STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: Tropical Depression Hanna continued to move west through Northern Mexico Monday. Scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected through the overnight hours as high moisture levels remain in the wake of Hanna. Any heavier showers and thunderstorms could result in an additional 1 to 2 inches of rain and isolated flash flooding. As a result, the Flash Flood Watch has been extended through the early pre-dawn hours of Tuesday. Flood warnings and advisories continue through the South Texas region.

On July 26, Governor Abbott announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and President Trump have granted a Federal Emergency Declaration (EM-3530) request for Public Assistance Category B (Emergency Protective Measures). Specifically, FEMA is authorized to provide emergency protective measures (Category B), limited to direct Federal assistance and reimbursement for mass care including evacuation and shelter support at 75 percent federal funding.

On July 25, Governor Abbott held a press conference at the Alternate State Operations Center in Austin where he provided an update on the state's response to Hurricane Hanna. Prior to the press conference, the Governor received a weather briefing on Hurricane Hanna from the Texas Division of Emergency Management's (TDEM) meteorologist, as well as an update on response and preparedness efforts from state agency directors and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

The Governor issued the disaster declaration for Aransas, Bee, Bexar, Brazoria, Brooks, Calhoun, Cameron, Dimmit, Duval, Fort Bend, Galveston, Goliad, Harris, Hidalgo, Jackson, Jim Hogg, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, La Salle, Live Oak, Matagorda, McMullen, Nueces, Refugio, San Patricio, Starr, Victoria, Webb, Wharton, Willacy, and Zapata counties. The declaration

provides the Governor, the ability to waive statutes or administrative rules that may hinder the response or recovery, as well as the ability to ask for federal assistance in response to Hurricane Hanna.

Weather: (NWS Brownsville) An elevated risk of rip currents is possible at the local beaches throughout the entire forecast period. Additional heavy rainfall and isolated flash flooding will be possible Tuesday and Wednesday.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 3 (Includes DDCs 19, 20, 21, and 24)

DDC 20 – Corpus Christi (Includes: Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio and San Patricio Counties)

[DDC 20 lowered its activation level to Readiness Level III \(Virtual\) Increased Readiness Conditions at 6:00 PM Monday, July 27 to continue to support Hurricane Hanna recovery efforts.](#)

[There have been no reports of injuries or deaths throughout the Hurricane Hanna incident in DDC 20. There are no reported hospital issues, or reports of damage to hospitals in DDC 20.](#)

[Initial damage assessment of Kleberg and Nueces counties showed the areas of concern to be Baffin Bay, Loyola Beach, Ricardo, and Riviera. These areas had minimal localized damage.](#)

[Aransas, Kenedy, Kleberg, Nueces and San Patricio Counties have reported erosion and damage to coastal roads, piers, docks and pilings and tee heads due to storm surge. Counties and cities are beginning damage assessments and debris removal.](#)

[Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties state that they currently have no unmet needs. Efforts are shifting from response and focusing on recovery.](#)

Brooks County: [EMC reported that the community of Encino was the hardest hit, but have no unmet needs.](#)

Nueces County: Nueces County and the City of Corpus Christi will continue to temporarily restrict vehicular access to Bay and Gulf Beaches within Nueces County through Saturday, August 1, 2020, at 6:00 AM

Port of Corpus Christi: The Port of Corpus Christ is open with some draft restrictions.

DDC 21 – Weslaco (Includes: Cameron, Hidalgo, and Willacy Counties)

Cameron County: Power outages continue, half of La Feria has no power including the shelter Dome. Other cities experiencing outages are Primera, Palm Valley, Combes and South Padre Island. Roads are still closed throughout the area due to flooding and debris. State, County and City resources continue to be available to respond and assist with evacuation and rescue. De-watering operations have begun using local equipment and is expected to be supplemented by state pumps. One shelter remains open in La Feria. Brownsville and Harlingen EOC's continue to remain active. DPS aviation is conducting aerial assessments.

Hidalgo County: Texas Task Force 1, Texas Department of Transportation, and Texas Military Department along with local FD's and local PD's conducted 161 water evacuations. Patrols indicated the water is starting to recede in certain areas. Pumping operations have begun in the City of Edinburg. Local agencies are in the process of de-watering, conducting Search & Rescue operations and sheltering evacuees. State pumps are expected to supplement local efforts.

