liaisons were activated to serve in DDEOC 14, 15 and 16 which increased their response posture.

On May 5, a DAR Agent coordinated with TAHC and County Extension Agents to assist landowners with livestock affected by the flooding. The AgriLife SOC Liaison provided a legislative briefing on current activities and discussed providing DAR Agents to assist with damage assessments.

On May 6, TDEM provided iSTAT training to 32 DAR personnel to assist TDEM with damage assessments.

AgriLife continues to monitor the weather and river flood levels, with livestock rescue and shelter needs. AgriLife is maintaining contact with partner agencies and impacted jurisdictions.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX): Texas A&M Public Works Response Team (TX-PWRT): DD16 has transitioned to recovery operations with TX-PWRT assisting. TX-PWRT members are staffing DDEOC 14 in Lufkin and DDEOC 15 in Beaumont.

Texas Task Force 1 (TX-TF1): On May 1, TX-TF1 assigned Swiftwater Boat Squads to be available to support flooding operations.

On May 3, an additional mission ready packing (MRP) of six Flood Water Boat Squads, comprising 26 personnel from both TXTF2 and TXTF3 arrived in Huntsville and is mission ready.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): TAMFS will maintain situational awareness of severe weather and we are standing by to support weather impacted areas with AHIMT, Saw Crews and TIFMAS personnel as requested.

As of May 4, four TAMFS and two All Hazard Incident Management Teams (AHIMT) are in DDEOC 16. DDEOCs 14 and 15 remain activated with TAMFS resources assigned to the plans section.

On May 5, TAMFS fulfilled a request for support and four TAMFS members will report to the Montgomery County EOC on May 6.

Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (VET): On May 3, the Texas A&M VET was requested to support the four SAR canines of the Texas A&M Task Force mobilized to Abilene, TX. The Texas A&M VET deployed a type 4 team with one veterinarian, two technicians, one medical vehicle and one support vehicle. Upon arrival, Texas A&M VET met with the Task Force team to prepare the vehicles for deployment and completed pre-deployment exams on four canines.

Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC): On May 6, livestock reported lost in Lampasas County were later discovered by TAHC and AgriLife agents. The Texas

and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) or the local Sherrif's office will help with identification of lost livestock.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ): TCEQ has staff available to respond to any air, water, or waste related issues, including drinking water and wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities. TCEQ is tracking 31 drinking water systems that are on a Boil Water Notice (BWN) affecting 21,409 residents.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): The DPS Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has deployed six flat water boats to Conroe. The DPS Aviation are conducting patrols in low-lying areas in search of possible water rescues needed and identifying high-water areas. The Texas Department of Public Safety is providing the following resources in support of severe weather affecting Texas. DPS Aviation Operations Division has four helicopter teams stationed in Dallas, Austin, El Paso, and Edinburg ready to respond and DPS relocated a helicopter with hoist capabilities from Austin to Houston. Texas Highway Patrol's Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has rescue specialists assigned to hoist capable helicopters in Austin and Dallas, and flood water boats throughout the state.

On May 2, DPS Aviation conducted reconnaissance flight over the dam at Lake Livingston and then flew down the Trinity River towards Liberty. They communicated with authorities in Polk and Jacinto Counites, no rescues were necessary in those areas. In Liberty County, DPS Aviation received several requests from the Plum Grove area, upon arrival ground teams had already completed all rescues. DPS Aviation also completed reconnaissance over the Lake Conroe dam area and along the San Jacinto River into Harris County.

On May 2, DPS THP TMU was requested by TTF-1 to assist alongside other state agencies' boat teams, with water rescues requested. DPS TMU deployed six flatwater boats to Conroe, staging them at the Lone Star Convention Center.

On May 3, DPS Aviation fulfilled the flight request to transport the Montgomery County Judge and County Commissioner for Precinct 4 from Lake Conroe to the West Fork San Jacinto and parts of the East Fork San Jacinto. A subsequent flight involving personnel from the Montgomery Office of Emergency Management and the Montgomery County Fire Marshal, followed the same route.

On May 3, DPS THP Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) responded to multiple calls, but some of the citizens had been picked up before their arrival. Nonetheless, the Tactical Marine Unit successfully evacuated five people and eight dogs during a water rescue operation.

On May 4, DPS Aviation conducted an aerial recon of the Channelview, Harris County, area to identify anyone in need of assistance. They subsequently received a request to transport local officials from Liberty County for aerial assessments. DPS THP Tactical Marine Unit personnel sent two boats with five personnel to provide respite relief to a fire station in New Caney, Montgomery County. They remain on standby and ready to respond to any requests.

On May 6, DPS Dallas Aviation was conducting routine reconnaissance when they received a radio report about a vehicle with two individuals and a dog on the roof of a jeep. DPS Aviation self-dispatched to the area and coordinated with the Ennis Fire and Rescue Swift Water Team. DPS Aviation arrived before the Swift Water Team and was informed by a local Trooper about hazardous power lines near the victims. DPS Aviation deemed an aerial rescue as unsafe and landed, rigged a hoist for potential rescue in case of emergency, and relayed information to the arriving Swift Water Team. The Ennis Fire and Rescue Swift Water Team subsequently arrived and successfully rescued the victims.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): On May 1, DSHS assigned LNOs to the SOC. On May 5, DSHS fulfilled a request for an Ambulance Strike Team (AST) to assist in Hardin County.

