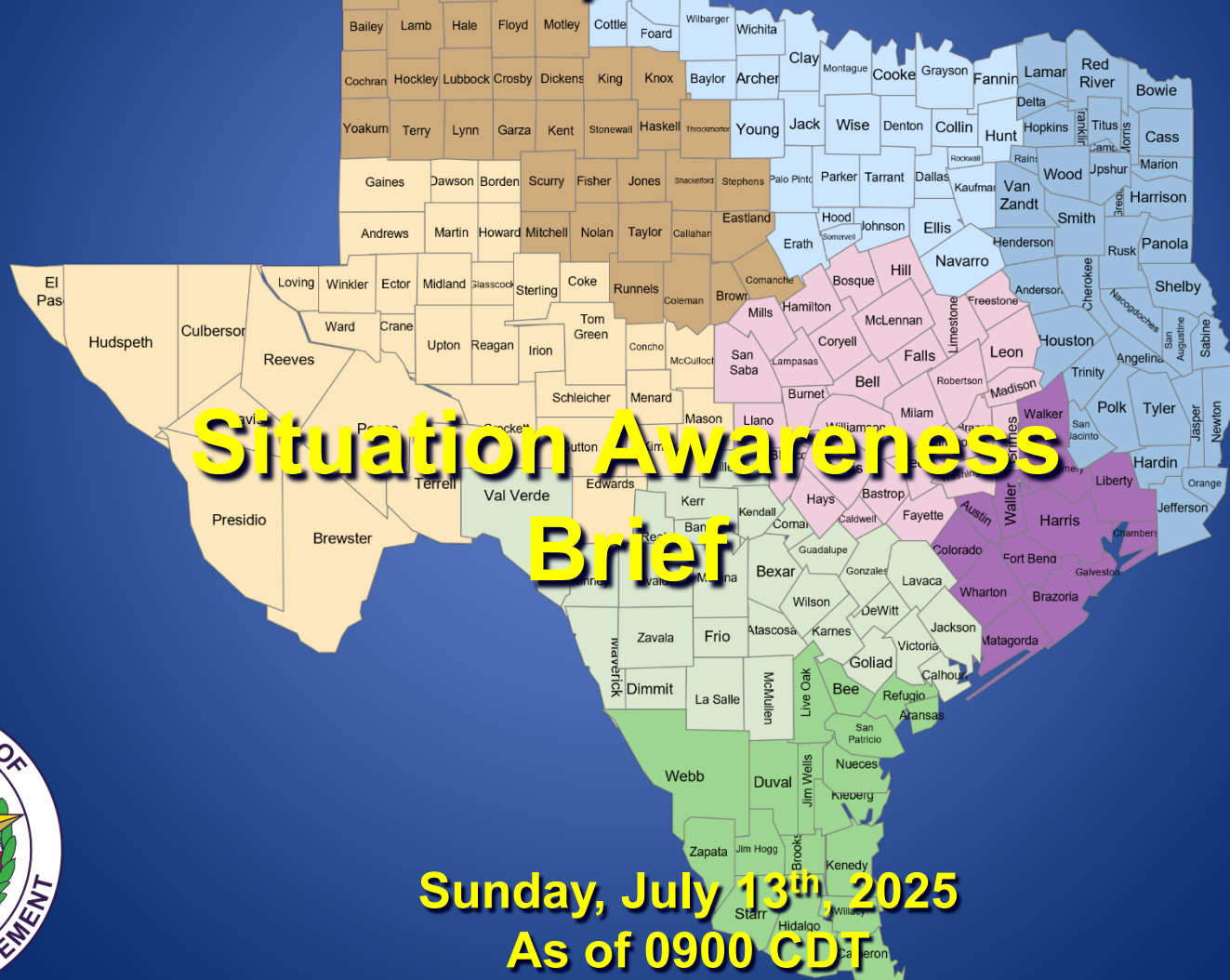

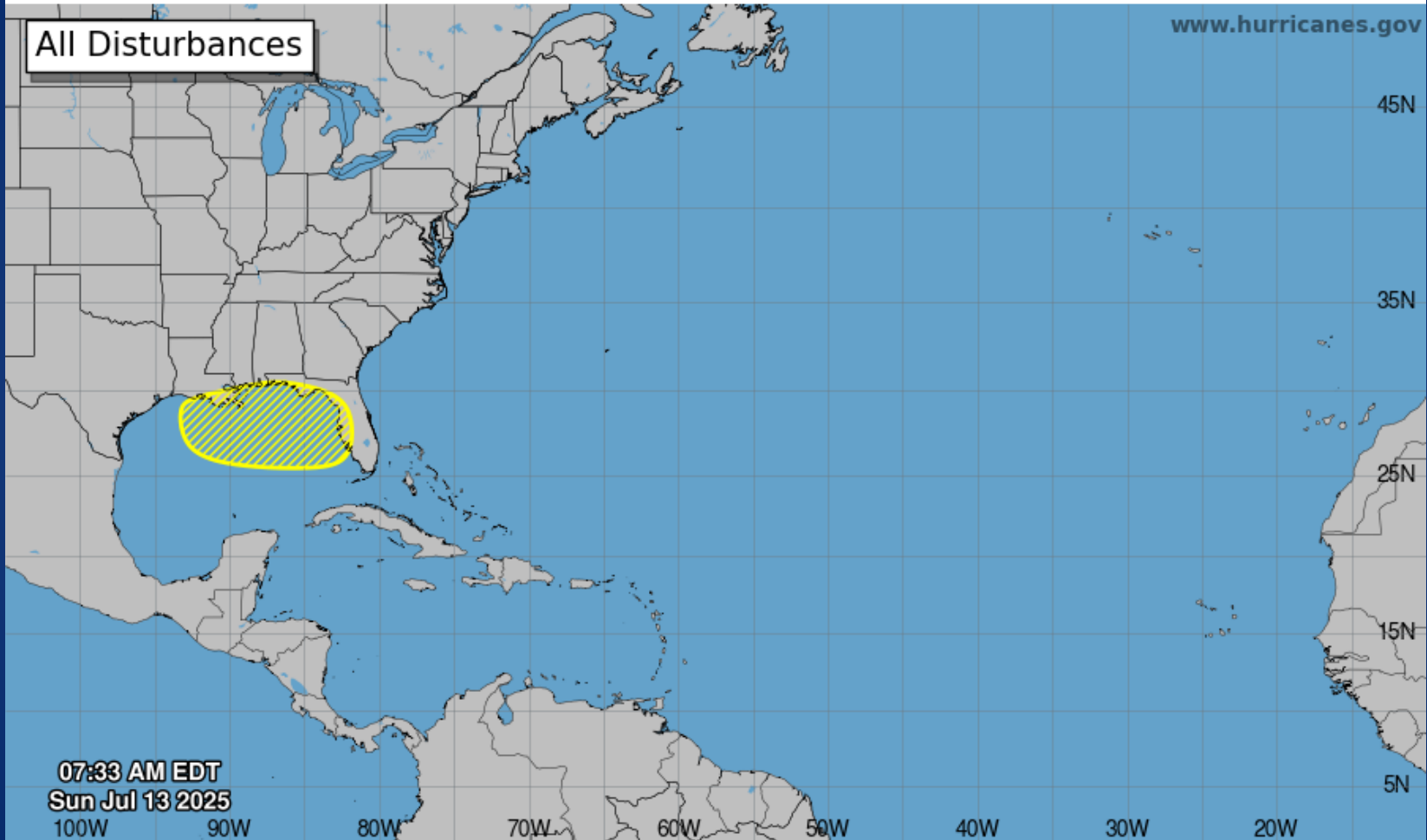
Seven-Day Graphical Tropical Weather Outlook

