




Another round of showers and thunderstorm will look to be possible Sunday night. While potential is present for strong winds and hail, concerns may shift to flooding with the many models expecting the frontal boundary to stall and keep showers going clear through Monday. The high rainfall rates will likely lead to hazardous travel and flash flooding during the night time hours.




A few thunderstorms are forecast to form across portions of the Caprock and Rolling Plains on Sunday afternoon, with the best chances for storms occurring near the New Mexico state line. Some of these afternoon storms may be severe and capable of producing locally heavy rainfall.





Widespread thunderstorms are expected to form on Sunday night which will lead to a risk for flash flooding. Some storms may be severe as well, and flash flooding may occur even with storms that remain below severe limits.






Another hot day is expected today with highs in the mid 90s. A cold front will approach the region late today with an increase in scattered afternoon showers and storms expected on Monday.





A Heat Advisory is in effect for the Davis Mountains and foothills as well as all of Brewster County. Temperatures will be around 95 to 97 degrees in the mountains, with the hottest temperatures up to 111 degrees along the Rio Grande. Limit time spent outdoors during the hottest part of the day. Never leave children or pets in a hot car -look before you lock! And, take frequent breaks in the shade or air conditioning.




possible Severe thunderstorms are through begin developing **Storms** will toniaht. this afternoon across northern areas and the higher with storm chances terrain to the west, increasing through tonight along and north of I-10. There is a low (10-40%) potential that storms that develop will become severe, though those that do will be capable of producing large hail and damaging wind gusts. Storms will begin around 3 PM CDT and then continue through the night, with the most likely window for severe storms between 5 and 10 PM. Ensure weather alerts on your smart devices are turned on, and have multiple ways to receive warnings. Secure loose objects that could be damaged by strong winds, and shelter vehicles from potential hail damage if possible.






