STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION:

On August 24, at the order of Governor Abbott, more than 70 members with the Texas Army, Air National Guards, and Texas State Guard with the Texas Military Department (TMD) have been activated and are repositioning throughout the state of Texas ahead of Tropical Storm Marco and Tropical Storm Laura. Additional personnel remain ready to respond in impacted areas as needed.

Multiple Texas Army National Guard ground transportation teams with high profile vehicles are currently moving to support local and state agencies. Currently, UH-60 Blackhawks and UH-72 Lakota air crews have been alerted at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport and San Antonio to assist with any emergency search and rescue or emergency evacuations. Additionally, Texas State Guard service members stand ready to provide assistance with local shelter and logistical operations in the affected counties.

"As Tropical Storms Marco and Laura approach Texas, the state is mobilizing the Texas National Guard to assist local, state, and federal officials in response to these storms," said Governor Abbott. "As the situation develops, it is imperative that Texans who live on the Gulf Coast and in Southeast Texas pay close attention to weather alerts and heed warnings from local officials. Property and belongings can be restored, but lives cannot. I call on all Texans who may be in harm's way to put their safety and their family's lives above all else and adhere to the guidance and warnings from emergency management officials."

"Storm season is always full of surprises for Texas and for our fellow states on the Gulf of Mexico, as seen in this instance by these two storms being in the Gulf simultaneously," said the Adjutant General of Texas, Maj. Gen. Tracy R. Norris. "We are pre-positioned to assist Texans in need, and to mobilize in support of our neighbors if requested."

TMD has trained for rescue operations in a COVID-19 environment has strategically placed personal protective equipment (PPE) with aviation assets around Texas. TMD will continue to work with local and state agencies by providing additional personnel and equipment as needed.


In accordance with 49 CFR § 390.23, the Regional Field Administrators for the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's (FMCSA) Southern and Western Service Centers hereby declare that an emergency exists that warrants issuance of a Regional Emergency Declaration.

On August 24, Governor Abbott announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and President Trump have granted a Federal Emergency Declaration request for Public Assistance Category B (Emergency Protective Measures). Specifically, FEMA is authorized to provide emergency protective measures (Category B), limited to direct Federal assistance and reimbursement for mass care including evacuation and shelter support at 75 percent federal funding. The Governor submitted this request yesterday.

On August 23, Governor Abbott held a press conference at the Alternate State Operations Center in Austin where he provided an update on the State's response to Hurricane Marco and Tropical Storm Laura, both of which are forecast to impact parts of the Texas Coast and East Texas in the coming days. Prior to the press conference, the Governor received a briefing from the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM), as well as an update on response and preparedness efforts from State agency directors and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Weather: (National Weather Service (NWS) National Hurricane Center NHC)

Post Tropical Cyclone Marco:




The NHC's last update at 4:00 AM CDT (0900 UTC), the center of Post-Tropical Cyclone Marco was located near latitude 28.8 North, longitude 91.2 West. The post-tropical cyclone is moving toward the west near 10 mph (17 km/h), and this general motion is expected to continue for the next day or so. On the forecast track, Marco should continue moving westward just offshore the coast of Louisiana until the system dissipates.

Maximum sustained winds are near 30 mph (45 km/h) with higher gusts. Additional weakening is expected, and Post-Tropical Cyclone Marco is forecast to dissipate by early Wednesday, if not sooner.

The estimated minimum central pressure is 1008 mb (29.77 inches).

This is the last public advisory issued by the National Hurricane Center on Marco.

Tropical Storm Laura:



At 7:00 AM CDT (1200 UTC), the center of Tropical Storm Laura was located near latitude 23.4 North, longitude 86.4 West. Laura is moving toward the west-northwest near 17 mph (28 km/h), and this general motion should continue today. A turn toward the northwest is forecast by Wednesday, and a northwestward to north-northwestward motion should continue through Wednesday night. On the forecast track, the center of Laura will move away from Cuba and over the southeastern Gulf of Mexico this morning. Laura is then forecast to move over the

central and northwestern Gulf of Mexico tonight and Wednesday, approach the Upper Texas and Southwest Louisiana coasts on Wednesday night and move inland near those area on Thursday.

Reports from a NOAA Hurricane Hunter aircraft indicate that maximum sustained winds have increased to near 70 mph (110 km/h) with higher gusts. Significant strengthening is forecast during the next 48 hours, and Laura is expected to be a major hurricane at landfall. Tropical-storm-force winds extend outward up to 175 miles (280 km) from the center.

The minimum central pressure estimated from the Hurricane Hunter aircraft data is 991 mb (29.26 inches).