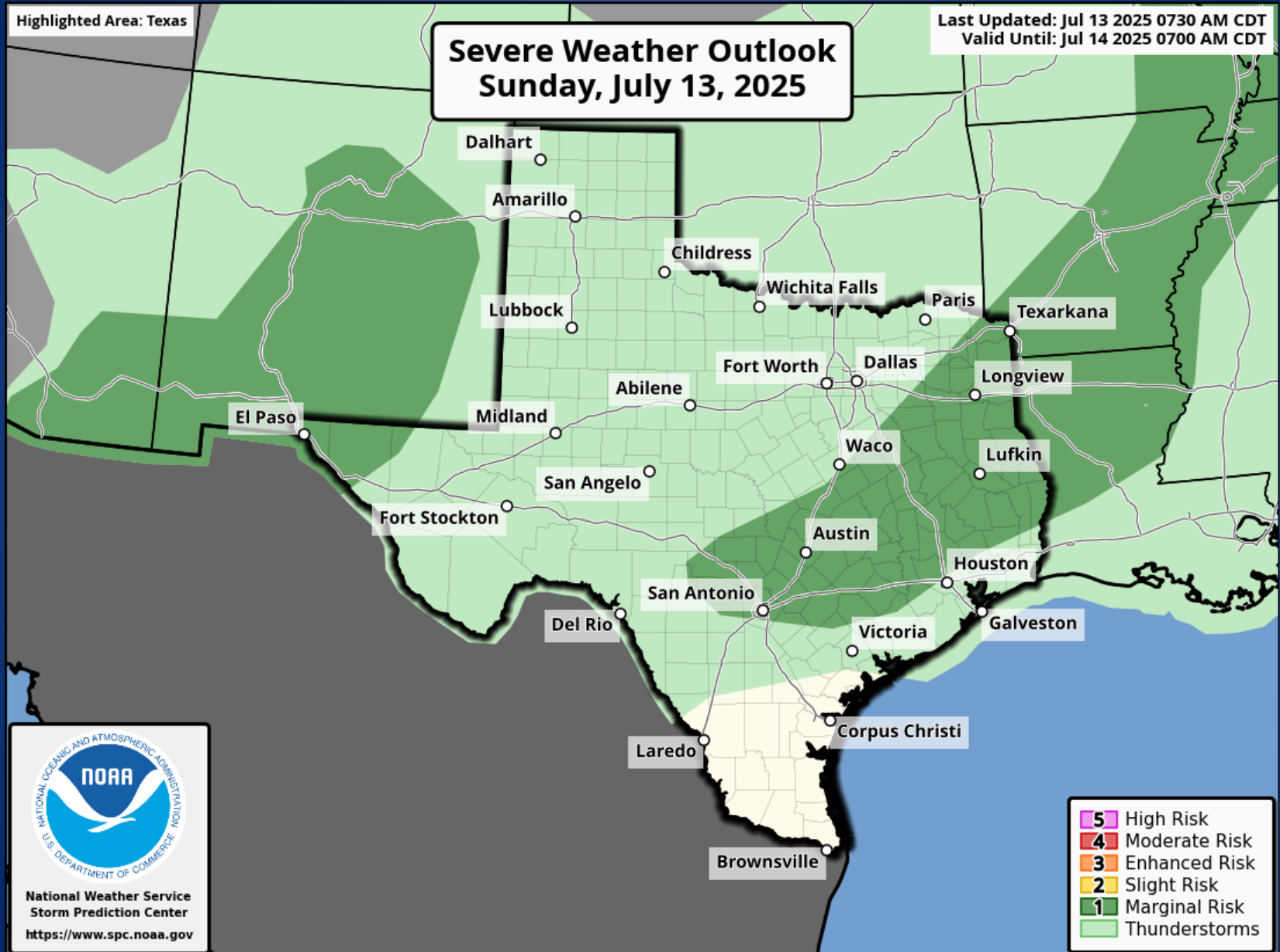

As further rounds of thunderstorms impact the ArkLaTex today, a few storms may become severe, with the primary associated hazard being damaging wind gusts.

Hazardous Weather



Scattered showers and thunderstorms likely today. Locally heavy thunderstorms capable of localized flooding are possible. Best chance of heavy rain will be across our northern and northwestern counties.




