




Strong to severe thunderstorms will be possible, favoring the central and eastern Panhandles. Not all thunderstorms that develop will be severe, but severe thunderstorms that do form, have the potential for large hail and damaging wind gusts being the main threats.




Here is today's Severe Weather Outlook.






A Flood Watch is in effect for areas near and south of I-20 from 7 AM Sunday through 1 PM Monday. Rainfall totals of 2 to 3 inches with isolated higher amounts up to 4 inches possible in the watch area. In addition to rapid rises on creeks, streams, and rivers, flooding may occur in low-lying, urban, and poor drainage areas. Be prepared to take action should flooding develop in your area, and remember to Turn Around Don't Drown!



As showers and storms spread across the Four State Region today, a few storms may become severe, particularly along and south of US Hwy 84. The severe weather threat will expand on Monday to include the entire area. All modes of severe weather will be possible.



There's a risk for locally heavy rainfall and flash flooding across much of the area today. The greatest risk for flash flooding will be across portions of East Texas and Western Louisiana along and south of Interstate 20. The flash flood risk will continue across portions of the region on Monday.

Key Messages

Excessive Rainfall Outlook

Today through tonight

What: Showers and thunderstorms will increase through the day as a warm front lifts north across the area. Some storms could produce heavy rainfall, with high rainfall rates that could cause localized flash flooding.

When: This afternoon into this evening.

Where:

Moderate Risk (Level 3 of 4) across interior southeast Texas into west central Louisiana. Slight Risk (Level 2 of 4) from lower southeast Texas into southwest and central Louisiana.

Marginal Risk (Level 1 of 4) across portions of Acadiana.






A Flood Watch will be in effect Sunday morning through Monday morning as additional heavy rainfall is expected. 2-4" of rain is expected with isolated amounts of 6+" possible in the watch area.



Mother's Day will be quite muggy with highs in the mid 80s to upper 90s under mostly cloudy skies. There is a low chance of showers and storms today with the greatest chances across the Victoria Crossroads.



There is a low chance for some isolated strong to severe storms today, mainly late morning and afternoon. Large hail and damaging winds would be the main threat, although an isolated tornado cannot be ruled out.







Fire Danger Forecast




