STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On May 1, Governor Greg Abbott amended the state's disaster declaration for severe weather to include Palo Pinto County following impacts from severe storms. With this addition, the total number of counties included in the state's disaster declaration is now four. Additional counties may be added as conditions warrant.

On April 28, Governor Greg Abbott announced that he issued a disaster declaration for three North Texas counties impacted by severe storms that continue to affect homes and businesses in the region. The counties included in the Governor's declaration are Lamar, Parker, and Wise. Additional counties may be added as conditions warrant.

On April 10, Gov. Abbott announced that he directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to activate state emergency response resources in anticipation of severe weather expected to impact multiple regions of Texas over the next several days.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.

4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties): Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 7 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 2.

Region 2 (Includes DDs 3, 4, and 22)

DD 4 – Dallas/Ft. Worth (Includes Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hood, Hunt, Johnson, Kaufman, Navarro, Palo Pinto, Parker, Rockwall, Somervell, Tarrant, and Wise Counties): On April 26, DDEOC 4 decreased from Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions). On April 26, Disaster Declarations were received from Parker and Wise Counties. [On May 4, DDEOC 4 returned to Level IV \(Normal Conditions\). As of 05/04/2026 The American Red Cross has reported that all shelters have been closed.](#)

Palo Pinto County: On April 28, an EF-3 tornado with winds up to 145 mph occurred in Mineral Wells according to NWS preliminary reports. Support local recovery efforts by donating to the Mineral Wells Disaster Relief Fund, managed by the Envision Mineral Wells Foundation, Inc. For Palo Pinto County, monetary donations are managed by United Way of Parker County.

Parker County: Six shelters have been opened in Parker County. The First United Methodist Church, Hilltop Family Church, Springtown Church of Christ, Legacy Church, and the Springtown Baptist Temple.

Wise County: Emergency supplies have arrived in the impacted area and are being distributed - Fixed site at 138 Port O' Call, Runaway Bay, TX - providing work gloves, trash bags, masks, shovels, rakes, and tarps. For Wise County, monetary donations are managed by United Way of Wise County.

Region 3 (Includes DDs 5, 6, 14, and 15)

DD 5 – Mt. Pleasant (Includes Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River, and Titus Counties): DDEOC 5 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness

Conditions) on April 24.

DD 6 – Tyler (Includes Anderson, Camp, Cherokee, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Marion, Panola, Rains, Rusk, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt, and Wood Counties): DDEOC 6 returned to Level IV (Normal Operations) on May 2.

DD 14 – Lufkin (Includes Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler Counties): DDEOC 14 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 2.

DD 15 – Beaumont (Includes Hardin, Jefferson, and Orange Counties): DDEOC 15 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 2.

Region 4 (Includes DD 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties): DDEOC 16 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 2.

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 11 – Waco (Includes Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone, and McLennan Counties): DDEOC 11 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 2.

DD 12 – Austin (Includes Bastrop, Blanco, Burnet, Caldwell, Fayette, Hays, Lee, Llano, Travis, and Williamson Counties): DDEOC 12 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 2.

DD 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties): DDEOC 13 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 2.

DD 23 – Killeen (Includes Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills, and San Saba Counties): DDEOC 23 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 2.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM): Sixteen Incident Support Task Force (ISTF) members are deployed to Wise, Parker, and Palo Pinto Counties to assist with EOC operations, damage assessments, donation management, and survivor services. While mass care partners remain on-site

for sheltering and feeding, no formal requests for coordination have been received. Mass care teams remain on standby to respond to identified community needs.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas A&M Task Force 1 (TEEX/TX-TF1): TDEM has authorized the complete demobilization of all TX-TF resources assigned to this event.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 2 (TEEX/TX-TF2): On April 26, Texas Task Force 2 (TX-TF2) completed their Wise County Search and returned to their pre-position location in Dallas County to monitor the weather. In total, 56 structures were searched, 27 of those being considered destroyed or severely damaged.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): TAMFS activated three Saw Teams in Parker and Wise Counties. There are 13 personnel committed to this event.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): TxDOT continues to closely monitor severe weather. As of April 30, no state-maintained roads have been closed due to severe weather. TxDOT crews have been working on clearing debris and downed trees from state-maintained roadways. Check DriveTexas.org for the most current road safety advisories.

VOLUNTEER ORGANIZATIONS ACTIVE IN DISASTERS (VOAD)

Southern Baptists of Texas Convention Disaster Relief (SBTC): SBTC is responding to the storms that struck Runaway Bay and Springtown area. SBTC Disaster Relief has provided 36 showers, completed 13 clean-up and recovery requests, provided 229 meals, made 170 spiritual/emotional care contacts, and provided 920 volunteer hours as of April 30. Assessors arrived in Palo Pinto and Johnson Counties on April 29.

American Red Cross (ARC): ARC is assisting with operating three shelter locations in Parker, Palo Pinto, and Victoria Counties. [As of May 4, there is a population of four clients.](#)

Texans on Mission (TXM): TXM has responded to Runaway Bay and Springtown. TXM appraisers and local volunteers surveyed the affected areas to assess needs. A chainsaw team was dispatched to Springtown, while the box unit provided support in Runaway Bay. The rapid response food truck delivered meals in Runaway Bay, and a

shower/laundry unit was deployed to Decatur to assist the Red Cross shelter in Springtown. Another tornado hit Mineral Wells on April 28 with a chainsaw unit and box unit responding the next day for assistance. TXM has performed 56 assessments, completed 27 chainsaw jobs, provided 48 showers, and provided 1,691 volunteer hours.