A Flood Watch is in effect for the Hill Country, Interstate 35 corridor and southern Edwards Plateau until 7 PM CDT Sunday. Rainfall amounts of 2 to 4 inches with isolated amounts up to a foot (12 inches) are possible.

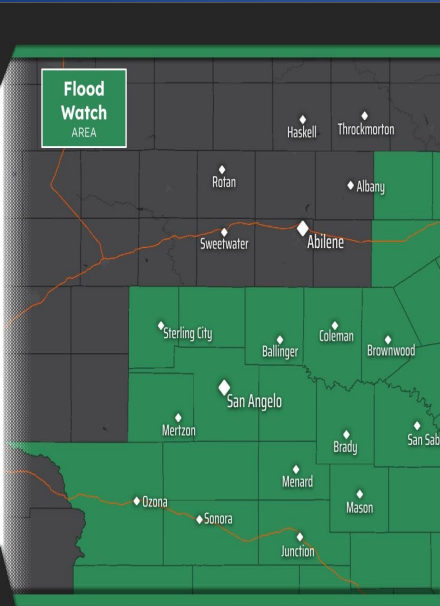

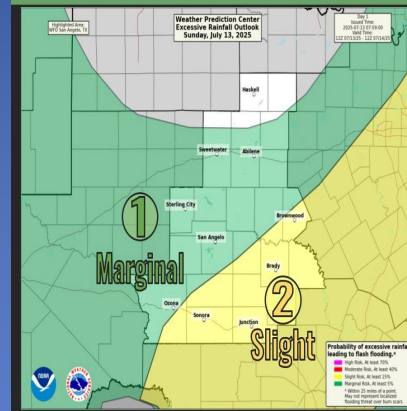

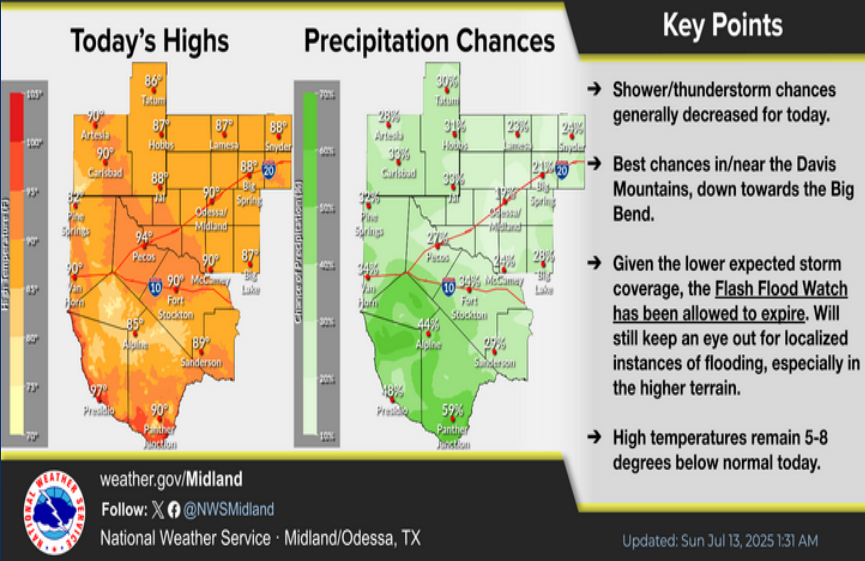

Still keeping an eye out for localized flash flooding



Rain chances have generally decreased across our area today as the main weather system has now been displaced further to the east. However, there is still a 40-60% chance of showers and thunderstorms in the Davis Mountains down towards the Big Bend, along with a 10-40% chance elsewhere. Localized flash flooding remains a concern, though the Flash Flood Watch has been allowed to expire.

