STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On February 17, Governor Greg Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to increase the readiness level of the Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) to Level II (Escalated Response) ahead of critical wildfire danger anticipated across portions of the western half of Texas.

On February 15, Gov. Abbott announced that he directed TDEM to activate additional state wildfire response resources in anticipation of elevated-to-critical fire weather conditions in large areas of South, West, and Northwest Texas.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties): [Disaster District Emergency Operations Center \(DDEOC\) 1 activated to Level II \(Escalated Response Conditions\) on February 18.](#)

Armstrong County: The 8 Ball Fire has burned 9,000 acres and is [40% contained.](#)

Hartley County: The Korn Fire burned 275 acres and is contained.

Hutchinson County: The Canadian Bridge Fire has burned 350 acres and is [95% contained.](#)

Lipscomb County: The Haystack Fire burned 106 acres and is contained.

Oldham County: The Lavender Fire has burned [12,000 acres and is 20% contained.](#)

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties): DDEOC 2 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on February 17.

Hale County: The Arbor Fire burned 127 acres and is contained.

Region 2 (Includes DDs 3, 4, and 22)

DD 3 – Wichita Falls (Includes Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Wichita, Wilbarger, and Young Counties): DDEOC 3 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on February 17.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

CCG partners continue to respond to issues resulting from the wildfire weather impacting portions of Texas. T-Mobile is tracking Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS); additionally, they have topped off generators and are deploying additional portable generators. Verizon's Network Team is monitoring to ensure sites with generators come online. AT&T FirstNet has one tower offline in Amarillo; however, the area is supported

by overlapping coverage and service has not been significantly impacted.

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) reports all DPS owned resources in the Panhandle have sufficient backup power & fuel for 4-5 days. DPS currently has no known power outages at their Panhandle sites.

The Texas Association of Broadcasters (TAB) reports that the KAMR (NBC) TV Station in Amarillo is on the air with low power transmitters running on generator power. In Hereford, KPAN-AM/FM is on the air and has backup generators at both the transmitter and studio. If they lose power, they will update via social media until transmission is restored.

Optimum Communications reports four broadband sites in the Panhandle have backup power and can remain operational during extended power outages. Two other sites are having backup generators installed.

Incident Support Task Force (ISTF):

Mass Care:

Monitoring continues for potential Mass Care activities over the coming operational periods. At this time, no requests for Mass Care services or coordination have been received. Partner agencies remain on standby and are prepared to support as community needs are identified and requests for assistance are made.

Education:

ESF 18 maintains communications with public university systems, who confirmed they are monitoring the weather and have no disruptions to their normal operations and no unmet needs.

Groom ISD, located in TDEM Region 1 (DC 1), is closed due to no electricity.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Public Works Response Team (TX/PWRT):

PWRT continues to support and coordinate operations from the SOC, monitoring requests for service.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

Disaster Assessment and Recovery agents and County Extension Strike Team members are on standby to support any ESF 11 efforts associated with animal

response or other winter weather response efforts as requested.

As of February 18, 24 Disaster Assessment and Recovery Specialists and three Area Chiefs are on standby to support ESF 11 wildfire response efforts. AgriLife DDEOC representatives are monitoring DDEOC activations in affected regions virtually and are attending daily briefings for situational awareness. AgriLife has one representative in person at DDEOC 1.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

TAMFS has pre-positioned heavy equipment, engines, and aircraft across regions impacted by elevated fire weather conditions. The Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is activated, and Texas Law Enforcement Telecommunication System (TLETS) messaging is underway. In addition, a targeted public awareness campaign is being conducted in the Panhandle region, including billboard messaging and coordinated outreach through local and regional news media.

In total, TAMFS has 681 personnel committed to the event.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):

DPS personnel in Lubbock and Amarillo Districts are actively monitoring weather and traffic conditions, with particular attention to high-profile vehicles that may be affected by high winds. Additionally, DPS Amarillo and DPS Lubbock are providing staffing support at their perspective of DDEOCs. The Texas Highway Patrol Chief's Office is also providing staffing support at the SOC. THP Troopers in the Panhandle are monitoring weather conditions and are ready to assist when requested. They are working their regular duty hours.

On February 18, THP personnel from the Amarillo District assisted with evacuations of citizens from an area in Potter County. Troopers responded to a fire near US-84 in Hartley County, 10 miles SW of Dalhart. Troopers assisted TxDOT with closing US-87 from FM-1719 in Potter County and FM-1913 SB in Moore County until visibility allows for safe traffic flow.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

TMD is supporting TAMFS in suppressing wildland fires in Texas. TMD has activated 33 personnel and three aircraft in support of 26-0001 Wildfire Season 2026.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):

Texas Game Wardens have identified resources ready to support as needed in

response to the increased Wildfire Threat affecting the State of Texas. TPWD Game Wardens are working closely with TDEM and other partners through the SOC to ensure resources are available should they be needed. [TPWD is staffing the SOC and activated DDEOCs in Lubbock and Amarillo.](#)

Texas Game Wardens have responded to multiple wildfires in TDEM Region 1 and supported local Law Enforcement with evacuations for the 8-Ball, Lavender, and Spade wildfire, along with supporting traffic control. [In total, TPWD has assisted 100 people to evacuate.](#)

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

[As of February 18, RM-1061 in Potter County is the only state-maintained road closure; it remains closed due to low visibility and blowing dust/debris due to active wildfire. At the request of TAMFS, TxDOT Digital Messaging Signs \(DMS\) were set to alert of elevated wildfire risks in identified areas.](#) TxDOT Emergency Management staff are supporting the SOC onsite during this activation. TxDOT Amarillo and Lubbock Districts began manning their respective TDEM DDEOCs on February 17. TxDOT crews statewide are patrolling and monitoring road conditions.

[TxDOT Amarillo District received a request from TAMFS for fuel and is providing fuel support for firefighters responding to the Lavender fire. TxDOT crews in the Panhandle provided traffic control for several wildfires this week.](#)

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):

DSHS provided an Emergency Medical Taskforce (EMTF) State Coordination Officer (SCO), and a DSHS Liaison Officer (LNO) for this event. The DSHS State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) is at limited activation and supporting the response. [The Panhandle Regional Medical Operations Center has activated in support of this incident.](#)

[EMTF has activated Wildland Fire Support \(WLFS\) assets for Statewide response. All WLFS Packages have been extended to March 6.](#)

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF):

[Four Wildland Fire Support \(WLFS\) Packages are activated and prepositioned in Alice, Amarillo, Hutchinson, Lubbock, and Merkel for increased Fire Weather conditions across the State.](#)

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC):

HHSC is actively monitoring the situation. HHSC began staffing the SOC in support of severe weather on February 17. HHSC staff will remain in the SOC for the duration of the incident.

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR):

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR) is monitoring the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this weather event have been identified.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

As of February 18, 2026, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller has declared an agriculture emergency for the panhandle and West Texas. The State of Texas Agriculture Relief (STAR) Fund has been activated to support farmers and ranchers affected by wildfires. TDA has 1 person manning the SOC and standing by to assist when needed.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD)

American Red Cross (ARC):

The American Red Cross is opening shelters where needed, identifying potential shelter sites in heightened risk areas, and rostering volunteers to respond to needs arising from the Fire Weather threats.

One shelter is open in Potter County with seven clients and one pet. One Temporary Evacuation Point was established in Donley County with five clients and two pets.
