
Flash Flood Potential Today and Tuesday





Updated: Mon May 05, 2025 4:29 AM

With the potential for persistent rainfall with periods of moderate to heavy rain with some thunderstorms, all areas of the Panhandles have some concern for flash flooding today through Tuesday. The south and west have a better chance for heavy rainfall today, with the north and east having the better chance on Tuesday.



Severe storms and heavy rains are possible beginning around midday and continuing this evening. The main threats are large hail, damaging wind gusts, and heavy rains with an isolated tornado also possible.



There is a marginal risk (level 1 of 5) of severe weather for all of Deep South Texas and the Rio Grande Valley for Tuesday afternoon through Tuesday night. Primary threat will be winds around 60 mph or greater. There is a low chance for large hail and a very low chance for an isolated tornado.



More widespread storms are expected on Tuesday. Some storms could become strong to severe, with large hail, damaging winds, a couple tornadoes, and flash flooding all possible. Make sure you have multiple ways to receive weather alerts.

Severe Weather & Heavy Rainfall Potential



Key Messages

- → Multiple rounds of precipitation are expected during the day and overnight in association with a slow moving storm system.
- → Some storms will have the potential to becoming strong to severe (level 2 of 5). In addition, locally heavy rain is expected (level 2 of 4).
- → Additional shower and storm activity is anticipated Wednesday (especially the southern half of the area)!



Potential Impacts

- → All modes of severe weather look to be a possibility (hail, strong wind, isolated tornadoes, localized street flooding, rises on area watersheds),
- → Marine: Small Craft Advisories likely. Elevated SE winds and seas, above normal water levels, high risk of rip currents.



Actions

→ Remain weather-aware and check the forecast for updates!







Showers and thunderstorms are expected to develop today with severe thunderstorms possible for portions of the South Plains and Rolling Plains. Strong wind gusts up to 70 mph, large hail up to golf ball size, and tornadoes possible with any severe thunderstorms.



The severe weather threat increases Monday afternoon through late Monday night, especially across far southeast New Mexico, the Permian Basin, and the Upper Trans Pecos Region. All severe hazards are possible including very large hail (2"+ in diameter), damaging winds, and a few tornadoes. The tornado threat is expected to increase during the evening and overnight hours. Be sure to have multiple ways to receive weather warnings to protect yourself.








Scattered thunderstorms are expected to develop by this afternoon, with the potential for strong to severe thunderstorms through tonight. The main concerns will be large hail and damaging winds, along with an isolated tornado.

Tornadoes



A Flood Watch is in effect for the entire Four State Region from 7 AM Tuesday through 7 AM on Wednesday due to the threat of excessive heavy rainfall on top of already saturated soils. Rainfall amounts during this timeframe will likely average between 2-4 inches with isolated higher totals of 5+ inches possible in some areas.