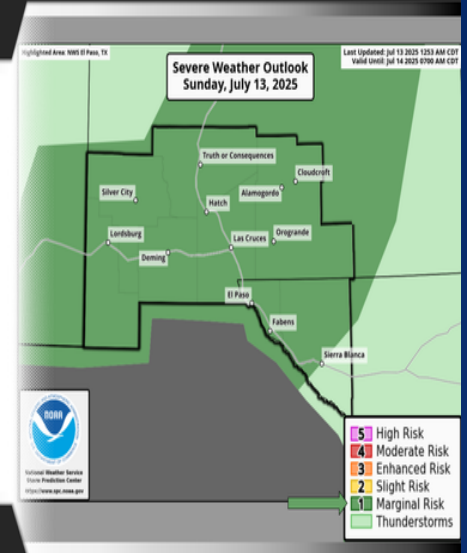

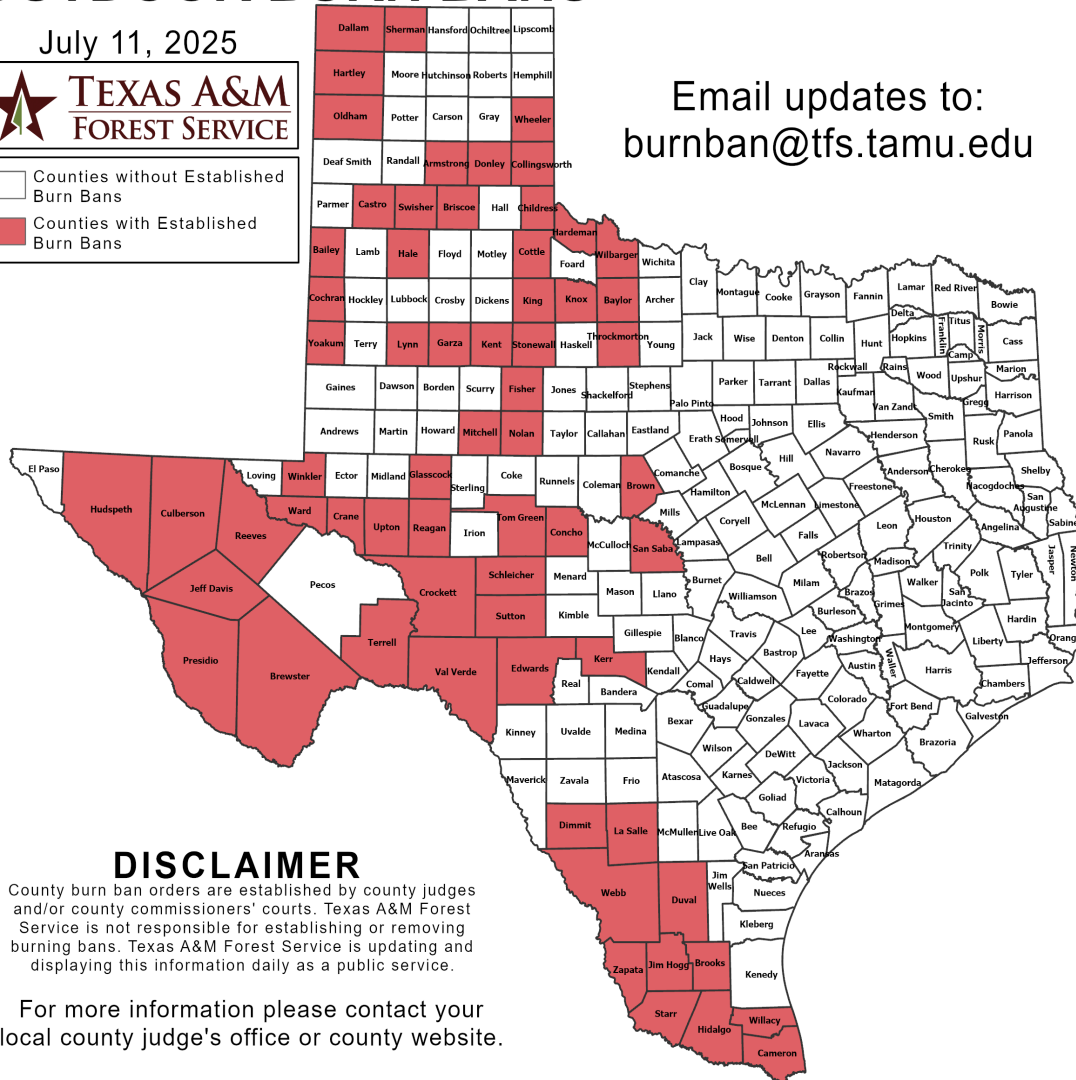