Storm Surge: The combination of a dangerous storm surge and the tide will cause normally dry areas near the coast to be flooded by rising waters moving inland from the shoreline. The water could reach the following heights above ground somewhere in the indicated areas if the peak surge occurs at the time of high tide.

- High Island TX to Morgan City LA including Sabine Lake, Calcasieu Lake, and Vermilion Bay 7-11 ft.
- Port Bolivar TX to High Island TX 4-6 ft.
- Morgan City LA to Mouth of the Mississippi River 4-6 ft.
- Mouth of the Mississippi River to Ocean Springs MS including Lake Borgne 3-5 ft.
- San Luis Pass TX to Port Bolivar TX 2-4 ft.
- Galveston Bay TX 2-4 ft.
- Lake Pontchartrain LA and Lake Maurepas LA 2-4 ft.

The deepest water will occur along the immediate coast near and to the right of the landfall location, where the surge will be accompanied by large and destructive waves. Surge-related flooding depends on the relative timing of the surge and the tidal cycle, and can vary greatly over short distances. For information specific to your area, please see products issued by your local National Weather Service forecast office.

Rainfall: Laura is expected to produce the following storm total rainfall accumulations:

Rainfall will be coming to an end across western Cuba this morning with additional rainfall totals of 1 to 2 inches possible.

From Wednesday afternoon into Saturday, Laura is expected to produce rainfall of 4 to 8 inches, with isolated maximum amounts of 12 inches across portions of the west-central U.S. Gulf Coast near the Texas and Louisiana border north into portions of the lower Mississippi Valley. This rainfall could cause widespread flash and urban flooding, small streams to overflow their banks, and minor to isolated moderate river flooding.

Wind: Tropical storm conditions are expected to continue within the warning area in western Cuba during the next few hours. Tropical storm conditions are also expected for the Dry Tortugas for a few more hours.

Hurricane conditions are possible in the hurricane watch area along the Gulf Coast by late Wednesday, with tropical storm conditions possible by Wednesday afternoon.

Surf: Swells generated by Laura are affecting portions of Cuba, the central Bahamas, and the Florida Keys. Swells are expected to spread northward along portions of the west coast of Florida peninsula and the coast of the Florida panhandle later today and tonight, and reach the northern and northwest Gulf coast by Wednesday. These swells are likely to cause life-threatening surf and rip current conditions.

Current preparations for Tropical Storms Marco and Laura include:

- TDEM activated the Alamo Regional Command Center (ARCC)
- TDEM has ordered 100 buses to arrive at the ARCC.
- TDEM activated the state contract for fuel and hygiene services.
- TDEM Mass Care is working with VOADs regarding shelter capacity, feeding, and other support operations. Capacity to shelter 5,000 evacuees has been identified
- TDEM has packaging shelter sanitation kits ready for deployment.
- TDEM has relocated one tractor trailer of MREs to the State warehouse in San Antonio.
- TEEX has rostered two each Type 3 (35 person) search and rescue teams, pre-positioning eight swift water boat squads along the Texas coast, and has three high profile vehicles.
- TFS has identified saw crews to support response.
- TFS has identified incident management teams (IMTs).
- DSHS has activated EMTF severe weather packages.
- DSHS has activated 50 ambulances, staging manager, and medical incident support personnel.
- DSHS has identified two current warm status COVID ACS facilities that can be converted to medical shelters; one in San Antonio and one north of the Houston area.
- DSHS has alerted BCFS on the possible need to establish a Medical Shelter Task Force.
- TxDOT is standing by to help with any requests.
- TxDOT crews are prepared to respond to any highway condition related issues.
- TxDOT has identified 15 high-profile vehicles and crews to support.
- TxDOT has seven miles of water barrier as well as contractors on-call in the event flooding occurs on IH-10 @ Winnie to remove concrete highway barriers.
- TxDOT is staffing the SOC on a 24 hour basis.
- The following Districts have been put on notice for a possible response including the Austin, Brownwood, Dallas, Laredo, San Antonio, San Angelo, Tyler and Waco Districts. This would bring in an additional 120 employees for incident response.
- TxDOT is currently working through M-Sat checks agency-wide.
- TxDOT is checking IRAT plans to prepare for possible crew assignments.
- HHSC has activated the state ice and water contract.
- DPS-THP has rostered their marine unit swift water rescue teams (four boat squads; two in Weslaco and two in Rockport) and helicopters with hoist capability, as well as 1,000 Highway Patrol Troopers as needed.
- TMD has activated one Ground SAR transportation packages beginning Monday (08/24) and have identified available helicopters with hoist capability (three UH-60 in San Antonio and one Lakota in Austin).
- TMD has identified shelter teams and embarkation hub teams (ETN Teams).
- TPWD has activated their SAR shallow bottom boats and teams to support water rescue operations, an aircraft with hoist capability and helo rescue swimmer; 10 drone teams, and 100 Game Wardens.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

DDC 15 – Beaumont (Includes: Hardin, Jefferson and Orange Counties)

DDC 15 EOC activated to Level I (Emergency Response Conditions) beginning Tuesday, August 25 at 6:00 AM.

