STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On May 20, Governor Abbott <u>amended the disaster proclamation</u> for severe storms and flooding to include Calhoun, Delta, Jones, and Lamar Counties.

On May 19, Governor Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to request additional counties be added to the Presidential Disaster Declaration for severe weather and flooding that began on April 26.

At the Governor's direction and following a review of damage assessments in additional impacted communities which show they exceed federal criteria for disaster assistance, Texas Emergency Management Chief Nim Kidd https://exas.org/nassistance, Texas Emergency Management Chief Nim Kidd https://exas.org/nassistance, Texas Emergency Management Addition of eight counties to become eligible for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Individual Assistance programs. Those additional counties include Calhoun, Eastland, Guadalupe, Hardin, Jasper, Jones, Lamar, and Waller.

Additionally, at the direction of the Governor, Chief Kidd <u>has requested</u> that Harris County become eligible for FEMA's Public Assistance program.

Additional counties may be added to the Governor's request as additional damage assessments are completed in affected communities.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- 1. Protect life and property.
- 2. Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decisionmaking.
- 4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

OPERATIONAL OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Ensure the safety of responders and the public throughout the duration of the incident.
- 2. Monitor conditions and adjust resource allocations as needed.

 Maintain rotation schedule to ensure that personnel receive sufficient rest periods.
- 3. Support the expedited restoration of power across affected areas. Monitor restoration progress and address any barriers swiftly.
- 4. Coordinate with local, state, and federal agencies, as well as nonprofit organizations, to streamline recovery efforts and ensure efficient use of resources.
- 5. Coordinate with FEMA, TDEM Regions and the Incident Support Team (IST) on Disaster Survivor Assistance Team (DSAT) priorities.
- 6. Coordinate with FEMA on location and setup of the Disaster Recovery Center and Joint Field Operation.
- 7. Ensure disaster survivor access to resources through shelter transitioning, community feeding operations, and commodity distribution planning.
- 8. Remain vigilant for incidents occurring within incidents and stand ready to execute actions to meet the needs arising from them.
- 9. Maintain communication and information flow regarding resources with the public/media and appropriate federal, state, and local stakeholders and assure coordination through the affected DDC(s).

NWS Flood Gauges: as of 04:00 AM, May 22

Region 3 (Includes DDs 5, 6, 14, and 15)

DD 5 – Mt. Pleasant (Includes Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River, and Titus Counties)

DDEOC-5 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness).

DD 6 – Tyler (Includes Anderson, Camp, Cherokee, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Marion, Panola, Rains, Rusk, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt, and Wood Counties)

Tyler County: On May 17, the Tyler County Judge issued a voluntary evacuation order.

Region 4 (Includes DD 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties)

DDEOC 16 Houston activated to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions).

Austin County: The Austin County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) reports roadways in Bellville have been cleared of debris and the San Bernard Electric Cooperative (Co-op) crews are working to restore power.

Harris County: The city of Houston has started door-to-door wellness checks for residents on the State of Texas Emergency Assistance Registry (STEAR) that did not respond or requested assistance.

Liberty County: Power outages have affected approximately 9,300 residents throughout Liberty County.

Montgomery County: On May 19, the San Jacinto River Authority reported Lake Conroe Dam discharging 1,599 cubic feet per second (cfs).

Walker County: On May 18, the Walker County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) will shut down and divert all phone calls to the Walker County Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC).

Waller County: Waller County EOC activated to Level I (Emergency Conditions). On May 20, the city of Waller issued a curfew order from 12:00 AM to 6:00 AM until May 24.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS STATE RESOURCES COMMITTED

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM): Mass Care has begun collaborating with our Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) partners and locally impacted counties.

Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

TDEM Communications Coordination Group (CCG) is monitoring the situation with public, private, and volunteer sectors, and is assessing and adjusting resources for severe weather. Cellular providers are assessing the current situation. AT&T is reporting customers experiencing degraded service in the greater Houston area, and AT&T is working to assess the damage and restore services. The AT&T FirstNet Response Operations Group (ROG) has two on air solutions in Waller County. Carriers are deploying generators and back-up power as needed. The networks have redundancies and overlaps which are mitigating the loss of power in some areas.

The Commission on State Emergency Communications (CSEC) is contacting 911 Public Safety Access Point (PSAP) centers to confirm operational status. Public Safety networks in Harris County have experienced some degradation but are operational. The city of Houston has some issues with the backhaul network but is working on alternative solutions. Most of the issues are related to the loss of primary power and are being mitigated by back-up power sources.

