STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION:

On May 17, Governor Greg Abbott <u>announced</u> that President Joe Biden approved the state's request for a Major Disaster Declaration for Texas counties impacted by severe weather and flooding that began on April 26.

This partial approval allows qualifying Texans who sustained damage to apply for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Individual Assistance Program funding to assist with expenses such as temporary housing, emergency home repairs, uninsured and underinsured personal property losses, disaster legal services, disaster unemployment assistance, and medical, dental, and funeral expenses caused by the disaster. Counties approved for Individual Assistance programs include Harris, Liberty, Montgomery, Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity, and Walker counties.

This approval also authorizes additional FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program resources to be made available statewide and authorizes the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) Disaster Loan Program for physical and economic loss for the seven counties approved for Individual Assistance.

The Governor's request for FEMA's Public Assistance program, which would ensure eligibility for 26 designated counties to utilize grant funding for emergency work and repair or replacement of disaster-damaged facilities, remains under review. The grant funding afforded under FEMA's Public Assistance program would assist in covering jurisdictional expenses for debris removal, emergency protective measures, roads and bridges, water control facilities, public buildings and contents,

public utilities, parks, recreational, and other facilities. Additionally, the Governor has directed TDEM to work with local, state, and federal partners to ensure all other Texas counties that meet their federally set Public Assistance thresholds are added to this federal declaration.

On May 15, Governor Abbott <u>sent a letter</u> to President Biden requesting a Presidential Disaster Declaration for Texas communities impacted by recent severe weather and flooding that began on April 26. The Governor's letter requests Individual Assistance programs for seven impacted counties and Public Assistance programs for 26 impacted counties.

The request to declare a major disaster for the State of Texas comes after an initial review of damage sustained due to catastrophic flash flooding, historic river flooding, extremely large hail, damaging wind gusts, and destructive tornadoes. Local jurisdictions have reported more than \$58 million in public infrastructure damage estimates thus far, including disaster response costs and debris management.

On May 15, Governor Abbott <u>amended the states disaster declaration</u> for severe storms and flooding that began on April 26. Additional counties included are Brown, Concho, McCulloch, Menard, San Saba, and Sutton Counties.

On May 7, Governor Abbott further <u>amended the Disaster Proclamation</u> for severe storms and flooding that began on April 26. Additional counties included are Clay, Coleman, Eastland, and Mills Counties.

On May 6, Governor Abbott held a briefing with state and local officials and provided an update on the state's ongoing response to severe weather and flooding conditions impacting East Texas communities during a press conference in Conroe.

At the press conference, the Governor pledged Texas' continued support to communities that need assistance recovering from these storms and urged impacted Texans to report their damage using the TDEM <u>Individual State of Texas Assessment Tool (iSTAT)</u> tool. Additionally, the Governor thanked the brave first responders and emergency management personnel who are working around-the-clock to protect their fellow Texans.

Communities impacted by severe weather and flooding conditions are encouraged to complete TDEM's <u>iSTAT</u> self-reporting damage survey to help state and local officials identify damages and determine the state's eligibility for federal and disaster assistance. The survey is available is both English and Spanish and can be accessed by visiting <u>damage.tdem.texas.gov</u>.

On May 2, Governor Abbott <u>expanded the state's disaster declaration</u> to include 59 additional counties in areas at-risk for severe weather and flooding, with the updated disaster declaration covering 88 counties in total. At the Governor's direction, state agencies continue to support requests for state assistance.

On May 1, Governor Greg Abbott announced that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has approved his <u>request for a disaster declaration</u> in Texas communities affected by severe weather and flooding early last month. Texas counties included in the declaration are Angelina, Hardin, Jasper, Newton, Orange, Sabine, San Augustine, and Tyler counties.

On April 30, Governor Greg issued a <u>disaster declaration</u> for 29 Texas counties impacted by severe storms and flooding that began last week and continues to affect homes, businesses, and the agricultural industry throughout the state

On April 25, Governor Greg Abbott <u>announced that he directed</u> TDEM to prepare state emergency response resources ahead of critical wildfire danger and severe weather across Texas.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- 1. Protect life and property.
- 2. Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decisionmaking.
- 4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

NWS Flood Gauges: as of 03:00 AM, May 18

Major river flooding is being reported at the Trinity River near Liberty and Goodrich.

