Current Situation: The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) is currently reporting a total of 191,790 cases of COVID-19 in the State of Texas which includes an estimated 91,752 active cases, 97,430 individuals have recovered from the virus and 2,608 confirmed COVID-19 related fatalities.

Across Texas, a total of 2,338,098 COVID-19 tests have been completed, which accounts for 2,071,809 viral tests and 201,782 antibody tests conducted.

On July 2, Governor Abbott issued an Executive Order requiring all Texans to wear a face covering over the nose and mouth in public spaces in counties with 20 or more positive COVID-19 cases, with few exceptions. The Governor also issued a proclamation giving mayors and county judges the ability to impose restrictions on some outdoor gatherings of over 10 people, and making it mandatory that, with certain exceptions, people cannot be in groups larger than ten and must maintain six feet of social distancing from others.

On July 2, Governor Abbott announced that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) will provide approximately \$182 million in emergency Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) food benefits for the month of July.

On July 2, Governor Abbott and the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) announced that \$2.67 billion in federal funding has been approved to support Texas hospitals that provide care for people receiving Medicaid.

On June 30, Governor Abbott and the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) announced \$9 million in federal funding for nursing facilities to implement infection control.

On June 30, Governor Abbott issued a proclamation suspending elective surgeries at hospitals in Cameron, Hidalgo, Nueces, and Webb counties to help ensure hospital bed availability for COVID-19 patients in these communities. This proclamation amends the Governor's previous

Executive Order to include these four counties in addition to Bexar, Dallas, Harris, and Travis counties.

On June 29, Governor Greg Abbott announced that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) extended the application deadline for the federal Pandemic-Electronic Benefit Transfer program (P-EBT) to July 31. It is a one-time benefit of \$285 per eligible child for those who lost access to free or reduced-price school meals due to school closures.

On June 26, Governor Abbott issued an executive order limiting certain businesses and services as part of the state's effort to contain the spread of COVID-19. This decision comes as the number of people testing positive for COVID-19, the number of hospitalizations have increased, and the positivity rate in Texas increased above 10%.

On June 26, Governor Abbott announced that the federal government has granted his request to extend operations of Community Based Testing Sites across Texas.

On June 25, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission enacted new emergency rules related to health and safety standards for child day care operations. These emergency rules include many of the guidelines from the Open Texas Child Care Checklist.

On June 25, Governor Abbott announced that the State of Texas will pause any further phases to open Texas as the state responds to the recent increase in positive COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations.

On June 25, Governor Abbott issued an Executive Order to ensure hospital bed availability for COVID-19 patients as Texas faces an increase in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations. The Governor's order suspends elective surgeries at hospitals in Bexar, Dallas, Harris, and Travis counties.

On June 24, Governor Abbott announced that the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM), in partnership with the Texas Military Department (TMD), will begin distributing 3-ply surgical masks to every Texan who undergoes COVID-19 testing at state-run mobile test collection sites.

On June 23, As COVID-19 cases rise in Texas, Governor Abbott has expanded the ability of mayors and county judges to impose restrictions on outdoor gatherings of over 100 people.

On June 22, Governor Abbot provided an update on Texas' continued response to COVID-19.

On June 16, Governor Abbott and Executive Vice Chancellor for Health Affairs of the University of Texas (UT) System John Zerwas, MD, provided an update on Texas' hospital capacity. The Governor noted that despite an uptick in positive cases, there continues to be abundant hospital capacity.

On June 11, Governor Abbott extended the Disaster Declaration for all counties in the State of Texas amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

On June 9, Governor Abbott announced that the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) is distributing additional cases of the antiviral drug Remdesivir to 85 hospitals across 34

counties in Texas.

On June 8, Governor Abbott announced that the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) is coordinating with local officials, public health officials, and emergency management offices in cities across the state to identify and rapidly expand COVID-19 testing in underserved and minority communities that have been disproportionately impacted by the virus.