Jefferson County – Jefferson County issued a mandatory evacuation order for all residents.

Jefferson County submitted a Disaster Declaration on August 23.

The City of Port Arthur issued a mandatory evacuation order for the entire city effective Tuesday August 25 at 6:00 AM. Emergency evacuation operations will begin at 8:00 AM at the Port Arthur Civic Center.

Gulf Healthcare Center in Port Arthur, Magnolia Manor, and Senior Rehabilitation & Skilled Nursing Center nursing homes in Jefferson County were evacuated.

Orange County – Orange County issued a mandatory evacuation order for the entire county effective Tuesday August 25 at 6:00 AM.

The City of Bridge City submitted a Disaster Declaration on August 24.

Pinehurst Nursing and Rehabilitation nursing home in Orange County was evacuated.

DDC 16A – Houston (Includes: Chambers and Harris Counties)

Chambers County – Chambers County submitted a Letter to the Governor and a Disaster Declaration on August 24.

Harris County – City of Nassau Bay Mayor Mark Denman issued a voluntary evacuation recommendation for Nassau Bay’s most vulnerable residents including the disabled and those with medical needs.

DDC 16B – Texas City (Includes: Brazoria and Galveston Counties)

Galveston County: Gulf Healthcare Center in Galveston and the Meridian nursing homes in Galveston County were evacuated.

DDC 16C – Conroe (Includes: Liberty, Montgomery, Walker and Waller Counties)

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM): The State of Texas State Operations Center (SOC) remains at Readiness Level II Escalated Response Conditions. The Daily Operations staff continues to process disaster declarations, letters to the Governor, Disaster Summary Outlines, State of Texas Assistance Requests (STARs), as well as disseminating severe weather messages, preparing Snapshots and the State SITREP. The State Management Team (SMT) continues conducting operations in the alternate State Operations Center, working together with activated members of the State’s Emergency Management Council. TDEM District Coordinators are working closely with their local emergency management partners to assist with any unmet needs and resources.

TDEM Communications Coordination Group (CCG): The CCG has alerted public, private and volunteer sector partners to be on alert for possible communications response due the tropical systems threatening the State.

Amateur Radio operators in the storm path were alerted to the possible negative impact the tropical systems could pose to local communications systems. Operators were encouraged to contact their local EOCs / DDCs / governmental and volunteer agencies and be prepared to provide emergency communications support if required. Amateur Radio Operators are reporting to the local EOCs and the SOC, to provide support for ongoing communications operations.

AT&T / FIRSTNET has pre-staged dedicated deployable network assets to provide cellular phone service to first responders in the impacted areas. These included Satellite Cell on Light Trucks (SatCOLTs) and Cells on Wheels (COWs). Assets are staged, with additional national assets available if required. Additional backup generators have been installed at critical cell towers and switching facilities, essential equipment in flood prone areas have been relocated and the Network Disaster Recovery (NDR) team is on standby and prepared to deploy if needed.

DHS Cybersecurity & Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) has issued additional letters for essential workers supporting disaster operations. CISA requests any courtesy that can be extended to essential workers involved in communications infrastructure operations, maintenance and restoration.

Commission on State Emergency Communications (CSEC) has 572 Public Safety Alerting Points (PSAP) in Texas. CSEC is monitoring the status of the 257 Public Safety Alerting Points (PSAP) under their jurisdiction. The remaining PSAPs fall under the purview of the Emergency Communications Districts, which have local administration of 9-1-1 systems. CSEC is closely coordinating the districts regarding 9-1-1 status and operations.

Coordination with FEMA Region 6 Regional Emergency Communications Coordinator was conducted to identify personnel and support available to Texas if required. FEMA Region 6 communications liaisons were on standby if requested.

Multiple governmental and non-governmental agencies are testing alternate forms of communications, such as mobile satellite equipment in preparation for operating in areas that have experienced communications outages. Stations have begun conducting satellite test calls with the SOC. Test will continue through Tuesday August 25.

Sprint/T-Mobile is preparing for the impacts of the tropical systems threatening the Gulf coast states. T-Mobile's Business Continuity Office, National Network Disaster Recovery Team and Emergency Response Team (ERT) are coordinating response efforts. They are prepared and ready to provide data, voice and cellular solutions to organizations within the impacted areas and groups responding to the areas impacted by these storms.

