
Another low end risk for severe thunderstorms today. The primary hazards are large hail and damaging winds.




A marginal risk for severe storms will exist this evening through early Tuesday morning. Storms will be capable of producing wind gusts up to 60 mph.

Thunderstorms are expected to develop Tuesday afternoon along a front in northern Oklahoma and move slowly southward during the evening, with a chance for mainly damaging wind gusts.



A new Flood Watch has been issued for Central Texas through 7 PM Monday where 1 to 3 inches of rain are forecast, with isolated (10% coverage) amounts of up to 5 inches. Flooding likely won't be as widespread today, but recent rainfall has worsened the flood threat. Remember, Turn Around, Don't Drown! Use extra caution at low water crossings & poor drainage areas and NEVER drive through barricades.



A Flood Watch has been issued through 7 PM Monday. There remains a threat of flash flooding from slow moving heavy rains overnight and through the day on Monday somewhere over the watch area. Difficult to pinpoint exact locations where isolated amounts will occur. An uptick in coverage and intensity of scattered showers and storms is possible overnight near the I-35 corridor and eastern Hill Country, developing west through the day on Monday. 2 to 4 inches of additional rainfall, with isolated amounts up to 10 inches, could fall anywhere over the watch area. Rainfall rates will be very intense in the heaviest showers and storms. Any additional heavy rainfall over hardest hit areas of the past few days will lead to rapid runoff and flash flooding. Stay alert for Flash Flood Warnings!

Areas of showers and thunderstorms will redevelop across parts of the area by sunrise and then spread west towards the Concho Valley and Edwards Plateau. The storms will produce pockets of very heavy rainfall in short periods of time. Where these occur, an additional 1-3 inches of rain is likely, with some areas exceeding 5 inches. This will quickly lead to flooding.





Fire Danger Forecast




Burn Ban