Major river flooding is being reported at the Neches River near Saltwater.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties)

Jones County: On May 2, there were tornado reports between Hawley and Hodges. Damage assessments have been initiated in the area.

Knox County: On April 26, damage assessments from Knox City reported 20 damaged structures.

Region 2 (Includes DDs 3, 4, and 22)

DD 3 – Wichita Falls (Includes Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Wichita, Wilbarger, and Young Counties)

Baylor County: On April 28, damage to power lines, outbuildings, and farm equipment to the west of Seymour was reported.

Region 3 (Includes DDs 5, 6, 14, and 15)

DD 5 – Mt. Pleasant (Includes Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River, and Titus Counties)

DDEOC-5 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness) on May 8th due to the severe weather threat.

DD 6 – Tyler (Includes Anderson, Camp, Cherokee, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Marion, Panola, Rains, Rusk, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt, and Wood Counties)

Tyler County: On May 17, the Tyler County Judge issued a voluntary evacuation order.

DD 14 – Lufkin (Includes Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler Counties)

DD 15 - Beaumont (Includes Hardin, Jefferson, and Orange Counties)

Polk County: As of May 9, the mandatory evacuations were lifted in Polk County. County officials are planning a phased re-entry for homeowners.

Trinity County: As of May 9, the mandatory evacuations were lifted in Trinity County.

Tyler County: On May 2, a voluntary evacuation notice was issued.

Region 4 (Includes DD 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties)

DDEOC 16: Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS) operations in New Caney and Conroe will end May 10, and TAMFS personnel will be released at end of shift. One TAMFS and five AHIMT personnel remain in Montgomery County.

Austin County: The Austin County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) reports roadways in Bellville have been cleared of debris and the San Bernard Electric Cooperative (Co-op) crews are working to restore power. Bellville ISD will be closed on May 17, and a shelter opened on May 16, at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Sealy, TX.

Harris County: On May 2, Harris County issued a mandatory evacuation notice for the areas from Farm-to-Market (FM) 1485 to Lake Houston. On May 16, there were reports of structural damage to homes and businesses in Harris County. Southeast Texas Regional Advisory Council (SETRAC) reported that the Cypress Creek Psychiatric Hospital lost power, but it has since been restored. Approximately 900,000 residents in Harris County were reported without power.

Liberty County: On May 16, in the cities of Cleveland, Kenefick, and Tarkington, debris fell across State Highways (SH) 105 and SH 321. Power outages have affected approximately 9,300 residents throughout Liberty County.

Montgomery County: On May 16, Montgomery County reported up to 47,000 residents without power, and Entergy, CenterPoint, and SHECO (San Houston Electric Cooperative) crews have been working to restore power to the county. Chains saw crews have been dispatched to Montgomery County roadways to remove downed trees. On May 17, San Jacinto River Authority reported Lake Conroe Dam is discharging at 5,370 cubic feet per second (cfs).

Walker County: As of May 17, four subdivisions and five state roads are under water. On May 18, the Walker County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) will shut down and divert all phone calls to the Walker County Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC). On May 16, Walker County power outages were estimated to have impacted 3,535 residents. Several water rescues were performed, including a school bus. All the students were rescued from the school bus and no injuries were reported.

Waller County: Waller County EOC activated to Level I (Emergency Conditions). On May 16, Waller County reported 98 roadways impacted by debris and 13,775 residents were impacted by power outages. A shelter has been opened, in the city of Hempstead, at the Hempstead Community Center for residents affected by the severe weather.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24)

DD 17 – Victoria (Includes Calhoun, DeWitt, Goliad, Gonzales, Lavaca, Jackson, and Victoria Counties)

Calhoun County: On May 13, approximately 10 RVs overturned by the high winds in Port Lavaca with three injuries reported.

DD 18 – San Antonio (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties)

Guadalupe County: On May 9, reports of significant damage due to a suspected tornado left over 5,000 residents without power. An Incident Command Post (ICP) was established at York Creek Volunteer Fire Department (VFD), and a shelter was established for 50 residents at the Geronimo Community Center in Seguin.