Willacy County: Power remains out for most of the county, with restoring estimates ranging from late today to Thursday. Communication is intermittent due to AT&T towers being out of order. Most of the roads are clear. TMD continues to stage resources in the city and county to assist as needed. DPS is conducting aerial assessments.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM), Texas A&M University System (TAMUS): The State of Texas State Operations Center remains at Readiness Level II Escalated Response Conditions, with Daily Operations staff processing disaster declarations, letters to the Governor, Disaster Summary Outlines, State of Texas Assistance Requests (STARs), as well as disseminating severe weather messages, preparing Snapshots and the State SITREP. The State Management Team (SMT) continues conducting operations in the alternate State Operations Center, working together with activated members of the State's Emergency Management Council. TDEM District Coordinators are working closely with their local emergency management partners to assist with unmet needs and resources.

TDEM Communications Coordination Group (CCG)

Amateur Radio operators in the storm path were alerted to the possible negative impact Hurricane Hanna could pose to local communications systems. Operators were encouraged to contact their local EOCs / DDCs / governmental and volunteer agencies and be prepared to provide emergency communications support if required.

AT&T FIRSTNET had pre-staged dedicated deployable network assets to provide cellular phone service to first responders in the impacted areas. These included Satellite Cellular on Light Trucks (Sat Colts) and Cellular on Wheels (COWs). Assets are staged, with additional national assets available if required.

Commission on State Emergency Communications (CSEC)

LRGVDC - Lower Rio Grande Development Council

FEMA Region 6- Coordination with FEMA Region 6 Regional Emergency Communications Coordinator was conducted to identify personnel and support available to Texas if required. FEMA Region 6 communications liaisons were on standby if requested.

Private Sector Communications Partners- The CCG private sector members have been alerted and are monitoring the situation and are prepared to provide support if requested.

Texas Military Department (TMD)- TMD provided an update on the status of the CCG workspace / EOC located at Camp Mabry. TMD personnel currently provide operational and logistical support for the space and are on standby in the event the situation escalates requiring CCG members to report to the CCG EOC.

Verizon- Activated their Global Crisis Management Team and they are monitoring Hanna at this time. They have both Network and Verizon Crisis Response Manager (VCRM) resources staged and ready to respond if requested.

TDEM Disaster Recovery Task Force (DRTF): The TDEM Disaster Recovery Task Force has three members who deployed to DDC-21 Weslaco to assist with damage assessments, volunteer and donations management, and Long Term Recovery Group engagement.

Damage Assessments

- **Rapid Damage Assessment:** RDA's and DSO's are underway. Multiple regional calls have been initiated for local tasking on data collection. DRTF staff facilitated training for the data collection platform, supported the mission logistically with devices and coordinated with on-site TXTF1 and TMD responders for support. DRTF teams will deploy to Willacy, Cameron, Kleberg, and Hidalgo Counties.
- **Drone Damage Assessment:** Several agencies are already conducting flight operations related to drone data collection. Attempting to coordinate with TPW and other agencies related to collection of data for hardest impact areas.

Disaster Finance: Disaster Finance Coordinator contacted all local jurisdictions to provide information on:

- Submission of Local Letter of Declaration and the Letter to the Governor.
- To start tracking Costs for this new event – remember to track these costs using the new Incident Number which is 20-0012 July Tropical Weather 2020073.

PIO Activity: Developed and distributed reports for the region-wide self-reporting damage assessment survey to all local jurisdictions and partner agencies

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) Texas Task Force – One (TX-TF1):

TX-TF1 ESF-9 Operations is located at the SOC and is staffed for 24-hour operations at Level III. All TX-TF1 Urban Search and Rescue (US&R) resources are staged and standing by for response.

