





Storms are possible again this afternoon for portions of the western to central Panhandles, but the cap may prevent storms from developing. Damaging wind gusts are still the main threat, potentially up to 70 mph, but some large hail will be possible as well.



Isolated to scattered showers will be possible today. Main locations impacted will be areas west of the I-27/US 87 corridor. Any storm that develops will pose a wind threat with gusts up to 65 mph, marginally severe hail, and localized flooding.



Showers and occasional thunderstorms will spread west-northwest through the region Wednesday through Wednesday night. Severe weather is not likely, but locally heavy rain may occur. The best rain & storm chances are across Central Texas, with decreasing chances the farther north & east you go. Rain will exit to the west on Thursday.



Look for scattered to numerous showers and thunderstorms today across the Four State Region. Highest rain chances should be across the southern half of Northeast Texas, Northern Louisiana and South-Central Arkansas.



 Periods of moderate to heavy rainfall possible Monday-Wednesday. The heaviest rainfall may occur on Tuesday and Wednesday.


5-8" of rain possible for areas near and south of US-59/I-69 and 2-4" possible for areas north of US-59/I-69. This rain is expected to fall over multiple days.

Flooding is a concern, especially street flooding in areas that receive locally heavier rainfall.

 With multiple days of heavy rainfall expected, there is potential for river/bayou/creek flooding in some areas. High tide levels along the coast may also inhibit the usual drainage of water.

Forecast uncertainty remains. Please stay tuned to the latest updates in case the flood risk increases.


Excessive Rainfall Outlook for Monday through Wednesday. Tuesday into Wednesday remains the biggest concern for heavy rain as a moderate risk remains outlined for areas near and south of US-59/I- 69.