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 11 – Waco (Includes Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone, and McLennan Counties)

On May 16, the <u>Lake Limestone</u> gates were opened for a release of 4,200 cfs of water. Rising water conditions occurred in the communities along the Navasota River in Limestone, Robertson, Leon, Madison, Brazos, and Grimes Counties.

Limestone County: On May 1, there were reports of flooded roadways resulting in stranded motorists. A train derailment occurred due to flooding but there was no HazMat incident, or injuries involved.

Freestone County: On May 1, there were reports of stranded motorists in Teague on Interstate Highway (IH) 45 and rural areas.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS STATE RESOURCES COMMITTED

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM): Mass Care has begun collaborating with our Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) partners and locally impacted counties.

Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

TDEM Communications Coordination Group (CCG) is monitoring the situation with public, private, and volunteer sectors, and is assessing and adjusting resources for the severe weather. Cellular providers are assessing the current situation. AT&T is reporting customers experiencing degraded service in the greater Houston area, and AT&T is working to assess the damage and restore services. The AT&T FirstNet Response Operations Group (ROG) has two on air solutions in Waller County. Carriers are deploying generators and back-up power as needed. The networks have redundancies and overlaps which are mitigating the loss of power in some areas.

The Commission on State Emergency Communications (CSEC) is contacting 911 Public Safety Access Point (PSAP) centers to confirm operational status. Public Safety networks in Harris County have experienced some degradation but are operational. The city of Houston has some issues with the backhaul network but is working on alternative solutions. Most of the issues are related to the loss of primary power and are being mitigated by back-up power sources.

Amateur operator networks providing regional emergency communications support reported no outages or requests for assistance. Coordination is being established

between Emergency Support Function (ESF) 2 Communications and ESF 12 Energy, for power restoration to communication locations. Coordination between the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), Office of Statewide Interoperable Communications (TXSWIC), FEMA Region 6 Communications, and private and public partners is ongoing.

Incident Support Task Force (ISTF): There are five ISTF members assigned to the SOC with two ESF 6 staff in support. Three ISTF members are assigned to the San Jacinto/Polk County EOC.

Texas A&M University AgriLife Extension (AgriLife): The AgriLife SOC Liaison distributed the TCEQ Carcass Disposal Guidelines to Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Agents in the field. A STAR was filled to activate up to 20 DAR Agents to assist with damage assessments. Five DAR teams continue to assist DD-11, DD-14, and DD-15 in completing damage assessments. Three additional teams continue to assist with damage assessments in DD-13 and DD-14. The six DAR teams in the city of Atascocita in Harris County completed iSTAT damage assessments. AgriLife is assisting the San Jacinto County Extension Agent in managing the San Jacinto County animal shelter. Two DAR teams completed iSTAT damage assessments in Liberty County. A DAR Agent is supporting logistics for the RELLIS Incident Support Team (IST) until May 23, and a DAR team is staged at the San Jacinto Fairground in Coldspring to assist with damage assessments.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX): Texas A&M Public Works Response Team (TX-PWRT): The PWRT team is staged in Conroe to support any local or state requests. The TX-PWRT SOC LNO continues to monitor WebEOC for requests and is working with TCEQ on water/wastewater (W/WW). The TX-PWRT drone team completed the aerial damage assessments in Jasper County on May 15. The TX-PWRT assisted TDEM with damage assessments in Liberty, Montgomery, and Walker counties. TX-PWRT is activating a second team to start damage assessments in TDEM Region 3. On May 18, TX-PWRT will be sending a representative to a new IST that is assembling in the city of Houston.

Texas Task Force 1 (TX-TF1): TX-TF1 has a mission ready package (MRP) of six Flood Water Boat Squads, comprising 26 personnel from both TX-TF2 and TX-TF3 in Huntsville. On May 15, TX-TF1 crews assisted various agencies with low water crossing and road condition reconnaissance. No additional requests for assistance were received. TX-TF1 crews will remain pre-positioned in TDEM Regions 2,3,4,6 and 8.

