STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On March 16, Governor Abbott <u>announced</u> that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved the state's request for Fire Management Assistance Grants for the Rest Area Fire in Gray County and the Crabapple Fire in Gillespie County.

On March 13, Governor Abbott <u>announced</u> that he directed TDEM to activate additional state emergency response resources in anticipation of extremely critical wildfire danger expected across West Texas and ongoing elevated-to-critical fire weather conditions across most of the state into the weekend.

On March 7, Governor Abbott <u>announced</u> that he directed TDEM to request officials from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) join state and local partners to conduct joint preliminary damage assessments in South Texas communities impacted by recent wildfires. These assessments will aid in determining whether Texas meets the threshold for additional federal disaster assistance.

On March 5, Governor Abbott <u>announced</u> that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved the state's request for Fire Management Assistance Grants for the Welder Fire in San Patricio County and the Duke Fire in Bexar County.

On March 4, Governor Abbott <u>directed</u> the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to elevate the readiness level of the Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) as the state braced for extremely critical wildfire conditions and severe weather threats. The Governor also added 33

counties to the state's wildfire disaster declaration, which now totals 236 counties impacted by increased fire weather conditions.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- 1. Protect life and property.
- 2. Support rapid & effective response.
- 3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- 4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties)

Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 1: Increased to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) on March 18.

Potter County: The Triple T Fire burned two acres and is contained.

Roberts County: The Windmill Fire has burned 23,297 acres and is 90% contained.

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties):

DDEOC 2: Increased to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) on March 17.

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor, and Throckmorton Counties)

DDEOC 7: Level IV (Normal Conditions)

Region 3 (Includes DDs 5, 6, 14, and 15)

DD 6 – Tyler (Includes Anderson, Camp, Cherokee, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Marion, Panola, Rains, Rusk, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt, and Wood Counties)

Anderson County: The Anderson 1391 Fire burned eight acres and is contained.

Cherokee County: The Cherokee 1393 Fire burned one acre and is contained.

Harrison County: The Harrison 1360 Fire burned two acres and is contained. The Harrison 1376 Fire has burned six acres and is contained. The Harrison 1378 Fire has burned two acres and is contained. The Harrison 1392 Fire has burned 50 acres and is contained.

Marion County: The Marion 1380 Fire burned five acres and is contained.

Rusk County: The Rusk 1385 Fire burned eight acres and is contained.

Tyler County: Tyler 1403 Fire has 15 acres and is contained.

DD 14 – Lufkin (Includes Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler Counties):

Newton County: The Newton 1395 Fire burned four acres and is contained.

Region 4 (Includes DDs 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties)

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19-21)

DD 19 – Laredo (Includes Jim Hogg, Starr, Webb, and Zapata Counties)

DDEOC 20: Activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) – Corpus Christi (Includes Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties)

Duval County: The Duval 1256 Fire burned 58 acres and is 90% contained.

Jim Wells County: The Roadrunner Fire has burned six acres and 90% contained.

Refugio County: The Lake Pasture Fire burned 300 acres and is contained.

DDEOC 21: Activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) - Weslaco (Includes Cameron, Hidalgo, and Willacy Counties)

Hidalgo County: The Hargill Reservoir Fire has burned 13 acres and is contained. The Resaca (Donna 2) Brush Fire has burned 130 acres and is 95% contained.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24)

DD 17 – Victoria (Includes Calhoun, DeWitt, Goliad, Gonzales, Lavaca, Jackson, and Victoria Counties):

DD 18 – San Antonio (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties)

Gillespie County: The Crabapple Fire has burned 9,737 acres and is 85% contained. The fire continues to threaten 50 structures and 50 homes, with one home destroyed. One injury has been reported, and a shelter has been opened at Zion Lutheran Church, 426 W. Main Street, Fredericksburg. Due to the fire's rapid growth, a mandatory evacuation has been issued, affecting seven locations. The Duderstadt Fire has burned 50 Acres and is 90% contained.

Kendall County: A Wildfire has burned 100 acres and is 90% contained. One firefighter suffered a shoulder injury. The Bootes Fire has 118 acres and is 90% contained.

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Edwards, La Salle, Kinney, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties)

Real County: The Chicken Strip Fire has burned 22 acres and is 95% contained.

