STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On May 26, Governor Abbott <u>signed the state's severe weather disaster declaration</u> to add Denton, Montague, Cooke, and Collin counties, bringing the total number of counties under the disaster declaration to 106.

On May 23, Governor Abbott <u>announced</u> that President Biden amended the Presidential Disaster Declaration for Texas counties impacted by severe weather and flooding that began on April 26.

This partial approval authorizes all categories of work under the FEMA Public Assistance program for seven designated counties to utilize grant funding for emergency work and repair or replacement of disaster-damaged public infrastructure.

The counties eligible for FEMA's Public Assistance program include Harris, Liberty, Montgomery, Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity, and Walker Counties. The Governor's request for 21 additional counties for FEMA's Public Assistance program remains under review.

Additionally, FEMA has approved the request from the State of Texas to add additional counties to the Presidential Disaster Declaration, granting eligibility for FEMA's Individual Assistance programs for those counties. Counties approved for Individual Assistance programs now include Calhoun, Eastland, Guadalupe, Hardin, Harris, Jasper, Jones, Lamar, Liberty, Montgomery, Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity, Walker, and Waller Counties.

On May 22, Governor Greg Abbott announced that he has <u>added</u> Calhoun, Delta, Jones, and Lamar counties to the state's disaster declaration for counties impacted by severe storms and flooding that began on April 26. Additional counties may be added as damage assessments are completed.

At the Governor's direction and following a review of damage assessments in additional impacted communities which show they exceed federal criteria for disaster assistance, Texas Emergency Management (TDEM) Chief Nim Kidd headition of six counties to become eligible for FEMA Individual Assistance programs. Those additional counties include Austin, Ellis, Kaufman, Navarro, Newton, and Tyler.

On May 20, Governor Abbott <u>amended the disaster proclamation</u> for severe storms and flooding to include Calhoun, Delta, Jones, and Lamar Counties.

On May 19, Governor Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to request additional counties be added to the Presidential Disaster Declaration for severe weather and flooding that began on April 26.

At the Governor's direction and following a review of damage assessments in additional impacted communities which show they exceed federal criteria for disaster assistance, Texas Emergency Management Chief Nim Kidd https://exas.org/nassistance, Texas Emergency Management Chief Nim Kidd https://exas.org/nassistance addition of eight counties to become eligible for FEMA Individual Assistance programs. Those additional counties include Calhoun, Eastland, Guadalupe, Hardin, Jasper, Jones, Lamar, and Waller.

Additionally, at the direction of the Governor, Chief Kidd <u>has requested</u> that Harris County become eligible for FEMA's Public Assistance program.

Additional counties may be added to the Governor's request as additional damage assessments are completed in affected communities.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- 1. Protect life and property.
- 2. Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decisionmaking.
- 4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

NWS Flood Gauges: as of 4:00 AM, May 28

No major flooding is reported.

Region 2 (Includes DDs 3, 4, and 22)

DD 4 – Dallas/Ft. Worth (Includes Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hood, Hunt, Johnson, Kaufman, Navarro, Palo Pinto, Parker, Rockwall, Somervell, Tarrant, and Wise Counties)

Response efforts continue in Cooke County and recovery efforts have begun in Collin, Denton, and Montague Counties.

Region 4 (Includes DD 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties)

Austin County: The Austin County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) reports roadways in Bellville have been cleared of debris and the San Bernard Electric Cooperative (Co-op) crews are working to restore power.

Harris County: The city of Houston has started door-to-door wellness checks for residents on the State of Texas Emergency Assistance Registry (STEAR) that did not respond or requested assistance.

Walker County: On May 18, the Walker County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) shut down and diverted all phone calls to the Walker County Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC).

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties)

Robertson County: On May 25, 2024, Lake Limestone gates were opened for a total release of 10,000 cubic feet per second (cfs).

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS STATE RESOURCES COMMITTED

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM): Mass Care is collaborating with our Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) partners and locally impacted counties.

Communications Coordination Group (CCG): TDEM Communications Coordination Group (CCG) is monitoring the situation with public, private, and volunteer sectors. Coordination between the Texas Department of Public Safety

(DPS), Office of Statewide Interoperable Communications (TXSWIC), FEMA Region 6 Communications, and private and public partners is ongoing.

Incident Support Task Force (ISTF): There are two ISTF members assigned to the SOC.

TDEM Private Sector Coordination: TDEM continues to communicate with private sector partners in the affected areas.