On May 17, TX-TF1 evacuated 10 people, one pet, and assisted three people in TDEM Region 3. In TDEM Region 4, six people were evacuated and 11 confirmed to shelter in place. In TDEM Region8, six people were confirmed to shelter in place. TX-TF1 Water Group Supervisors are in contact with local and state partners in the

affected areas, and members from the Michigan Task Force and South Carolina Task Force will return to their states on May 18.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): On May 14, TAMFS created a transition plan for the Montgomery County Office of Emergency Management (EOC) and then was released. TAMFS and the All-Hazard Incident Management Team personnel at the Montgomery County EOC were released. Texas A&M Forest Service continues to monitor weather and maintain situational awareness of severe weather threats and we stand by to provide resource support with saw crews, AHIMT and TIFMAS teams in weather impacted areas, as needed. TAMFS continues to monitor weather and maintain situational awareness of fire weather threats.

Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC): As of May 15, TAHC is monitoring one animal shelter in San Jacinto County.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ): TCEQ has staff available to respond to any air, water, or waste related issues, including drinking water and wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities. Staff are also available to provide technical assistance and guidance on debris management. As of May 17, TCEQ is tracking 17 drinking water systems that are on a Boil Water Notice (BWN) affecting 5,723 residents.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ): Multiple TDCJ Agricultural Operations Units sustained bridge, fence, road, barn, levee, and crop field damage, and a \$550,930.00 crop loss was estimated. The staff and inmate population remain unaffected by the flooding as water levels recede.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): The DPS Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has deployed six flat water boats to Conroe. The DPS Aviation are conducting patrols in low-lying areas in search of possible water rescues needed and identifying high-water areas. The Texas Department of Public Safety is providing the following resources in support of severe weather affecting Texas. DPS Aviation Operations Division has four helicopter teams stationed in Dallas, Austin, El Paso, and Edinburg ready to respond and DPS relocated a helicopter with hoist capabilities from Austin to Houston. Texas Highway Patrol's (THP) Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has rescue specialists assigned to hoist capable helicopters in Austin and Dallas, and flood water boats throughout the state.

The DPS THP TMU deployed two swift water Zodiac boat crews to the Houston area to assist with water rescues and are working with other state and local rescue teams. A TMU representative reported to the IST in RELLIS to coordinate with TX-TF1.

DPS THP Troopers from Conroe and Rosenburg were deployed to assist Troopers in Houston to provide patrols and security to prevent looting due to widespread power outages and storm damage. DPS Troopers are also providing traffic control at intersections where power is out. DPS has personnel staffed at several DDEOCs, RELLIS, and the Houston Police Department (PD) Command Post.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS has LNOs assigned to the SOC and an Ambulance Strike Team (AST) in Hardin County. On May 12, DSHS extended the Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF) Severe Weather Package (SWX PKG) to May 21. Three SWX PKG from EMTF's 2,4,7, and 8 are on standby, and EMTF's 1,9, and 11 are activated for situational awareness. The Catastrophic Medical Operations Center (CMOC) activated and will begin to coordinate with healthcare facilities to provide assistance as needed. As of May 17, six healthcare facilities in the Houston area are on back-up generator power. One EMTF SWX PKG and one Medical Incident Support Team (MIST) are moving to Houston to stage at the NRG stadium.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

TxDOT has assigned an LNO to support the SOC. TxDOT has received STARs from several counties to assist with roadway materials. SH-21 eastbound lanes have been reopened and the westbound

lanes will remain closed. TxDOT crews and contractors have completed the repairs on US-84 Cowhouse Bridge in Coryell County. Tx-DOT Maintenance and Bridge crews will perform damage assessments once floodwaters recede, and storm threats have diminished. As of May 17, 61 state-maintained roads are impacted by weather, including 35 road closures. On May 15, TxDOT and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) performed preliminary damage assessments to the Pelican Bay Bridge.