- Texas A&M Task Force 1 (TX-TF1) Swift Water Rescue (SWR) Boat teams, rescued 3 people (80 year old male, elderly female, and a 47 year old male) from their sail boat at the marina located at 1400 Ocean Drive, Corpus Christi.
- Deployed TX-TF1 Search and Rescue Resources are staged and ready to respond. 6-TX-TF1 SWR Boat Squads on standby locations with 2-SWR Managers
- 1 – TX-TF1 US&R Type 1 (w/6 water boats, w/1 HPV, Type 1 Equipment Cache).
- 6 - TX-TF1 SWR Boat Squads with 5- TX-DOT HPVs (10 TX-DOT Personnel) in coordination have evacuated 160 people and 16 pets, and checked on 3 shelter in place within Hidalgo County. Evacuees were taken to a collection point managed by AHJ, then bussed to shelters July 26.
- July 28, Tx-TF1 is tasked to set-up Federal Medical Station (FMS) at McAllen Convention Center.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS) TFS currently has 13 personnel committed to Hurricane Hanna Response and is providing planning and logistical support to the Texas Division of Emergency Management. Response activities include Situation Reports, STAR Processing, and Resource Tracking of pumps and generators.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ): TCEQ staff continue to contact public drinking water systems (PWS) and wastewater treatment facilities (WWTF) that are located in the impacted areas to determine their operational status. As contact is made with these systems, TCEQ will provide operational assistance and technical guidance, as needed. Currently the following systems have reported issues:

Public Drinking Water Systems (PWS):

- Port Mansfield PWS reported a leak in one of their water storage tanks.
- City of Raymondville, City of Rio Hondo, and the City of Harlingen reported that their public water system are operating on generators.
- Sharyland Water Supply Corporation three plants were damaged but operational, TCEQ is currently working with TDEM to provide assistance.

Wastewater Treatment Facilities (WWTF):

- Port Mansfield collection system is operating on generators
- City of Hidalgo, City of San Juan, City of Weslaco, Military Highway WSC (Joines Road), Military Highway WSC (Santa Maria), San Isidro ISD, City of Donna, City of Elsa, City of La Grulla, City of Raymondville, City of La Feria and City of Los Fresnos reported that they are operating on generators.

Additional drinking water systems and wastewater treatment facilities that may have been impacted or operating on generator power may be added as staff continue to communicate with facility personnel for assessments.

TCEQ Corpus Christi Regional Office evaluated potential impacts to the industrial facilities and refineries (in San Patricio County, the Kingsville area, and the Corpus Christi's Refinery Row) by conducting air monitoring reconnaissance investigations using Rae equipment and visual observations. No issues were noted.

TCEQ Harlingen Regional Office will begin calling Type 1 landfills for operational status.

Staff are also available to provide guidance on debris management and available to review and authorize temporary debris management sites, as needed.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): Texas Department of Public Safety Aviation has rostered and staged resources (helicopter with hoist capabilities) in Houston and San Antonio to respond to areas impacted by Tropical Storm Hanna. THP Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has rostered and staged resources (shallow water boats, swift water boats) in Weslaco, Rockport, and Port Lavaca to assist with water rescues. Dive Recovery Teams are staged across Texas for any emergency response. They have two hoist operators/rescue swimmers on call to deploy with DPS Aircraft when mobilized. DPS personnel in South Texas Region patrolling area of responsibility and monitoring storm.

- DPS Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) and the Dive Recovery Team (DRT) conducted reconnaissance and drone operations in the RGV area in response to Tropical Storm Hanna.
- DPS Aviation 107 in response to Tropical Storm Hanna conducted an aerial reconnaissance flight in the following areas: Corpus Christi, Kingsville, Port Mansfield, Raymondville, Harlingen, Mid Valley and Mission.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS has worked to get Alternate Care Sites established recently for COVID-19 response.

State-Operated Medical Shelters

- Freeman Coliseum (San Antonio)
- Hotel in Pharr, TX Ready to receive patients

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF): EMTF has 4 severe weather packages on standby. A Severe Weather Package includes: [1] Task Force Leader; [1] Medical Incident Support Team; [1] AMBUS; [1] Ambulance Strike Team.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS): TFS currently has 13 personnel committed to Hurricane Hanna Response and is providing planning and logistical support to the Texas Division of

Emergency Management. Response activities include Situation Reports, STAR Processing, and Resource Tracking of pumps and generators