On June 4, Governor Abbott announced that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) will provide approximately \$177 million in emergency Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) food benefits for the month of June in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

On June 3, Governor Abbott announced the third phase of the State of Texas' plan to safely open the economy while containing the spread of COVID-19. Under Phase III, effective immediately, all businesses in Texas will be able to operate at up to 50% capacity, with very limited exceptions.

On May 27, Governor Abbott and the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) announced \$3.6 million in funding for nursing facilities to purchase tablets, webcams, and headphones to connect residents with their loved ones during the COVID-19 pandemic.

On May 21, Governor Greg Abbott directed HHSC to expand COVID-19 testing to all patients, residents, and staff at the 23 state-operated inpatient psychiatric hospitals and living centers throughout Texas.

On May 15, Governor Abbott and the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) announced that local fire departments in Texas are partnering with local public health authorities to provide testing in nursing homes throughout the state.

On May 14, Governor Abbott announced HHSC has received more than \$3 million in federal funding to provide shelter and services to survivors of family and domestic violence during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Governor Abbott also announced that the Texas National Guard has activated Facilities Disinfection Teams to support Texans in nursing homes and to help limit the spread of COVID-19.

On May 13, Governor Abbott waived license renewal late fees that accrued between March 13 and June 15, 2020 for occupational licenses issued by the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR).

On May 12, Governor Abbott announced that HHSC has received approval from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to provide more than \$1 billion in food benefits through the federal Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) program to families with children who have temporarily lost access to free or discounted school meals due to COVID-19-related school closures.

Families with children aged 5 to 18 who received SNAP food benefits for the month of March, when school campuses first closed, will automatically receive P-EBT on their current Lone Star Card by May 22.

On May 11, Governor Abbott directed HHSC, TDEM, and DSHS to test 100% of residents and staff in Texas nursing homes.

On May 8, Governor Abbott announced that TDEM has applied for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Category B (Emergency Protective Measures) assistance funding to provide financial support to Texas' network of food banks.

On May 6, Governor Abbott announced that HHSC has received \$5.8 million in federal funding to provide crisis counseling services to Texans who have been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

On April 30, Governor Abbott announced that the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) has issued new guidance to unemployment claimants concerning their eligibility for unemployment benefits should they choose not to return to work at this time due to COVID-19.

On April 27, Governor Abbott announced the first phase of the State of Texas' ongoing plan to safely and strategically open Texas while minimizing the spread of COVID-19.

On April 24, Governor Abbott announced that TDEM and DSHS have launched an online COVID-19 test collection map to help Texans locate test collection sites within their community.

On April 24, Governor Abbott and the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) announced that Texas will provide HOME Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) to Texans experiencing housing challenges due to COVID-19.

On April 23, Governor Abbott announced that Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will provide a series of free online trainings to help local officials understand, acquire, and administer federal assistance available to the state of Texas and municipalities through the Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act and recently passed Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act.

On April 23, Governor Abbott announced that HHSC will receive nearly \$54 million in federal funds to support older Texans and people with disabilities during the COVID-19 response.

On April 22, Governor Abbott temporarily waived certain restrictions to allow Texas higher education institutions to transfer all unexpended student financial aid funds from the Texas College Work-Study (TCWS) program to other financial aid programs that do not have a work-study requirement to ensure students will continue receiving financial assistance.

On April 20, Governor Abbott announced that the Texas National Guard will be mobilizing more than 1,200 personnel as part of COVID-19 mobile testing teams (MTT).

On April 13, Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton filed a motion to intervene into a federal lawsuit seeking to stop the release of inmates from the Dallas County Jail, including killers, rapists, arsonists and armed robbers.

On April 9, Governor Abbott announced that HHSC has adopted an emergency rule to temporarily allow more nurse aides to serve residents in long-term care facilities during the COVID-19 response.

On April 8, Governor Abbott suspended certain statutes concerning appearance before a notary public to execute a self-proved will, a durable power of attorney, a medical power of attorney, a directive to physician, or an oath of an executor, administrator, or guardian.

On April 8, Governor Abbott announced that his Public Safety Office (PSO) will provide a one-time emergency waiver of the federally required cash or in-kind match contribution required for the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) and STOP Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) grant funds.

