FEMA Region 6 Weather Threat Briefing

Friday, July 04

• Flash Flooding:

- Slight risk (level 2 of 4) today over w-cntrl TX with a locally higher risk where very high rainfall rates occur. Marginal risk (level 1 of 4) over cntrl TX tomorrow.
- Moderate risk (level 2 of 4) over the NM burn scar areas on Sunday; Moderate to Major risk (levels 2-3 of 4) on Monday.
- River Flooding: Major flooding along the Guadalupe and San Saba Rivers west of I-35 today. Moderate to major flooding along the Rio Grande in the TX Big Bend area.
- <u>Tropical</u>: An tropical disturbance may form later this week along the southeastern US coast. This system has a 60% of development in the next 48 hours and 60% chance over the next 7 days. No impacts to FEMA 6 expected.





Note: Even though the image displays 5 days of forecasted rainfall, river forecasts only include 1-2 days of rainfall




















Tomorrow's Tornado & Severe Wind / Hail Probabilities










Marginal risk (level 1 of 4) of flash flooding in NM and far WTX.








"Day 3-7" Hazards Outlook






"Day 8-14" Hazards Outlook