Amateur operator networks providing regional emergency communications support reported no outages or requests for assistance. Coordination is being established between Emergency Support Function (ESF) 2 Communications and ESF 12 Energy, for power restoration to communication locations. Coordination between the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), Office of Statewide Interoperable Communications (TXSWIC), FEMA Region 6 Communications, and private and public partners is ongoing.

Incident Support Task Force (ISTF): There are two ISTF members assigned to the SOC.

TDEM Private Sector Coordination: TDEM continues to communicate with private sector partners in the affected areas. Quotes have been obtained for leasing 2,300 generators for the city of Houston to power traffic signals.

Texas A&M University AgriLife Extension (AgriLife): The AgriLife SOC Liaison distributed the TCEQ Carcass Disposal Guidelines to Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Agents in the field. A STAR was filled to activate up to 20 DAR Agents to assist with damage assessments. A DAR Agent is supporting logistics for the RELLIS Incident Support Team (IST) until May 24. Four DAR teams are staged in College Station to assist with damage assessments, and six person DAR teams completed iSTAT damage assessments in Jasper, Hardin, and Lamar Counties.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX): Texas A&M Public Works Response Team (TX-PWRT): The TX-PWRT SOC LNO continues to monitor WebEOC for requests and is working with TCEQ on water/wastewater (W/WW). The TX-PWRT in Lufkin assisted TDEM with Public Assistance damage assessments in San Jacinto County and Individual Assistance damage assessments in Waller County. The TX-PWRT team in Conroe remains staged and is prepared to respond to state or local requests. TX-PWRT has one representative at DDEOC 16 and one representative at the IST at RELLIS.

Texas Task Force 1 (TX-TF1): TX-TF1 has a mission ready package (MRP) of six Flood Water Boat Squads, comprising 26 personnel from both TX-TF2 and TX-TF3 in Huntsville. TX-TF1 crews will remain pre-positioned in TDEM Regions 2,3,4,6 and 8.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): Seven TAMFS and five All Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT) personnel continue to support TDEM with logistics and commodity tracking for the Resource Staging Area (RSA) at NRG Stadium. Two AHIMT and 24 TIFMAS personnel are supporting two Point of Distribution (POD) sites in Houston with commodity distribution and burn rate tracking. Two TAMFS saw teams continue to work with Houston Fire Department (FD) in clearing residential roads north of downtown and are working their way south, and approximately 15 miles of road have been cleared. Three TAMFS and one AHIMT personnel continue to support DDEOC 16 Houston.

Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (VET): On May 15, one Type 4 VET was deployed to the Emergency Animal Shelter at the Coldspring Community Center, in San Jacinto County, is housing 27 dogs and 3 cats. Ten dogs were discharged on May 19, and another 10 animals were treated on May 20.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ): TCEQ has staff available to respond to any air, water, or waste related issues, including drinking water and wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities. Staff are also available to provide technical assistance and guidance on debris management. As of May 21, TCEQ is tracking 33 drinking water systems that are on a Boil Water Notice (BWN) affecting 14,995 residents.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ): Multiple TDCJ Agricultural Operations Units sustained bridge, fence, road, barn, levee, and crop field damage, and a \$550,930.00 crop loss was estimated. The staff and inmate population remain unaffected by the flooding as water levels recede.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): The DPS Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has deployed six flat water boats to Conroe. The DPS Aviation are conducting patrols in low-lying areas in search of possible water rescues needed and identifying high-water areas. The Texas Department of Public Safety is providing the following resources in support of severe weather affecting Texas. DPS Aviation Operations Division has four helicopter teams stationed in Dallas, Austin, El Paso, and Edinburg ready to respond and DPS relocated a helicopter with hoist capabilities from Austin

to Houston. Texas Highway Patrol's (THP) Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has rescue specialists assigned to hoist capable helicopters in Austin and Dallas, and flood water boats throughout the state.

The DPS THP TMU deployed two swift water Zodiac boat crews to the Houston area to assist with water rescues and are working with other state and local rescue teams. A TMU representative reported to the IST in RELLIS to coordinate with TX-TF1.

