

Note: Even though the image displays 5 days of forecasted rainfall, river forecasts only include 1-2 days of rainfall



Moderate flooding continues south of Vicksburg on the MS River. Points will continue to recede, outside of Baton Rouge that will remain at major flood stage through early May, with impacts mainly to agriculture and navigation.

- **The Bonnet Carré Floodway continues to operate and cresting conditions will continue at New Orleans, LA and Reserve, LA until the floodway is no longer operating. The USACE will slowly close bays over the next week as the lower MS River falls.**
- **The Atchafalaya River at Morgan City, LA will maintain moderate flood stage through next week. Some flooding of buildings possible.**

The Neches River near Alto will remain in moderate flood stage through Sunday. Impacts at the current level are to a wooded floodplain, boat ramps and picnic areas.




Space Weather 3-Day Forecast




