STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On March 20, Governor Abbott [announced](#) that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved the state's request for a Fire Management Assistance Grant for the Pauline Road Fire in San Jacinto and Montgomery Counties. The approval of this Fire Management Assistance Grant makes Texas eligible for a 75 percent reimbursement from the federal government for costs associated with fighting the Pauline Road Fire. Fire Management Assistance Grants are available to states and local jurisdictions for the mitigation, management, and control of fires on publicly or privately owned forests or grasslands, which threaten such destruction and would constitute a major disaster.

On March 19, Governor Abbott [announced](#) that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) approved his request for a disaster declaration for South Texas communities impacted by the Welder Fire and a disaster declaration for North Texas communities impacted by severe weather earlier this month. The wildfire declaration includes the following Texas counties: Aransas, Bee, Jim Wells, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio. The severe weather declaration includes the following Texas counties: Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Kaufman, Rockwall, and Tarrant. The SBA granted access to its Home Disaster Loans, Business Physical Disaster Loans, and Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program, which will provide low-interest loans to qualifying homeowners, renters, and businesses in affected North Texas communities following the severe storms and tornadoes that occurred earlier this month, as well as South Texas communities affected by the Welder Fire.

On March 19, Governor Abbott [announced](#) that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved the state's request for a Fire Management Assistance Grant for the Double S Fire in Hutchinson County. The approval of this Fire Management Assistance Grant makes Texas eligible for a 75 percent reimbursement from the federal government for costs associated with fighting the Double S Fire. Fire Management Assistance Grants are available to states and local jurisdictions for the mitigation, management, and control of fires on publicly or privately owned forests or grasslands, which threaten such destruction and would constitute a major disaster.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 3 (Includes DDs 5, 6, 14, and 15)

DD 6 – Tyler (Includes Anderson, Camp, Cherokee, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Marion, Panola, Rains, Rusk, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt, and Wood Counties)

Marion County: The 3001 Fire has burned 524 acres and is 100% contained.

DD 14 – Lufkin (Includes Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler Counties)

Polk County: The Pace Creek Fire burned five acres and is not contained.

San Jacinto County: The Pauline Road Fire has burned 2,421 acres and is 95% contained.

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19-21)

DD 19 – Level IV (Normal Conditions): Laredo (Includes Jim Hogg, Starr, Webb, and Zapata, Counties)

DD 20 – [Level IV \(Normal Conditions\)](#): Corpus Christi (Includes Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties)

DD 21 – Level IV (Normal Conditions): Weslaco (Includes Cameron, Hidalgo, and Willacy Counties)

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University:

Communication Coordination Group: An AT&T FIRSTNET Satellite Cellular on Light Truck (SATCOLT) was deployed to Fredericksburg to support the Crabapple Fire, and cellular providers in the impacted area have tuned their systems to support increased cellular activity in the Gillespie County area.

Mass Care: The Regional Disaster Finance Coordinator continues to work with local jurisdictions on cost tracking and providing guidance for disaster finance documentation.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife): AgriLife SOC Liaisons continue to monitor fire weather conditions for ESF 11. The Gillespie County Extension office is managing the intake and distribution of donations at the Crabapple Fire Animal Supply Point. DAR and County Extension staff are in San Jacinto County monitoring animal needs at the Pauline Road Fire. AgriLife Extension will continue to monitor livestock sheltering needs with county officials at the Pauline Road fire in San Jacinto County.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): The Texas A&M Forest Service is closely monitoring fire weather conditions, with resources including wildland firefighting, heavy equipment, fire engines, and field personnel, in all TDEM Regions. Nine TIFMAS strike teams are pre-positioned in all TDEM Regions with EMTF support. Forty-seven firefighting aircraft are available at 20 locations across the state, including 6 Air Attacks, 1 Aerial Supervision Module, 15 Single-Engine Air Tankers, 6 Large Airtankers (LATs), 6 Single Engine Scoopers, 10 Type 1 Helicopters (six are TMD) and two Type 3 Helicopters. TAMFS is supporting the State Operations Center with daily staffing. Texas A&M Forest Service, firefighting aircraft, and TIFMAS resources are currently assisting local responders with the Pauline Road Fire in San Jacinto and Montgomery Counties totaling 2,421 acres.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD is providing direct support to TAMFS with aerial fire suppression capability in response to the critical fire weather. TMD has staged two Medium Mission Ready Packages (MRP) with two UH-60 helicopters in Lufkin, two in Austin, and one Heavy MRP with two CH-47 helicopters in Grand Prairie. A SOC Support Team has been assigned to Austin. TMD has activated 34 personnel and six aircraft in support of this incident. As of March 24, TMD Rotary Wing aircraft have flown a total of 125.9 hours and dropped a total of 627 buckets for a total of 352,693 gallons of water.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD has the following Statewide resources available to support: one LNO at the SOC, one helicopter in Austin, All-Terrain Vehicles, State Game Wardens, and State Park Police Officers.

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR): DIR is continuing to monitor the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this event have been identified. No requests for network or technology have been made.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): TxDOT continues to share TAMFS and Extreme Wildfire Danger messaging today on DMS road signage and on social media.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS is currently monitoring the situation and is ready to deploy resources and respond as the incident requires. DSHS has two LNOs assigned to the SOC.

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF): Multiple teams with Wild Land Fire Support (WLFS) packages were deployed or prepositioned across Texas to support wildfire response efforts. WLFS Teams have made 4,780 encounters, treated 12 individuals, and have had two transports.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD):

American Red Cross (ARC): Shelter and feeding teams remain on standby, ready to respond statewide if needed.

Texans on Mission (TXM): TXM is providing shower and laundry services to emergency responders for the Crabapple Fire in Fredericksburg. The team arrived on March 18 and is staying at the Volunteer Fire & Rescue Building in Willow City. To date, TXM has provided 150 work hours, five showers, and 24 laundry loads.
