
A stormy weather pattern will continue across Southeast Texas. Several rounds of showers and thunderstorms are expected today. Heavy rainfall is possible at times. Skies will be mostly cloudy and high temperatures will be in the low to mid 80s.



For tonight, the lows will be in the low to mid 70s. Partly to mostly cloudy skies are expected along with periods of showers and thunderstorms mainly near and south of I-10.



Highs in the 80s and 90s across South Texas today with a medium to high (50-90%) chance of showers and thunderstorms. Greatest chances over the Victoria Crossroads. Heat index values will be around 100. Light east winds of 5 to 15 mph.




There will be some lingering showers and storms across the area otherwise expect partly to mostly cloudy skies. Lows will be in the upper 70s tonight. Expect rain chances to ramp up again tomorrow morning.

Temperatures will decrease to near normal across Deep South Texas during the work week with increased cloud cover and rain. Storms have potential to bring 1 to 2 inches of rain with locally heavier amounts.




Rounds of showers and thunderstorms continue today. There will be embedded pockets of heavy rainfall and instances of flooding some are possible. The stronger thunderstorms could also produce gusty winds.





The combination of a surface front, an upper-level disturbance, and high moisture levels will continue to result in rounds of showers and thunderstorms this week into this weekend. Embedded heavy rainfall and isolated to scattered instances of flooding will be possible. There will also be periods of little or no activity. Temperatures will trend below average with highs only in the 80s most areas with lower to mid 90s across the Rio Grande Plains.






Isolated to scattered showers and will storms continue to be possible on and through off Wednesdav afternoon. Best chances for precipitation will be during the morning/afternoon hours and across portions of East and Central Texas. Severe weather is not expected with this activity. Lightning and heavy rain that could introduce or exacerbate flooding will be the main concerns.

Unsettled weather will continue the remainder of the week and into the weekend with daily rain chances and near or below normal temperatures. The highest rain chances will be across Central and East Texas where multiple rounds of rainfall could result in flooding. Highs will gradually return to the 90s by the end of the weekend and next week.