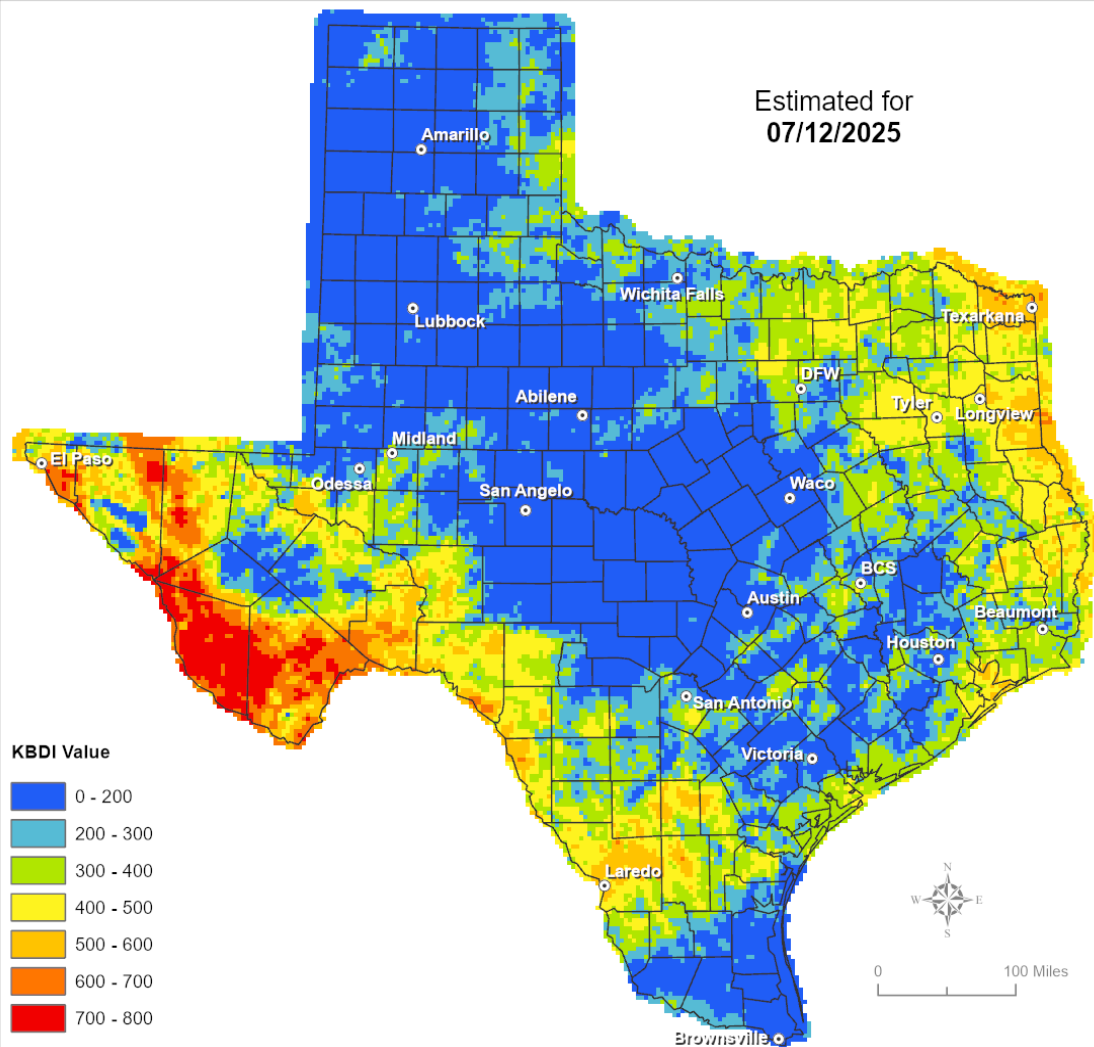