On April 8, Governor Abbott announced that Texas Health and Human Services (HHS) will provide more than \$168 million in emergency SNAP food benefits to help Texans during the COVID-19 response.

On April 6, Texas Health and Human Services announces Texas WIC, the special supplemental nutrition program for women, infants, and children, is expanding the number of food items eligible for purchase through the program.

On April 5, Governor Abbott temporarily waived certain regulations to expand the health care workforce to assist with Texas' COVID-19 response.

On April 3, Governor Abbott held a press conference to provide an update on Texas hospital capacity. Texas has increased by over 140% since March 18.

On April 1, Governor Abbott and the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) took initial action to provide tenant-based rental assistance for Texans experiencing financial hardship due to COVID-19.

On March 31, Governor Abbott announced the Comfort Food Care Package (CFCP) program to provide meals for at-risk youth and families in communities across Texas as the state responds to COVID-19.

On March 30, Governor Abbott announced that the Center for Medicaid and Medicare Services (CMS) (www.cms.gov) has approved the Section 1135 Medicaid Waiver submitted by HHSC on March 26, 2020.

On March 28, Governor Abbott waived certain regulations allowing for an expedited licensing reactivation process for Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRN) in Texas. The Governor also waived certain licensing renewal regulations for Texas pharmacists, pharmacy technicians, and pharmacy technician trainees.

On March 27, as part of the state's ongoing response to COVID-19, Governor Abbott announced the deployment of three National Guard Joint Task Force Brigades. The 72nd Infantry Brigade Combat Team, the 56th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, and the 176th Engineer Brigade.

On March 27, Governor Abbott waived certain Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) regulations to preserve and extend child care capacity for front line workers.

On March 25, Governor Abbott released a statement thanking President Trump for issuing a Major Disaster Declaration (DR-4485) for the State of Texas.

On March 23, Governor Abbott sent a letter to President Trump requesting a presidential declaration of a major disaster in Texas based on the continued impact of COVID-19.

Chief Nim Kidd has been designated the Governor's Authorized Representative and State Coordinating Officer, tasked with continuing his coordination with FEMA on all matters related to COVID-19.

March 20, The U.S. Food & Drug Administration (FDA) released an announcement that warns consumers about unauthorized fraudulent coronavirus tests.

Governor Abbott also announced that the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has included the entire state of Texas in its Economic Injury Disaster Declaration and granted access to its Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program.

On March 19, The Commissioner of the Department of State Health Services, Dr. John Hellerstedt, issued a Public Health Disaster Declaration in Texas.

Governor Abbott issued a proclamation suspending provisions of the Texas Election Code to allow political subdivisions to postpone their 2020 local elections.

Governor Abbott and TEA announced a collaboration with Local Education Agencies (LEA) on the Texas Students Meal Finder Map which will allow Texas parents to locate LEA facilities serving meals in their communities.

On March 17, Governor Abbott waived certain regulations and directed that the Texas Department of Insurance (TDI) issue an emergency rule, relating to telemedicine care for patients with state-regulated insurance plans.

On March 14, Governor Abbott, directed the Texas Medical Board (TMB) and the Texas Board of Nursing (TBN) to fast-track the temporary licensing of out-of-state physicians, physician assistants, certain retired physicians, nurses, and other license types to assist in Texas' response to COVID-19.

On March 13, the President of the United States Donald Trump declared that the COVID-19 global pandemic is a national emergency. On the same day, Governor Abbott issued a proclamation certifying that COVID-19 poses an imminent threat in the state and declared a state of disaster for all 254 counties in Texas.

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) Commissioner Sid Miller announced TDA has been granted flexibility from the federal school meal program to allow Texas schools to continue to provide meals to students even if temporarily closed.

