Thunderstorm chances will continue on Saturday evening into the overnight hours. Some of these storms could be strong to severe, with damaging wind gusts up to 70 mph and large hail up to quarters being the primary hazards.



A stalled front will allow for additional showers and storms today across the region. Some of which could become strong with gusty downburst winds, localized flooding, and frequent lightning all possible. Areas north of I-20 and east of I-35 have the greatest potential for that localized flooding threat late this afternoon and tonight. Make sure to stay weather aware today, especially if you have outdoor plans or are on area lakes.

August 1, 2025 **Rain/Storm Chances Friday** 3:29 AM (i) Key Messages Ponca Cit Chance of Precipitation Woodward Enid 80 - 100 % Stillwat → Storms will be ongoing at daybreak 60 - 80 % across parts of central Oklahoma. 40 - 60 % These storms will move slowly 25 – 40 % Clinton southeastward during the day today. 15 - 25 % → Storms will produce cloud-to-ground lightning strikes and heavy rainfall. A few areas could see flooding of Ardmore roadways and small streams. seymour

Storms are expected beginning this morning and lasting through the day along and southeast of I-44.

 Plan ahead. Avoid driving across flooded roadways should heavy rainfall impact your area.









The threat of heavy rainfall is possible late Friday into Friday night and early Saturday morning, especially across parts of Northeast Texas where a Slight Risk (2 out of 4) has been highlighted. The remainder of the region is included in a Marginal Risk (1 out of 4).



Showers and thunderstorms that develop will have the potential to produce torrential downpours with high rainfall rates in a short period of time. This will increase the localized risk for flash flooding. There is a Marginal Risk (level 1 out of 5) Potential for flash flooding or between a 5 and 14 percent chance.



Locally heavy rain is possible late this afternoon and early evening from the Hill Country to the northern Coastal Plains. Minor flooding is possible.




There is a Marginal Risk of excessive rainfall over much of West Central Texas this afternoon into this evening. Heavy rain in short periods of time may lead to flooding of creeks, streams, rivers & city streets.