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): TxDOT is monitoring roads for flooding, clearing debris, and making repairs as needed. TxDOT is prepared to assist with High Profile Vehicles. TxDOT is working to fill incoming STAR requests. [TxDOT has a total of 51 roads affected by flooding with 14 of those roads closed.](#) 5 HPV teams have been assigned to support neighborhood evacuations in the Mission area. [5 additional HPV teams rostered in Laredo.](#) [20 HPV teams in Houston and Waco have been released.](#) TxDOT is assisting the City of Port Mansfield.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): HHSC is reporting a power outage at a state run behavioral/mental health hospital in the Rio Grande Valley. COVID units at the hospital do not have HVAC or Negative Pressure capability on generator. Hospital is on generator with limited coverage. Crews are onsite trying to restore power. More details will be included in the morning hospital report.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD currently has 90 personnel and 27 vehicles in support of the July Tropical Weather Response. TMD is supporting DDC-20 and 21 with Military District Coordinators. TMD is supporting TX-TF1 with high profile vehicles. TMD is supporting the Rio Grande Valley with shelter teams.

Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPWD): [TPWD continues to have resources consisting of Texas Game Wardens and State Parks Police Officers equipped with swift water boats, shallow water boats to support Cameron County and Hidalgo County with boat rescue and evacuation operations available in areas affected by Hurricane Hanna.](#) [TPWD deployed an Unmanned Aircraft System \(UAS\) team to Cameron and Willacy Counties to assist with damage assessment from Hurricane Hanna.](#) [The team includes 4 drone operators and 4 drones.](#)

Mission Information and Details

- TPWD has rostered Texas Game Wardens and State Park Police Officers ahead of Hurricane Hanna's landfall and is prepared to respond to areas affected by Hurricane Hanna to support boat rescue operations as needed.
- TPWD is also prepared to respond to areas affected by Hurricane Hanna with a Helicopter equipped with a hoist and rescue swimmer to support
- TPWD LE continues manning its disaster district chairperson seat at DDC 21 Weslaco daily.
- TPWD Marine Tactical Operations Group (MTOG) in Weslaco assisted with the evacuation of a family of 5 from their residence that was flooded due to Hurricane Hanna.
- TPWD Marine Tactical Operations Group (MTOG) and State Parks Police officers evacuated 14 adults, 4 juveniles, 3 infants, and 4 pets from a flooded multi-family residential community in Hidalgo County.
- TPWD Game Wardens stationed in the Rio Grande Valley evacuated 10 adults and 6 pets from flooded homes and rescued 12 adults from submerged vehicles in Hidalgo County.

Texas Public Utilities Commission (PUC): [As of 3:00 PM Monday afternoon AEP had approximately 53,000 without power and 1,600 personnel working on restoration.](#) [AEP hopes to provide regional estimated times of restoration Monday evening.](#)

Magic Valley Electrical Co-op is reporting just under 19,000 without power at this time. They have 2 sub-stations which may not be able to be re-energized until later this week, however they are exploring back feed options to potentially restore power to customers affected by these stations prior to them being re-energized.

AEP Press Release, Monday, July 27, at 5 PM provided the following: AEP Texas has restored electricity to 74 percent of all customers left without power after Hurricane Hanna made landfall last Saturday. Crews continue to encounter severe flooding, high waters and other hazards that may slow the restoration effort in some areas. Various staging areas with replacement construction material have been activated as part of the restoration process; and 2,350 resources are being dedicated to the restoration effort. In the Rio Grande Valley, road closures due to severe flooding conditions are affecting the restoration.

Outages and Estimated Times of Restoration (ETRs)

As of 5 p.m., the number of outages in the Corpus Christi, Rio Grande Valley and Laredo areas totaled approximately 50,600, down from 200,000 Sunday morning. Some of the largest concentrations of outages include:

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster (VOADs)

There are currently 5 shelters with a total of 96 occupants.

The Food Bank of the Rio Grande Valley (FBRGV) does not have power to the food bank. The food bank is a priority on the American Electric Power (AEP) for power restoration. Feeding Texas has also informed TDEM - Mass Care of the issue.

- FBRGV also reported one agency lost its roof during the storm.
- Damage identified in Brooks, Kennedy and Kleberg Counties.
- South Texas Food Bank is assisting Starr County officials and VOAD's. No unmet needs at this time. Watching for additional flooding and coordinating with VOAD's to assist in operations.

The Salvation Army continues to engage and coordinate with local and state Emergency Management and other partner agencies providing food and hydration in the affected areas. 