Keetch-Byram Drought Index

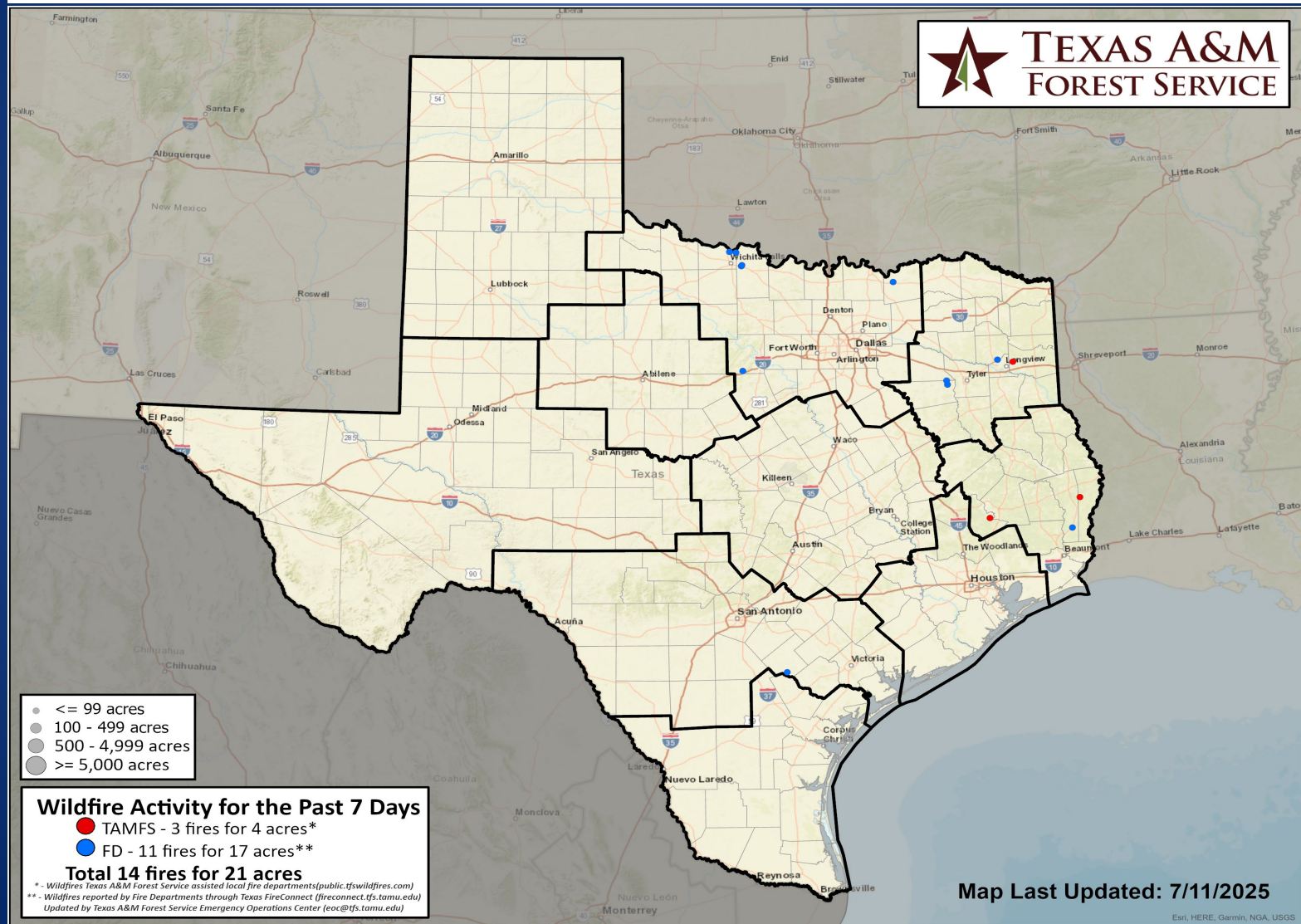