DPS THP Troopers from Conroe and Rosenburg were deployed to assist Troopers in Houston to provide patrols and security to prevent looting due to widespread power outages and storm damage. DPS Troopers are also providing traffic control at intersections where power is out. DPS has personnel staffed at several DDEOCs, RELLIS, and the Houston Police Department (PD) Command Post.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS has LNOs assigned to the SOC and three SWX PKG from EMTFs 2,4,7, and 8 are on standby, and EMTF's 1,9, and 11 are activated for situational awareness. As of May 21, HCA Houston free standing emergency department (FSED) in Cypress Fairbanks is closed due to lack of power and HCA Houston Healthcare North Cypress has regained power. Nine End Stage Renal Disease facilities are closed, one is on divert, and seven are running on generator power.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): As of May 21, nine statemaintained roads were impacted by weather, including six road closures, and all TxDOT traffic signals have been repaired and are working on generator power. TxDOT submitted a State of Texas Assistance Request (STAR) for 75 generators that that were delivered on May 20. TxDOT is working with the city of Houston on a STAR for assistance with 120 intersections.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): HHSC is remotely supporting the State Operations Center. HHSC has activated contingency contracts and has purchased 20 trucks of water and 16 trucks of ice. As of May 21, four nursing facilities and three assisted living facilities remain on generator power but are operational. Eight intermediate care facilities are without power and have relocated their residents, and 19 Home and Community-based Services (HCS) are without power. HHSC has been approved to issue Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) replacement benefits for impacted SNAP recipients who apply in person at an eligibility office the week of May 20. As of May 21, the Other Needs Assistance (ONA) program hotline is operational between 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM and has received over 45,000 requests for assistance.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD has a SOC Support Team in Austin and has activated three Ground Transportation Platoons (GTP) and one Ground Transportation Company Headquarters (GTCHQ). The three GTP's are staged in Huntsville, Cold Spring, and Houston. On May 20, TMD activated an additional five General Support Units (GSU), one Ground Support Unit Headquarters (GSUHQ),

and one Liaison Office-Field Support Team (LNO-FST) for POD and RSA operations. A total of 188 personnel and 19 vehicles have been activated in support of 24-0014 26APR Severe Weather.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD has assigned two liaisons to the SOC, one liaison to DDEOC 14 Lufkin, one liaison to DDEOC 16 Houston, and additional personnel and equipment are activated to respond to affected areas as needed. TPWD has performed 261 rescues, 144 evacuations, and 117 animal evacuations for a total of 522 responses for this incident.

Public Utilities Commission of Texas (PUC): There are approximately 7000 personnel assigned to power restoration, including 6000 personnel from mutual aid agreements. On May 21, there were approximately 125,000 outages remaining in the CenterPoint territory and the bulk of power restorations are expected to be completed by May 22. Center point has provided a map of expected restoration dates. http://centerpointenergy.com/StormCenter.

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR): The DIR has one staff member deployed to the SOC. DIR continues to monitor the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this weather event have been identified. There are no requests for network or technology support.

American Red Cross (ARC): As of May 21, the ARC has six shelters open with a population of 153. An Incident Management Team (IMT) has deployed a basecamp and a field kitchen to Houston. The ARC has distributed 9,663 snacks and 18,298 meals. The ARC is supporting cooling centers in the city of Houston. ARC teams are conducting damage assessments in Harris, Polk, and San Jacinto Counties.

The Salvation Army (TSA): As of May 20, TSA is coordinating feeding operations with the ARC, Texans on Mission, and the Southern Baptist Texas Convention in Southeast Texas. TSA has distributed 5,738 meals, 6,979 snacks, and 4,802 drinks.

Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC): A site is being set up at Central Baptist Church in Livingston to include an Incident Management Team, Cleanup and Recovery Team, and damage assessments. Additional teams on site include shower, laundry, feeding team, and refrigeration unit. As of May 21, SBTC has provided 5,480 volunteer hours, 21,715 meals, and 1,199 showers.

TEXANS ON MISSION (TOM): TOM has two Incident Management Teams (IMT) in Conroe and Kingwood. The TOM flood recovery team in Conroe demobilized on May 18, and the remaining work orders to be completed by the Katy-Montgomery team. IMTs have provided electrical support, shower, laundry services, boxes, and meals to residents. Local flood recovery teams are in Rising Star and will have additional support coming to the area in the next few days. TOM has provided 462 showers, 5,191 meals, 751 boxes, 346 loads of laundry, and 9,298.5 volunteer hours as of May 20.