Texas A&M University AgriLife Extension (AgriLife): The AgriLife SOC Liaison distributed the TCEQ Carcass Disposal Guidelines to Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Agents in the field. Three DAR teams are staged in Fort Worth to assist with damage assessments, and six person DAR teams completed iSTAT damage assessments in Jasper, Hardin, and Lamar Counties. On May 23, four DAR teams assisted with damage assessments in Bell County. On May 26, DAR Agents in Disaster Districts 3, 4, 5, 7, and 22, assessed agricultural damages from the tornadoes and severe weather.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX): Texas A&M Public Works Response Team (TX-PWRT): The TX-PWRT SOC LNO continues to monitor WebEOC for requests and is working with TCEQ on water/wastewater (W/WW). The TX-PWRT team in Conroe remains staged and is prepared to respond to state or local requests. TX-PWRT has one representative at DDEOC 16 and one representative at the IST at RELLIS.

TX-PWRT assigned a four-member team to Oakwood and a second team will be assigned to Temple, to assist with damage assessments and W/WW plant issues. A TX-PWRT team arrived in Bell County to assist with damage assessments and to coordinate with Brazos River Authority and local wastewater plants for WW/W issues on May 24. One TX-PWRT strike team is in Temple and has completed the restoration of power at multiple lift stations and four team members are reporting to the staging area in Cooke County to assist with utilities shut off.

Texas Task Force 1 (TX-TF1): On May 25, TDEM requested that TX-TF2 activate a Type 3 Search and Rescue (SAR) Team for the thunderstorms and the tornados that crossed TDEM Region 2. The Type 3 SAR Team worked through the night to find survivors at a mobile home park in Valley View. TX-TF1 resources have demobilized and TX-TF2 activated additional resources to continue SAR operations in Cooke County.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): Seven TAMFS and five All Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT) personnel continue to support TDEM with logistics. On May 24, a Point of Distribution (POD) was opened at Lake Belton High School, in Bell County. The POD has been staffed by four TAMFS, 30 Texas Military Department (TMD), one TDEM, three Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), 21 Belton Independent school District (BISD), 15 Boy Scouts, three American Red Cross (ARC), four Texas Baptist Men's Group (TBM), and six Bell

County work release personnel. TAMFS personnel continue to distribute supplies at Lake Belton High School and provide saw crew in Bell and Cooke Counties. On May 28, TAMFS crews cleared 55 miles of road in Van Zandt County.

Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (VET): On May 15, one Type 4 VET was deployed to the Emergency Animal Shelter at the Coldspring Community Center, in San Jacinto County.

Public Utilities Commission of Texas (PUC): There are approximately 7,000 personnel assigned to power restoration, including 6,000 personnel from mutual aid agreements. On May 26, storms created 102,000 power outages statewide which was reduced to 44,000 later in the day, with bulk of the power outages in the Oncor service territory. In Bell County, the remaining 1,800 customers should have their power restored. In Dallas-Fort Worth (DFW) 28,000 customers are without power with no estimation of restoration and CenterPoint Energy has returned to normal operations.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ): TCEQ has staff available to respond to any air, water, or waste related issues, including drinking water and wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities. TCEQ staff are available to provide technical assistance and guidance on debris management and have approved 14 temporary debris management sites. As of May 28, TCEQ is tracking 14 drinking water systems that are on a Boil Water Notice (BWN) affecting 15,483 residents.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ): Multiple TDCJ Agricultural Operations Units sustained bridge, fence, road, barn, levee, and crop field damage, and a \$550,930.00 crop loss was estimated. The staff and inmate population remain unaffected by the flooding as water levels recede.

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR): DIR continues to monitor the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this weather event have been identified. There are no requests for network or technology support.

Cisco has identified vulnerabilities in the Cisco security suite, such as their Adaptive Security Appliance (ASA), Firepower Management Center (FMC), and Firepower Threat Defense (FTD) software. System operators and administrators are encouraged to review the Cisco publication-3 and apply the necessary updates.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): The DPS Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has deployed six flat water boats to Conroe. The DPS Aviation are conducting patrols in low-lying areas in search of water rescues needed and identifying highwater areas. The Texas Department of Public Safety is providing the following resources in support of severe weather affecting Texas. DPS Aviation Operations Division has four helicopter teams stationed in Dallas, Houston, and San Antonio ready to respond and DPS relocated a helicopter with hoist capabilities from Austin

to Houston. Texas Highway Patrol's (THP) Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has rescue specialists assigned to hoist capable helicopters, and flood water boats throughout the state.

Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR): TDLR sent out a press release and social media alerting customers to seek a licensed electrician for power restoration or damage repair. This includes how to find a licensed electrician on the TDLR website.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS has LNOs assigned to the SOC and three (Severe Weather Package) SWX PKG from Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF) 1,2,4,7 on standby and EMTFs 2,4,7,9 are activated at situational awareness. As of May 21, HCA Houston free standing emergency department (FSED) in Cypress Fairbanks is closed due to lack of power and HCA Houston Healthcare North Cypress has regained power. All End Stage Renal Disease facilities in Harris and Jefferson Counties have re-opened.

DSHS is working with local entities who have submitted State of Texas Assistance Requests (STAR) for mosquito abatement. In Hardin County, 464 linear miles were sprayed, and the post-spray assessment showed a 78% decrease in mosquitoes. In Liberty County, 367 linear miles were sprayed, and post-spray assessment showed a 69% decrease in mosquitoes.

The DSHS News Release on May 26, is urging residents to take health precautions following the East Texas flooding, to include tips on returning home after flooding, cleanup, recovery, drinking water, and food safety.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): As of May 28, there are 14 roads flooded and four roads are closed. All TxDOT traffic signals have been repaired and are working on generator power. State Highway (SH) 174 near Kimbell Bridge and State Highway Loop (SL) 323 are closed. TxDOT crews in Dallas, Fort Worth, and Tyler responded to signal damage, flooding, and debris removal on state-maintained roads, and assisted with traffic control. TxDOT crews in Wichita Falls will continue with debris removal and sign repairs throughout the week.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): As of May 21, Other Needs Assistance (ONA) program has received over 65,000 requests for assistance and has raised \$776,322.12 to help residents affected by the storms. HHSC has activated its contingency contracts for emergency ice and water. Purchases have been made for a total of 38 trucks of water and 17 trucks of ice. HHSC received approval to adjust the definition of "food" so that Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients can purchase hot food in fifty counties.

Houston has power has been restored to all nursing facilities, assisted living facilities (ALF), and intermediate care facilities (ICF). Two Home and Community-based Services (HCS) are without power and have relocated residents. Bell County has power restored to all facilities. North Dallas has one nursing facility that was

impacted by flooding, two that sustained minor structural damage, and three that are running on generators. Tyler County has two nursing homes that lost power and are running on generators.

HHSC is coordinating with local mental health and behavioral health authorities to have crisis counseling services available at Disaster Recovery Centers (DRC). Counseling services are now available at the Harris Center, Burke Center, Bluebonnet Trails, and Spindletop DRCs.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD has a SOC Support Team in Austin and activated three Ground Transportation Platoons (GTP) and one Ground Transportation Company Headquarters (GTCHQ). The three GTPs and GTCHQ were released on May 27. TMD activated an additional five General Support Units (GSU), one Ground Support Unit Headquarters (GSUHQ), and one Liaison Office-Field Support Team (LNO-FST) for POD and RSA operations. TMD has 128 personnel activated.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD has assigned two liaisons to the SOC, and additional personnel and equipment are activated to respond to affected areas as needed. TPWD has performed 261 rescues, 144 evacuations, and 117 animal evacuations for 522 responses for this incident.

Federal Emergency Management Agency, Region 6 (FEMA R6): FEMA R6 announced they will open two disaster recovery centers, one in Harris County on May 24, and one in San Jacinto County on April 26, to assist residents affected by the severe weather.

American Red Cross (ARC): As of May 28, the ARC has four shelters open with a population of 108. An Incident Management Team (IMT) has deployed a basecamp and a field kitchen to Houston. The ARC has distributed 32,250 snacks and 44,813 meals. ARC teams are conducting damage assessments in three counties.

Mercy Chefs: As of May 28, Mercy Chefs have provided 2,916 meals in Harris County.

Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC): A site is being set up at Central Baptist Church in Livingston to include an Incident Management Team, Cleanup and Recovery Team, and damage assessments. Additional teams on site include shower, laundry, feeding team, and refrigeration unit. As of May 21, SBTC has provided 7,189 volunteer hours, 21,794 meals, and 1,257 showers.

TEXANS ON MISSION (TOM): TOM has two Incident Management Teams (IMT) in Conroe and Kingwood. IMTs have provided electrical support, shower, laundry services, boxes, and meals to residents. Local flood recovery teams are in Rising Star and will have additional support coming to the area in the next few days. TOM

has provided 918 showers, 32,585 meals, 502 loads of laundry, and 13,122 volunteer hours as of May 27.

The Salvation Army (TSA): As of May 24, TSA has completed their operations and has demobilized from the Houston area. TSA has distributed 6,963 meals, 7,379 snacks, and 5,600 drinks.
