FEMA Region 6 Weather Threat Briefing

• Flash Flooding:

• Slight risk (level 2 of 4) for SW TX today and for W-Ctrl/Ctrl/N TX, E OK, AR Thursday. Large swath expecting 2-4" with pockets capable of 6-9". Next round of potential comes Sunday into Tuesday for C/N/E TX, SE OK, AR, LA.

• Severe Weather:

 Marginal risk (level 1 of 5) for W/Ctrl/NTX, OK, SE NM, W AR this evening into tonight/early Thu. Low risk for tornadoes in SWTX this evening.

• Winter Weather:

 Snow (3-7") with minor travel impacts in N/W NM mountains above 8,500 feet tonight into early Friday morning.

• River Flooding:

 River flood potential for the TX Hill Country, the DFW Metro, Upper Sabine, and Upper Trinity in W-Ctrl/NTX today into Friday and again Sunday into Monday.







Note: Even though the image displays 5 days of forecasted rainfall, river forecasts only include 1-2 days of rainfall












Tomorrow's Tornado & Severe Wind / Hail Probabilities