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 23 – Killeen (Includes Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills, and San Saba Counties):

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University:

Communication Coordination Group: An AT&T FIRSTNET Satellite Cellular on Light Truck (SATCOLT) was deployed to Fredericksburg to support the Crabapple Fire. Cellular providers in the impacted area have tuned their systems to support increased cellular activity in the Gillespie County area.

Mass Care: TDEM partners are adapting to the evolving conditions and are ensuring community needs are met while prioritizing safety. Local agencies are continuing to support feeding and assess recovery efforts as it transitions to community resources to meet the needs of residents.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife): SOC Liaisons maintain daily communication with ESF 11 partners for situational awareness and needs assessment.

On March 17, DAR Specialists and County Extension Agents continue to monitor the Crabapple Fire in Gillespie County. The AgriLife DAR Unit deployed an Animal Response Team on March 17 to assist with livestock sheltering and donations management at the Gillespie County Fairgrounds. AgriLife Extension coordinated with the Texas Department of Agriculture to procure a supply of hay to landowners who are in burned areas.

As of March 16, SOC Liaisons continue to remotely monitor fire weather conditions for ESF 11. A State of Texas Assistance Request (STAR) was submitted to AgriLife and approved for the DAR Specialist in Disaster District 18 to assist with agricultural donation management at the Crabapple Fire in Gillespie County.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): TAMFS has firefighting resources positioned in all TDEM Regions. Air tankers, attack helicopter aircraft, single engine air tankers (SEAT), heavy equipment and engines are positioned throughout the state. TAMFS has activated the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in College Station. Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) strike teams are in Alice, Amarillo, Beeville, Brownwood, Burkburnett, Childress, Kerrville, Lubbock, McGregor, Merkel, Ozona, San Angelo, Silverton, Uvalde, and Waco.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD is providing direct support to TAMFS with aerial fire suppression capability in response to the critical fire weather. TMD has staged two Medium Mission Ready Packages (MRP) with two UH-60 helicopters in San Antonio and two in Austin, and one Heavy MRP with two CH-47 Chinook helicopters in Grand Prairie. A SOC Support Team has been assigned to Austin. TMD has activated 33 personnel and six aircraft in support of this incident. As of March 17, TMD Rotary Wing aircraft have flown a total of 81.5 hours and dropped a total of 221,630 gallons of water.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): State Park Firefighters and a brush truck assisted with the Crabapple Fire in Gillespie County on Saturday and Sunday. TPWD has the following Statewide resources available to support: one LNO at the SOC, one helicopter in Austin, All-Terrain Vehicles, State Game Wardens, and State Park Police Officers. TPWD Aviation responded to the Onion Creek Wildfire in Hays County and successfully made 18 water drops (2,070 gallons of water).

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR): DIR is continuing to monitor the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this weather event have been identified. No requests for network or technology have been made.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): As of March 17, State Highway (SH) 137 in Midland County and Farm-to-Market (FM) 829 in Dawson County were closed due to sand drifts on the road. TxDOT will begin sharing Extreme Wildfire Danger messaging starting tomorrow on the Dynamic Message System (DMS) road signage and on social media. TxDOT urges motorists to slow down and drive with caution. Check DriveTexas.org for the most current road conditions.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS is currently monitoring the situation and ready to deploy resources and respond as the incident requires. DSHS has two LNOs assigned to the SOC.

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF): EMTF has recorded 3,029 encounters, with seven treated, and none transported. Multiple teams with Wild Land Fire Support (WLFS) packages were deployed or prepositioned across Texas to support wildfire response efforts. Teams have responded to active fires, including the Crabapple Fire (Gillespie County), and Windmill Fire (Roberts County). Other teams were prepositioned in Alice, Brownwood, Lubbock, and Merkel to enhance wildfire response readiness. SCO and MIST are operating from the TAMFS EOC in College Station. The Area MEDL transitioned from the Rest Area Fire to the Crabapple Fire, while the SCO remains at the SOC in Austin.

American Red Cross (ARC): Volunteers have completed damage assessments in Sinton and have identified over 100 affected homes. North Texas teams assessed damage to over 119 homes and have provided disaster emergency supplies.

The Salvation Army (TSA): TSA of Beeville supported first responders and those affected by the Welder Complex fires by providing food, snacks, and water. The Beeville Service Unit is supporting those affected by the Welder Fires in Sinton by providing meals in coordination with the local Baptist Church.