Dimmit County: July 2 - Executive Order

- No child under the age of 18 to enter public establishments (exception: children allowed to accompany parents/guardians to dine-in restaurants)
- 24-hour curfew for children the under age of 18, unless under supervision of adult, parent, grandparent, guardian, close relative Monday through Sunday (exception for those adolescent children working at establishments providing essential services to the public)
- Mandatory use of masks and/or face coverings when entering any establishment, including all who operate the establishment.
- Outdoor gatherings of 101 or more are prohibited
- Indoor gatherings of 11 or more are prohibited

Faith Base Organizations. Services are streaming live.

Masks are required to attend services.

- St Michael Catholic – Big Wells - OPEN with limited parishioners
- Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic – Carrizo Springs - OPEN with limited parishioners

- Immaculate Conception Catholic-Asherton - OPEN with limited parishioners
- First Baptist Church – Carrizo Springs - OPEN with limited parishioners
- Grace of God – NOT suspending services, but limiting parishioners

La Salle County:

June 29, 2020 La Salle County issued an Order Amending and Extending Emergency Disaster Declarations in Place, Ordering:

- All Bars closed, curbside only.
- All amusement machines including “Maquinitas” be closed.
- Curfew for children 17 years of age and younger from 10:00 P.M. to 7:00 A.M.
- Home delivered meals for elderly will continue until July 31.
- Food bank will continue.
- Mass gatherings over 100 people will require a permit by the county clerk if the location is outside city limits, if gatherings are within city limits then that permit request would go to the City Secretary of the respective city in La Salle County.
- The City of Cotulla has imposed mask orders for all businesses, should the affected businesses fail to comply, the commissioners will set a meeting to address a request from the City requesting assistance in compliance

Val Verde County:

City of Del Rio: Amendment to the City of Del Rio Local Disaster Declaration ordinance, effective July 1, 12:01 A.M.

- While on business premises or other facilities, people shall not be in groups larger than 10, other than members of the same household, and should maintain six feet of social distancing from those not in their group.
- All public and private gatherings and public spaces are limited to an occupancy of 50 persons maximum effective immediately.
- TDEM guidelines published by the Governor’s office for indoor events still apply
- Outdoor events of 100 or more must still obtain local approval
- There shall be a juvenile curfew for those under the age of 17 beginning each night at 10:00 P.M. until 6:00 A.M. each morning, while any emergency orders are in place. The exceptions present in the codified Juvenile Curfew Ordinance shall apply
- Adult and Youth Sports, including camps and tournaments, are prohibited.
- The closure of San Felipe Park, Hogan Park, San Felipe Springs Golf Course, and Creek access including all adjacent parks with access to waterways; including prohibition of essential and non-essential physical activities.
- Playground equipment and splash pads in city parks are closed until further notice.
- It is strongly recommended that all people 2 years or older wear a face covering over their nose and mouth when in a public place where difficult to maintain six feet of distance.

Zavala County:

On July 3, The Zapata County Commissioners Court ordered that:

- A Curfew is hereby established for all areas of Zapata County from 11:00 P.M. until 5:00 A.M. each day and is to go into effect Friday, July 3, at 11:00 P.M.
- This order does not prohibit any person from leaving his or her home to seek necessary medical or emergency care, to engage in any service or activity permitted by Governor Greg Abbott's Executive Order No. 26, or any subsequent amendments thereto.