TxDOT will staff the SOC during the day from May 16 to May 19. As of May 18, 34 state-maintained roads have been impacted by weather, which includes 22 road closures. On May 16, TxDOT bridge crews prepared for an underwater inspection of the Pelican Bay Bridge. TxDOT is working on a request for traffic signal assistance in the Houston area. Traffic signal crews should be identified by May 18, and will deploy to the Houston District to assist with repairs.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): HHSC is remotely supporting the State Operations Center. On May 16, two staff members were deployed to Liberty County to assist with damage assessments. As of May 17, nine nursing and assisted living facilities are on generator power. One assisted living facility is without power. HHSC has activated contingency contracts for emergency ice and water. One purchase has been made for five trucks of water to Harris County.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD has a SOC Support Team in Austin and has activated three Ground Transportation Platoons (GTP), one Ground Transportation Company Headquarters (GTCHQ), and two UH-60s with Crews. One GTP is staged in Huntsville, one GTP in Conroe and one GTP in Houston. The Rotary Wing Medium will be staged in College Station and Spring with two TX TF-1 Rescue

Swimmers on each aircraft. A total of 61 personnel, 19 vehicles, and two aircraft have been activated in support of 24-0014 26APR Severe Weather.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD has assigned two liaisons to the SOC, one liaison to DDEOC 14 Lufkin, and additional personnel and equipment are activated to respond to affected areas as needed. TPWD has performed 261 rescues, 144 evacuations, and 117 animal evacuations for a total of 522 responses for this incident.

Public Utilities Commission of Texas (PUC): On May 17, statewide power outages peaked at approximately 1,050,000. As of May 18, at 07:32 a.m., there were approximately 549,384 power outages remaining. Most of the power outages are in CenterPoint's service area, and CenterPoint is working to assess and repair the outages. CenterPoint has requested an additional 6,000 personnel through mutual assistance agreements and expects half of the personnel to arrive on May 18, with the other half arriving on May 19. Staging sites are being set up in the Houston area and there isn't an estimate for power restoration.

There were additional outages affecting a number of other utilities from Thursday's storm, but most of those outages have been or will be restored by tonight.

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR): The DIR has one staff member deployed to the SOC. DIR continues to monitor the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this weather event have been identified. There are no requests for network or technology support.

American Red Cross (ARC): As of May 17, the ARC has five shelters open with a population of 125 and a new shelter was opened the Hempstead Recreation Center in Hempstead. An Incident Management Team (IMT) has deployed a basecamp and a field kitchen to Houston. The ARC has distributed 8,331 snacks and 15,376 meals as of May 17. ARC teams are conducting damage assessments in Montgomery, Liberty, Harris, Trinity, and Walker Counties.

On May 14, The Calvary Baptist Church, Burning Hope Baptist Church, St Joseph's Catholic Chapel, and Parkway Church shelters closed. On May 15, the Dunbar Gym shelter in Polk County closed and the Life Vine Church remains open.

The Salvation Army (TSA): TSA is conducting a feeding operation in conjunction with the Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC) at The Salvation Army Houston Area Command Warehouse. TSA will stage two feeding units in Conroe to serve the Huntsville and Cold Spring areas. The Salvation Army has an IMT in Houston. On May 4, TSA is providing community feeding operations at the Santa Fe Admin Building, 1680 CR 3549, Cleveland TX. TSA now has mobile feeding units in Harris, Liberty, Montgomery, Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity, and Walker counties. TSA has set

up a base camp operation with the Southern Baptist Texas Convention Kitchen in Houston. The field kitchen operations are providing 3,500 meals daily.

As of May 15, 20,107 meals, 8,331 snacks and 11,205 drinks have been distributed.

Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC): A site is being set up at Central Baptist Church in Livingston to include an Incident Management Team, Cleanup and Recovery Team, and damage assessments. Additional teams on site include shower, laundry, feeding team, and refrigeration unit.

As of May 16, SBTC has provided 3,640 volunteer hours, 19,913 meals, and 119 showers.

TEXANS ON MISSION (TOM): TOM has two Incident Management Teams (IMT) in Conroe and Kingwood. The TOM flood recovery team in Conroe will demobilize on May 18, and the remaining work orders will be completed by the Katy-Montgomery team. IMT's have provided electrical support, shower, laundry services, boxes, and meals to residents. Local flood recovery teams are in Rising Star and will have additional support coming to the area in the next few days. TOM has provided 277 showers, 1,168 meals, 751 boxes, 245 loads of laundry, and 5,910.5 volunteer hours as of May 16.
