STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On March 18, Governor Greg Abbott amended and renewed the Disaster Declaration for Bandera, Bexar, Burnet, Caldwell, Coke, Comal, Concho, Edwards, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Hamilton, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Kinney, Lampasas, Llano, Mason, Maverick, McCulloch, Menard, Real, Reeves, San Saba, Schleicher, Sutton, Tom Green, Travis, Uvalde, and Williamson Counties.

On September 15, Gov. Abbott announced that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) approved his request for a rural area disaster declaration for the catastrophic flooding that took place in July. The Texas counties included in the rural area disaster declaration are Coke, Concho, Kendall, Mason, and Sutton.

On September 11, Gov. Abbott requested an SBA rural area disaster declaration for the catastrophic flooding that took place over the July 4th weekend across the state. The counties requested in the declaration are Coke, Concho, Kendall, Mason, and Sutton.

On September 5, Gov. Abbott announced that the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) has received federal approval to extend the deadline for Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) applications relating to severe flooding that occurred over the Fourth of July weekend. Individuals who may be eligible for DUA now have until September 29, 2025, to apply for assistance.

On September 2, Gov. Abbott announced that at his request, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) extended the Individual Assistance registration period for Texans impacted by flooding that occurred over Fourth of July weekend. Individuals who live in qualifying counties now have until September 28th to submit damages and make claims to FEMA.

On August 20, Gov. Abbott announced that the federal government has updated President Trump's Major Disaster Declaration to include Uvalde County in response to a request from Texas following the recent flooding across the state.

On August 20, Gov. Abbott announced the Governor's Small Business Disaster Recovery Fair in Kerrville where he delivered keynote remarks. Texas continues to help communities recover and rebuild following the flooding in July. The Governor's Small Business Disaster Recovery Fair brought together state and federal agency partners and resource providers to share information, resources, and assistance for small businesses impacted by historic floods.

On August 12, Gov. Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to request that Uvalde County be added to President Trump's Major Disaster Declaration following last month's flooding across Texas.

On July 30, Gov. Abbott announced 10 additional Texas counties have been added to President Trump's Major Disaster Declaration following recent flooding across the state. Those counties include Edwards, Guadalupe, Kimble, Lampasas, McCulloch, Menard, Real, Reeves, Schleicher, and Sutton.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Mass Care:

Recovery efforts are being supported by the Long-Term Recovery Groups (LTRGs).

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

After January 31, 2026, Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) assistance will be

available on call to assist with any requests.

AgriLife continues to work with Texas Animal Health Commission and Texas Department of Agriculture on any unmet needs pertaining to agricultural or animal issues.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 1 (TEEX/TX-TF1):
TX-TF1 continues debris removal and search/rescue in the Guadalupe River Basin.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):
One TIFMAS Single Engine Resource consisting of three personnel is in Kerr County.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):
TCEQ has authorized 32 temporary debris management sites.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):
As of February 11, DPS is managing all resource needs through the local Kerr County Sergeant areas. Personnel are no longer assigned to specific static posts.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):
On January 29, all EMTF assets except for one ambulance were released for demobilization.

DSHS Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF):
EMTF continues to provide Force Protection during search and recovery operations. The total patient encounters during this incident are 93,010.

Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA):
Three subrecipient agencies are working on long-term recovery in the 21-county area.
