A cold front will bring showers and isolated thunderstorms to the area tonight through Monday morning. Some of these storms could become severe with damaging wind gusts and hail as the primary hazards. An isolated tornado can't be ruled out for portions of the southern Edwards Plateau and western Hill Country. Stay weather aware!



There is a potential for strong to severe storms this evening into Monday morning for West Central Texas. Damaging winds, heavy rainfall, as well as some hail and a tornado or two are possible.



A low risk of severe weather is in store for early Sunday evening through early Monday morning across the eastern Permian Basin. The primary threats for the strongest storms will be damaging winds and heavy rainfall. Isolated large hail or a tornado cannot be ruled out either for the strongest storms. Be weather aware Sunday!




Sunday will feature rain for nearly everyone. Highs will be cooler as well. Snow levels will hover between 9000-9500 feet but drop throughout the evening.




A few storms associated with the main low pressure system today could result in some severe thunderstorms with damaging wind gusts being the primary hazard. Main area of concern at this time is the far SE Texas Panhandle between an approximate timing range of 3 to 9 PM.




Widespread moderate to heavy rain is expected tonight and a Flood Watch is in effect for all of the South Plains, Rolling Plains and southern Texas Panhandle from 6 PM today until 6 AM Monday. Rain totals of 1 to 3 inches is expected to be common tonight, with localized totals of 4 inches. The heavy rain will create flash flooding in poor drainage and urban areas. Remember, flooding is particularly dangerous at night when it is difficult to see. Never attempt to drive through flooded roadways.



Thunderstorms are expected across western north Texas and southern Oklahoma Sunday night into Monday morning. The strongest of these storms will produce damaging wind gusts and have a low tornado risk.



A few afternoon thunderstorms will be possible today, however, those are expected to remain subsevere. The main severe weather potential will arrive late tonight into Monday morning as a line of storms moves east. The main hazards will include damaging winds with a potential for quick tornadoes.




Mostly cloudy with areas of showers and thunderstorms. Highs mainly in the low to mid 80s.






