STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION:

The Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) has been downgraded to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions).

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- 1. Protect life and property.
- 2. Support rapid & effective response.
- 3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- 4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties)

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties)

DD 4 – Dallas/Ft. Worth (Includes Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hood, Hunt, Johnson, Kaufman, Navarro, Palo Pinto, Parker, Rockwall, Somervell, Tarrant, and Wise Counties)

DD 22 – Sherman (Includes Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson Counties): Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 22 is at Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions), City of Gainesville Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is at Level III, and Fannin County is at Level II (Escalated Response Conditions). The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has started 24-hour operations in the area.

DD 14 – Lufkin (Includes Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler Counties)

DD 15 – Beaumont (Includes Hardin, Jefferson, and Orange Counties)

Region 4 (Includes DDs 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties)

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

STATE RESOURCES COMMITTED

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

Incident Support Task Force (ISTF): ISTF has submitted their final report and with improving weather conditions, resources are scaling down. The American Red Cross has completed its sheltering mission and has closed two shelters.

Mass Care: As of February 22, there were 392 warming centers open, and four general population shelters open with a total population of 138 people and four pets.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife): AgriLife has two SOC liaisons monitoring weather conditions, and 26 Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) specialists and County Extension Stike Teams on standby. AgriLife Marketing and Communications has distributed preparedness information and educational resources to support county agents and specialists.

Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC):

Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) set a new unofficial peak of 2080, 80,154 Milliwatts (mW) on February 20 but has maintained ample energy reserves. Statewide outage counts have remained low and scattered, and ERCOT continues to project sufficient energy reserves through the end of this event. Utilities continue normal operations and ERCOT's weather watch expired as of noon, February 21st.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):

TCEQ has agency staff and emergency response hazmat contractors on heightened readiness for deployment to assist with any air/water/waste related issues including drinking water/wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities. As of February 22, TCEQ is tracking ten drinking water systems that are on a Boil Water Notice (BWN) serving a population of 6,090.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): On February 19, DPS Director Martin issued an <u>emergency declaration</u> for property-carrying vehicles.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): As of 2:45 a.m. on February 22nd, there were no state-maintained road closures or weather impacts. TxDOT crews in the Austin, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, and Yoakum districts continued overnight patrols and treatments on priority roadways and hotspots.

TxDOT warns motorists of potential roadway hazards from broken water lines in several counties. TxDOT emergency management staff supported SOC operations, with over 1,600 personnel conducting winter weather operations on February 20 and distributing over 122,900 gallons of brine. Patrols and monitoring of state-maintained roads will continue.

Texas Education Agency (TEA): As of February 21, two school districts, Rising Star ISD, and Woodson ISD, have been impacted due to the severe weather.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD has released all personnel.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD has submitted their final report and continues to work closely with TDEM to ensure TPWD resources are available should they be needed.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS has released all personnel.

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF): EMTF has released all personnel.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): HHSC is monitoring the current weather conditions and impacts to state operated facilities.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD)

American Red Cross (ARC): The American Red Cross has completed their sheltering mission and support for this event.

Texans On Mission (TXM): Due to freezing temperatures, on Feb 18th TXM began assisting with meals for warming centers and shelters in the Dallas area. Cumulative Meals Distributed 9200, at 1 Fixed Feeding Site.
