STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: Governor Abbott <u>directed</u> the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to elevate the readiness level of the Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) to Level II (Escalated Response) on March 4 as the state braced for extremely critical wildfire conditions and severe weather threats. The Governor also added 33 counties to the state's wildfire disaster declaration, which now totals 236 counties impacted by increased fire weather conditions.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- 1. Protect life and property.
- 2. Support rapid & effective response.
- 3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- 4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Stonewall, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties):

Gray County: The Combs fire has burned 500 acres and is 100 percent contained.

Stonewall County: The Double Fork fire has burned 216 acres and is 95 percent contained.

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties)

Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 2: has activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions).

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties)

Region 2 (Includes DDs 3, 4, and 22)

DD 3 – Wichita Falls (Includes Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Wichita, Wilbarger, and Young Counties)

DD 4 – Dallas/Ft. Worth (Includes Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hood, Hunt, Johnson, Kaufman, Navarro, Palo Pinto, Parker, Rockwall, Somervell, Tarrant, and Wise Counties)

Panola County: The Panola 0873 fire has burned two acres and is 50 percent contained.

DD 22 – Sherman (Includes Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson Counties)

Region 3 (Includes DDs 5, 6, 14, and 15)

DD 5 – Mt. Pleasant (Includes Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River, and Titus Counties)

DD 6 – Tyler (Includes Anderson, Camp, Cherokee, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Marion, Panola, Rains, Rusk, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt, and Wood Counties)

Cherokee County: The Cherokee 0874 fire has burned 10 acres and is 10 percent contained.

DD 14 – Lufkin (Includes Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler Counties)

DD 15 – Beaumont (Includes Hardin, Jefferson, and Orange Counties)

Region 4 (Includes DDs 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties)

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19-21)

DD 19 – Laredo (Includes Jim Hogg, Starr, Webb, and Zapata, Counties)

DD 20 – Corpus Christi (Includes Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties):

DDEOC 20: has active to Level II (Escalated Response).

Duval County: The Red Rose fire has burned 520 acres and is 85% contained.

San Patricio County: The Railway fire has burned 700 acres and is 65% contained. The Welder Complex fire has burned 580 acres and is 50% contained.

DD 21 – Weslaco (Includes Cameron, Hidalgo, and Willacy Counties)

Hidalgo County: The Brush Line fire has burned 58 acres and is 95% contained.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24)

DD 17 – Victoria (Includes Calhoun, DeWitt, Goliad, Gonzales, Lavaca, Jackson, and Victoria Counties)

DD 18 – San Antonio (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties)

Bexar County: The Calaveras fire has burned 284 acres and is 85% contained. The Duke fire has burned 100 acres and is 20% contained.

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Edwards, La Salle, Kinney, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties)

La Salle County: The Twin Oryx fire has burned 800 acres and is 20% contained.

Region 7 (Includes DDs 8, 9, and 10)

DD 8 – El Paso (Includes Brewster, Culberson, El Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, and Presidio Counties)

DD 9 – Midland/Ft. Stockton (Includes Andrews, Borden, Crane, Dawson, Ector, Gaines, Glasscock, Howard, Loving, Martin, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward, and Winkler Counties)

DD 10 – San Angelo (Includes Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, and Tom Green Counties)

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 11 – Waco (Includes Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone, and McLennan Counties)

DD 12 – Austin (Includes Bastrop, Blanco, Burnet, Caldwell, Fayette, Hays, Lee, Llano, Travis, and Williamson Counties)

Blanco County: The Klett fire has burned 126 acres and is 50% contained.

Hays County: The Onion Creek fire has burned 80 acres and is 45% contained.

DD 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties)

DD 23 – Killeen (Includes Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills, and San Saba Counties)

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

STATE RESOURCES COMMITTED

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife): Two AgriLife SOC liaisons (LNO) are monitoring fire and severe weather conditions. AgriLife has one Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Specialist serving as an LNO on the Incident Management Team stationed in Merkel. There are 25 DAR specialists, and a County Extension Deployment Team member on standby to support animal response or other fire weather response efforts.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): TAMFS has firefighting resources positioned in all TDEM Regions. Air Tankers, Attack helicopter aircraft, Single Engine Airtankers (SEAT), heavy equipment and engines are positioned throughout the state. TAMFS has activated the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in College Station. Texas Intrastate Fure Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) strike teams are in Amarillo, Lubbock, Merkel, San Angelo, Ozona, Brownwood, Kerrville, Silverton, Burkburnett, Childress, Waco, McGregor, Uvalde, Alice, and Beeville.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD is providing direct support to TAMFS with aerial fire suppression capability in response to critical fire weather. TMD has activated two Rotary Wing Medium (Mission Ready Packages) MRPs, consisting of four UH 60 Blackhawk helicopters, staged in San Antonio and Fredericksburg. One Rotary Wing Heavy MRP consisting of two CH 47 Chinook helicopters staged in Grand Prairie. A has SOC Support Team has been assigned in Austin. As of March 4, TMD Rotary Wing aircraft have flown a total of 25.7 hours and dropped a total of 31,200 gallons of water. TMD has activated 37 personnel and six aircraft in support of this incident.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD has prepared department resources consisting of Texas Game Wardens and State Park Police Officers ready to support as needed in response to the increased Wildfire threat throughout the State. TPWD continues to work closely with TDEM and other state and federal partners to ensure TPWD resources and first responders are available. TPWD personnel are continuously being advised of the current weather conditions and maintaining a state of readiness.

TPWD has the following Statewide resources available to support, one LNO to the SOC, one helicopter in Austin, State Game Wardens, and State Park Police Officers, and All-Terrain Vehicles.

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR): DIR is monitoring the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. Currently, no cyber threats related to this event have been identified.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): As of March 4, there was one statemaintained partial road closure. The City of Wills Point (Van Zandt Co) closed a section of Farm to Market (FM) 47 indefinitely due to a partial building collapse. TxDOT offices are reporting downed trees and debris impacting roadways, including Interstate Highway (IH) 35, United States Highway (US) 180, and US-281 in North Texas. TxDOT crews are patrolling roads and clearing downed trees and debris from state-maintained roadways across the state.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS is currently monitoring the situation and ready to deploy resources and respond as the incident requires. DSHS has two LNOs assigned to the SOC.

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF): EMTF has activated one Medical Incident Management Team (MIST) and one State Coordination Organization (SCO) personnel. EMTF has activated 34 personnel and 24 assets for this incident.

American Red Cross (ARC): The ARC is on standby to respond to needs arising from expected fire weather and other disasters in Texas. On March 3, one shelter was supported in Bell County that housed five residents. On March 4, ARC performed damaged assessments as weather permitted.