On May 6, DSHS extended Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF) Severe Weather Package (SWX PKG) to May 13 and the Catastrophic Medical Operations Center (CMOC) was extended to May 8. The Tetanus, Diphtheria, and Pertussis (TDAP) vaccine will be delivered on May 7, to Montgomery County.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): TxDOT has assigned a LNO to support the SOC and have crews are performing damage assessments on roads and bridges that have been impacted. On May 6, 66 state roads were impacted by flooding including 41 road closures. Damage assessments will be performed on roadways with flood-related damage. TxDOT Maintenance and bridge crews have begun repairs in affected areas.

On May 5, 86 state roads were impacted by flooding including 34 road closures. The TxDOT districts in West Central Texas will begin assessing the structural and road damage from tornados. TxDOT crews continue to work 24/7 in response to flooding. Several highways and state-maintained Farm-to-Market (FM) roads have encountered flood-related damage and several FM roads have washed out. Once the storms subside and floodwaters recede, TxDOT maintenance and bridge crews will perform damage assessments. The TxDOT Abilene District will be housing Task Force 1 personnel and provide a staging area for their equipment in Abilene.

On May 3, 30 state maintained roads were impacted by flooding, including 38 road closures. TxDOT crews patrolled flood-prone areas and assisted law enforcement and emergency responders throughout the night and have been out barricading flooded roads and identifying road and bridge damage resulting from storms and floodwaters in East Texas.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): DDEOC 16 has HHSC supporting 24-hour operations. Regulatory Services reported minimal impacts to four long term care facilities. One facility suffered structural damage, and the residents have been relocated to a hotel.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD has activated three Ground Transportation Platoons (GTP), one Ground Transportation Company Headquarters (GTCHQ), and two UH-60s with Crews in support of our State Partners Texas Task Force 1 (TX TF-1) and Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) for ongoing Severe Weather and flooding in East and Southeast Texas. Two GTPs will be staged in Houston, one GTP in Huntsville, and the Rotary Wing Medium will be staged in College Station with two TX TF-1 Rescue Swimmers on each aircraft. TMD has activated a SOC Support Team in Austin supporting the Severe Weather Incident. TMD has activated Military District Coordinators as liaison officers to facilitate situational awareness and communications in support of severe weather events. TMD has activated 65 personnel, 19 vehicles and two aircraft in support of 24-0014 26APR Severe Weather.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD has prepared department resources consisting of Texas Game Wardens and State Parks Police Officers equipped with swift water boats and shallow water boats to support rescue operations. Additional personnel and equipment are on standby to respond to the areas affected. TPWD SAR Team and Game Warden UAV pilot have scouted areas with potential flood concerns. One person is assigned to assist DDEOC 16 in Houston.

As of May 4, TPWD has performed 202 rescues, 106 evacuations, 90 animal evacuations for a total of 398 responses.

Public Utilities Commission of Texas (PUC): On May 2, electrical outages peaked around noon with approximately 160k customers out as the second line of storms started pushing through the Houston area.

On May 2, Utilities restored power to over 150k customers. Outages started rising as the newest lines of storms moved through southeast Texas. The largest outage counts were in Montgomery, Liberty, and Harris County. The bulk of these outages are expected to be restored on May 2, pending additional storm activity.

On May 4, utilities are returning to normal operations and Entergy expects to complete restorations today.

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR): The DIR has one staff member deployed to the SOC. DIR continues to monitor the clear and dark web for threats related to this weather activation. No credible threats have been observed.

American Red Cross (ARC): ARC has 10 shelters open and has housed 126 people as of May 6. An Incident Management Team (IMT) has deployed a basecamp and a field kitchen to Houston. The ARC has distributed 3,151 snacks and 2,157 meals as of May 6.

The Salvation Army (TSA): On May 1, TSA assigned a LNO to the SOC and has their mobile feeding unit and volunteers ready to assist impacted areas. TSA is supporting shelter feeding operations in Walker County and has begun evaluating conditions in affected areas. TSA and Southern Baptist Texas Convention DR are coordinating a mass feeding site and feeding units have been put on standby to support feeding operations as soon as areas become accessible.

On May 3, TSA is now planning a feeding operation in conjunction with the Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC) at The Salvation Army Houston Area Command Warehouse. TSA will set up a base camp operation along with a Southern Baptist Texas Convention Kitchen in Houston. TSA will stage two feeding units in Conroe to serve the Huntsville and Cold Spring areas. The Livingston and Cleveland areas will still be a challenge, but once water starts to recede, we will adjust. The Salvation Army will activate an IMT starting Sunday to be staged in Houston. Field kitchen operations are scheduled to start May 6.

On May 4, TSA is providing community feeding operations at the Santa Fe Admin Building, 1680 CR 3549, Cleveland TX.

As of May 6, TSA has distributed 275 snacks, 820 meals, and 911 drinks.

Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC): Mass Feeding will be done in assistance with The Salvation Army. SBTC disaster relief (DR) Mass Feeding and quick response feeding unit (QRU) will arrive and set up on May 5.
