Today will likely be a very active weather day for the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles. All severe storm hazards will be possible including large destructive hail and winds. A few tornadoes cannot be ruled out in addition to flash flooding. Stay weather aware today and have a plan!

Severe storms are possible Sunday afternoon and evening. Large hail, damaging winds, and tornadoes will all be possible.



A potentially significant storm complex is expected to move across much of North Texas this evening into tonight, primarily in the 9pm to 1am timeframe. Damaging wind gusts greater than 80 mph, a few spinup tornadoes, and isolated large hail will all be possible. Make sure you have multiple ways to receive warnings and a shelter plan for when a warning is issued for your location.

#### **Dangerous Severe Weather Expected This Evening**

Highest Local Risk: MODERATE (Risk Level 4 out of 5)



A severe weather outbreak is possible across the Plains today. For West Central Texas, the highest threat area is mainly north of a Sweetwater to Brownwood line. Very large hail and hurricane force winds are possible, along with isolated tornadoes. Farther south towards San Angelo and Brady, storms are expected to be much more isolated.

Sunday evening through early Monday morning (6 PM-3 AM).




Hurricane Force Possible Winds (60-80+ Tornado MPH)

An intense line of storms is expected to develop along the Red River west into the Texas South Plains late this afternoon, with the line of storms moving southeast into West Central Texas this evening and into the early morning hours on Monday. Large to very large hail larger than softball size and damaging winds near hurricane force are likely with some of these storms, along with the potential for isolated tornadoes.BB




There is an increasing risk of severe weather late today, into the evening and potentially through the overnight hours. A complex of powerful thunderstorms will push across the region, bringing potentially destructive winds, very large hail, a tornado or two, and heavy rainfall leading to possible flash flooding. There are low chances for a few severe storms over areas of central Louisiana on Sunday and again on Monday.




The combination of hot temperatures and relative humidity will result in a Major Heat Risk for large portions of Deep South Texas and the Rio Grande Valley today. Visit heat.gov for a one-stop shop on heat and health.




Our streak of hot temperatures will climax today, with highs around 105°F expected for the El Paso Metro area. The Lower Valley could see highs 105-107°, hottest below Fort Hancock.

Take heat safety precautions seriously:

- Wear loose and light clothing.
- Drink plenty of water.
- Find shade and cool areas during the heat of the day.



Dangerous heat is possible during the afternoon and early evening today. Heat Advisories are in effect for parts of the Permian Basin and southwest of the Pecos River as a result. Take precautions in the heat!



There is an enhanced (Level 3 of 5) risk of severe thunderstorms this afternoon and evening. The highest risk of thunderstorms will be near the Davis Mountains and eastern Permian Basin. Any severe storms that do develop will be accompanied by large hail and/or damaging winds and/or an isolated tornado. Stay weather aware!