- Prohibits any outdoor gatherings in excess of 10 people, other than those permitted by Governor Greg Abbott's Executive Order No. 28.
- Events scheduled at all Zapata County operated facilities are to be cancelled immediately.
- The Olga V. Figueroa Zapata County Public Library is closed to the public,
- Public spaces of all Zapata County parks will be closed immediately. This order does not affect walking parks so long as social distancing measures are followed.
- Amusement Redemption Machine venues are to limit operating hours to between 8 A.M. to 10 P.M. daily. Venues may operate at up to 50% of their total occupancy, -provided that there is at least 6 feet social distancing between operating machines and minimum standard health protocols as identified in the Governor's Strike Force to Open Texas Checklist for Video Game Facilities is strictly followed. No smoking is to be allowed on the premises.
- Fourth of July festivities, including fireworks presentations are cancelled.
- The Zapata County Boat Ramp & Park and Bravo Park will be closed to the public for the duration of the Fourth of July holidays. This will go into effect Friday, July 3, at 11:59 P.M. and will expire on Monday, July 6, at 11:59 P.M. This closure does not affect private boat ramps.
- Any Person who violates a provision of this order may be guilty of a Class C Misdemeanor and subject to a fine up to \$250.00.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management Texas A&M University System (TDEM): The State of Texas State Operations Center remains at Readiness Level II Escalated Response Conditions, with Daily Operations staff processing disaster declarations, letters to the Governor, Disaster Summary Outlines, State of Texas Assistance Requests (STARs), as well as severe weather messages, preparing Snapshots and the state SITREP. The State Management Team (SMT) continues conducting operations in the State Operations Center, working together with activated members of the State's Emergency Management Council. TDEM District Coordinators are working closely with their local emergency management partners and various members of the public health community to assist with unmet needs and resources.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife): Texas A&M AgriLife Extension is leading an education effort to help with understand the CARES Act. AgriLife Extension will serve as an information conduit to ensure everyone who is eligible understands how to apply for federal relief funding. This educational initiative will focus on the following areas of relief: Treasury, Small Business, Homeland Security, Justice/Police, HUD, HHS, Health, Labor/Arts, Education, Agriculture, Food Programs, and Rural Development. The first training is available at AgriLife Learn (<https://agrilifearn.tamu.edu/product?catalog=TAEX-001>).

Thirteen disaster strike teams of Extension Agents have been activated to assist at the Panhandle, Coastal Bend, Border, CATRAC, SETRAC, STRAC, Piney Woods and NCTTRAC RACs. Teams are collaborating with TEEX and the military to support distribution.

Pony Express Team members made the following deliveries/retrievals yesterday:

- 21 bundles or pallets prepared at Armories
- 12 PPE deliveries to medical offices
- 31 PPE deliveries to Skilled Nursing Facilities
- 2 Deliveries of equipment
- 12 Pick-ups or deliveries of test specimen kits
- 2 Deliveries to MTT or QRF sites
- 7 Coolers picked-up from Labs
- 7 Coolers transported to Armory or TDEM Warehouse

Ten DAR agents received specimens at armories/airports from QRF collection sites after closing and transferred them to airports or reefer trucks to be taken to Austin for distribution to laboratories. Curative samples were delivered to Fed Ex by testing teams. DAR agents are coordinating with test sites to ensure deliveries of kits to the Courier. One agent delivered samples to DSHS laboratory.

Eleven DAR Agents worked alongside TEEX at RAC's Friday evening, assisting with receiving and distribution of Remdisivir to 157 hospitals in 45 counties over the holiday weekend. Deliveries were made Friday night and Saturday morning to Health Care providers.

17,522 face masks have been distributed as of July 1 to persons at high risk of contracting COVID-19 through the AgriLife Extension statewide Face Mask project. Masks are being made by 4-H youth, Texas Extension Education and Healthy Texas volunteers.

AgriLife Extension Agents at County Extension Offices across the state will be receiving PPE shipments from the TDEM Warehouse and will coordinate/assist with distribution of PPE for 3,168 Child Care Providers this week.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX): TEEX continues to coordinate operations from the SOC and the 8 IST Resource Staging Areas (RSA) throughout Texas in 10 distribution locations. TEEX currently has 33 personnel deployed to support ongoing response activities throughout the state in support of the COVID-19 response.

Current support includes:

- Two (2) personnel to the Remote State Operations Center (RSOC) in Austin to serve as a liaison TDEM SOC Operation Section and coordinate TEEX activities at RSAs (Armories).
- Two (2) personnel of TEEX senior leadership to augment State Operations Center and allow rotation time for TDEM senior leadership.
- Eight (8) IST is ranging from 4 to 8 staff per location based on current workloads.
- Located RSA (Armory) within the Regional Advisory Councils (RAC) areas to support the Department of State Health Services (DHS)/ESF-8 distribution of medical commodities to local organizations.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS): Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS) currently has 77 personnel committed to Covid-19 Response and is providing planning and logistical support to the Texas Division of Emergency Management and Texas Department of State Health Services. Response activities include Situation Reports, STAR Processing, logistical support for shipping and receiving medical supplies, incident management support, and Contact Tracing.

Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC): The TAHC is activated to support the state response to the outbreak of COVID-19. While official guidance maintains that animals are of very low risk for contraction or transmission of COVID-19, the TAHC is working closely with animal response partners to manage consistent public information messaging for how to deal with animals in context of potential COVID-19 exposure. TAHC has activated virtually to the SOC.

Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR):

TDLR extended their agency's current work from home initiative through July 31, 2020. Division directors have begun developing plans for some employees (up to 25% of the workforce) to return to the office. As plans are finalized, some divisions may be allowed to have some employees return to the office earlier.

TDLR reminds their licensees, particularly those in the medical and health professions that they must continue to observe sanitary requirements. Anyone seeking guidance about whether to continue providing services should contact their local health departments or county judges, who are authorized to make that decision.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): DPS Texas Highway Patrol (THP) is currently providing:

- DPS CCG Command Trailer has been made available to TDEM Daily Operations for off-site COOP. One THP Liaison is assigned to the SOC, One Sergeant, three Troopers are assigned to assist with the COVID-19 testing site in Dallas. Eight THP Troopers assigned to assist with the COVID-19 testing sites in Harris County. One DPS HSOC GIS Specialist assigned to assist with GIS efforts in support of COVID-19. DPS Troopers continue providing security to the Strategic National Stockpile (SNS) location in Dallas.
- THP continues to have a liaison at the State Operations Center currently assisting with "Pony Express" Rural COVID-19 Testing Sites by coordinating ground transportation of the collected samples for THP/CID to transport to the designated labs for processing.

- June 29, THP continues to have a liaison at the State Operations Center currently assisting with “Pony Express” Rural COVID-19 Testing Sites.
- **July 3**, DPS Aviation continues to respond daily to numerous requests for the statewide movement of supplies, test kits and collected samples in support of COVID-19 Air Bridge. **DPS Aviation conducted flights from Austin, Midland, El Paso, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, and Houston transporting samples from numerous collection points. Since April 24, DPS Aviation has performed 305 flights, transported 1,387 coolers of samples and have 946 hours of flight time.**

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):

State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) Activities:

- The SMOC is beginning to receive requests for staffing for hospital facilities due to increases in COVID hospitalizations. The SMOC is working to review and fill requests as appropriate.
- No Attestations were received from County Judges from June 22-29.
- A total of 1,330 LTC facilities have been tested by Rapid Assessment (RA) teams in response to the Governor’s orders to test all Nursing Home staff and residents.
- Due to urgent and immediate assistance requests for medical staffing, DSHS has deployed over 200 medical staff throughout Texas and is pre-staging 100 additional medical staff to fill anticipated immediate needs critical to life safety as COVID-19 case counts continue to rise.

DSHS Call Center Activities:

The Call Center has received 20,131 calls and 15,995 emails to date. Over the past 24 hours, the Call Center received a total of 197 calls and 206 emails. The Call Center is operational 7:00 AM – 8:00 PM every day of the week.

Regional Activities:

- Regional EPI Emergency Response Teams have been conducting daily monitoring of PUM/PUI within the Region in collaboration with LHDs.
- Mobile test sites have opened throughout the regions and are operating one day testing by appointment only. Status of mobile test sites can be viewed [here](#).
- All RHMOCs are at Full Activation.
- All eight HPP Providers have activated Medical Operations Centers and are distributing PPE to healthcare entities in the region.
- A total of 1,715 facilities have registered to use the Battelle system. A total of 26,453 N95 masks have been processed to date.

