- Stay hydrated and stay in a cool place








A MAJOR HEAT RISK is forecast for a majority of the populated areas of the Rio Grande Valley today.



A Flood Watch has been issued for portions of Central and East Texas through 7 pm this evening. Multiple rounds of heavy rainfall will result in isolated rainfall totals between 3 to 5 inches across the watch area. Remember - Turn Around, Don't Drown! Never drive through barricades, and use extra caution at low water crossings and poor drainage areas.




Sunday looks like a day of clouds and widespread rain showers and embedded thunderstorms across the Borderland. With more clouds and moisture in the atmosphere, we should see somewhat cooler temperatures. Some of the shower and storms may produce heavy rainfall and possible flash flooding across the region. Stay up to date on current weather conditions.



#### **Unsettled Weather Today Into The Labor Day Holiday**



#### **Key Messages**

- Scattered to widespread showers and thunderstorms are expected once again today as a boundary meanders offshore through Labor Day
- As the front remains near the coast Labor Day, rain chances will be more favorable over SETX and southern LA. Any cells that do develop, however, will have the same opportunity for heavy rainfall / high rain rates
- Some locally heavy downpours with high rainfall amounts in a short period of time may occur today into Labor Day, bringing a potential for localized nuisance-type flooding
- Decreased rain chances areawide can be expected by Wednesday. This transitioning pattern will result in offshore winds through the end of the work week

A slow moving frontal boundary will be a focus for showers and thunderstorms to develop through tonight., with some of these storms becoming capable of producing localized heavy rainfall. Some locations south of the I-20 corridor could see rainfall amounts of 1 to 2 inches, with locally higher amounts of 3 to 5 inches possible.