Texas Education Agency (TEA):

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (TX-EMTF): TX-EMTF currently has all eight EMTF Regions activated in support of the COVID-19 Response and continues to support the statewide testing initiative. EMTF is providing MISTs to the State Operations Center and within each region as part of a unified effort to provide mobile testing, test sample collection for all nursing homes, outbreak test sample collection missions in high risk settings (nursing homes, assisted living centers, large processing plants, etc.), testing site call center operations, and facilitating statewide laboratory capacity augmentation and result sharing platform.

July 4, TX-EMTF conducted 11 missions which included:

- 10 MTT Sites
- 1 QRF

TX-EMTF currently has 31 Medical Incident Support Team (MIST) members activated supporting Mobile Test Collection Teams, Rapid Assessment – QRFs, TX EMTF State Coordinating Office (SCO) SOC LNO and NCTTRAC EMCC. Additionally, 1 Task Force Leader and 4 ambulance strike teams (ASTs) are supporting 9-1-1 EMS response in Cameron and Hidalgo Counties.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): HHSC temporarily suspended non-essential visits to State Hospitals and State Supported Living Centers.

Texas Military Department (TMD): Texas Military Department (TMD) currently has 3,401 personnel in support of the COVID-19 Response. Two TMD General Support Units are operating in support of testing sites in Kingsville and Houston. Eight TMD GSUs are staging in Dallas, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Lubbock, Austin, Houston, El Paso, Weslaco and Tyler to implement the TDEM distribution plan to the RACs and have distributed 6,935 pallets. TMD MDCs are supporting DDCs in 2, 04A, 04B, 6, 7, 8, 12, 13, 14, 16A, 16C, 16D, 18B, 19, DDC 20 and 21 and DDC 24. TMD is assisting TDEM with warehouse distribution of PPE. TMD is supporting the North Texas Food Bank, the South Texas Food Bank, the East Texas Food bank, the Rio Grande Valley Food Bank, Harris County Food Bank, Tarrant County Food Bank, West Texas Food Bank and the El Paso Food Bank with distribution and have distributed more than 96.2 million pounds of food. TMD is supporting the State Operations Center. TMD is supporting Community Based Testing site operations in El Paso, Hidalgo, Harris, Cameron, [Kleberg](#), [Webb](#), [Jefferson](#) and [Atascosa](#) Counties. TMD has received more than 472,388 calls at the TMD COVID-19 call center, and assisted with testing 263,248 people. TMD is supporting the disinfection of nursing homes. TMD has disinfected a total 4,814,778 square feet. TMD is supporting TDEM Critical Information Systems with data compilation and STAR repositioning. TDEM is supporting the Department of State Health Services by tracking PPE distribution to health care facilities.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD is monitoring the COVID-19 situation closely and making agency adjustments based on the DSHS and CDC guidelines to ensure the health and safety of employees, volunteers, and the public visiting TPWD facilities. TPWD LE has assigned personnel to the Caldwell County EOC as a PIO. TPWD continues to have personnel assigned to the SOC to serve as liaison officers.

- Texas Game Wardens are continuing to assist with the “Pony Express” Rural COVID-19 Testing sites by providing ground transportation. Since the start of “Pony Express” Texas Game Wardens have assisted with the delivery of samples from 627 testing sites from 228 counties.
- TPWD Aviation has performed 22 flight missions to assist with the transportation of 97 various sized coolers containing COVID-19 test samples. Along with test samples TPWD Aviation has been assisting with the delivery of sample kits to be distributed to different test site locations throughout the state.

- TPWD continues to have two representatives at the State Operations Center coordinating the transportation efforts related to the COVID-19 rural testing sites and is liaison officers between TPWD, TDEM and other Federal, State, and Local partners.
- TPWD has assigned personnel working in DDC4B as a liaison with planning, logistics, meetings and scheduling related to COVID-19 response and testing. While assigned personnel assists with all coordination with any local transportation issues that may arise in the TDEM Region 1.

Texas Wing - Civil Air Patrol (CAP): Texas Wing CAP continues to use aircraft, on a nightly basis, flying samples to Austin from around the state for analysis. Ground teams continue to provide intake services for a USDA Farm Food Distribution POD in Greenville TX and site security in Harris County.