Verizon activated their Global Crisis Management Team and they are monitoring the tropical storms at this time. They have both Network and Verizon Crisis Response Manager (VCRM) resources staged and ready to respond if requested.

TDEM Disaster Recovery Task Force (DRTF): The DRTF is engaging with local jurisdictions, providing financial guidance and discussing sheltering operations.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 1 (TEEX/TX-TF1): TX-TF1 ESF-9 Operations at the SOC is being staffed for 24-hour operations.

- Type-1 SAR Team rostered and activated,
- Type-3 SAR Team rostered and activated,
- SWR Squads and SWR Managers rostered and activated,
- Overhead Team rostered and activated,
- Beaumont Disaster District (DC-15) LO rostered and activated

San Antonio SWR Boat Squad assisted the Galveston Fire Department evacuate 47 people from Gulf Coast Health Facility in Galveston to a San Antonio facility.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS): TFS currently has 25 personnel assigned and numerous resources rostered to assist with needs relating to August Tropical Weather response. TFS is currently providing planning and logistical support, and other functional areas as needed, to TDEM and local entities. Response activities include Situation Reports, STAR Processing, logistical support for shipping and receiving medical and sheltering supplies, and incident management support. Additional resources are rostered and ready to assist where needed, including: saw teams, incident management teams, and TIFMAS boat teams. Additional resources are rostered and ready to assist where needed, including: one TFS saw team-10 personnel, one Type 2 IMT-12 personnel, and TIFMAS Engine Strike Teams and TIFMAS Boat Teams. Additional TIFMAS saw teams are also available.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ): The TDCJ established a command center on August 24, 2020, to monitor the impact of tropical storms Marco and Laura. TDCJ is evacuating three secure facilities and a portion of a fourth facility, and three residential facilities in the Beaumont and Jasper areas.

The evacuation of the Leblanc, Gist, Goodman, and part of the Stiles units will include approximately 3,400 offenders. Offenders are being relocated to units in Huntsville, Woodville, Lovelady and Henderson. The evacuation of the residential facilities will include approximately 200 clients, who are being relocated to a secure facility in Richmond.

District parole offices have identified high risk parolees in the area and are making arrangements to move those individuals to secure facilities out of the path of the storms, in the event a mandatory evacuation order is issued. Local community supervision (probation) offices and facilities in the areas of projected impact have been contacted and are receiving assistance in the placement of probationers who need housing.

All units located in the area of projected impact as well as those receiving evacuated offenders have staffing, supplies, and sufficient space to maintain operations while continuing with the agency's COVID-19 mitigation efforts. Food, water, ice, personal protective equipment, and essentials are being monitored continuously and will be replenished as needed. Offenders being transported will be provided an N95 mask and Vital Oxide foggers will be used to disinfect buses in between transports to mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

The agency will continue to operate a 24-hour command center at the Huntsville headquarters and will provide periodic updates.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): DPS Aviation has rostered 15 personnel and staged two helicopters with hoist capabilities in Houston, and one fixed wing asset in Houston prepared to respond. THP Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has three boat teams and has rostered and staged 12 flood recovery boats in Weslaco and Hampshire to assist with water rescues. There are seven Dive Recovery Teams staged across Texas for any emergency response. THP Region 2 has 456 Troopers throughout the region prepared to respond to impacted areas. THP is currently providing staffing at the SOC in support of Hurricane Laura.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):

Health and Medical Actions started Monday evening August 24:

- Preparing to activate medical shelter at Freeman Coliseum in San Antonio (280 patients, decision on August 24)
- Assets in place, staff on standby in San Antonio
- Preparing to activate medical shelter at Austin Convention Center (50 patients, decision on August 24)
- Assets moving on order August 24
- Staff rostered and started deploying Sunday night (August 23) to be ready for mission assignment
- EMTF rostering all available resources and sending to staging at Ford Park (Ambulance, AMBUS, MIST)
- Assessing hospital plans for evacuation in SE Texas (Port Arthur, Beaumont & Galveston)
- Currently only one hospital Port Arthur evacuating COVID vent patients to Houston. Plan is to utilize local air ambulance assets. EMTF air assets are being identified if needed.
- Working with HHSC to determine medical transportation assets required for nursing home evacuations
- Alerting O2 contractors for potential support to medical shelters, general population shelters and medical transportation staging

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF): The EMTF has activated and staged emergency medical response resources in San Antonio, Ford Park and La Marque.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD currently has activated up to 303 personnel, 40 HPVs and four Aircraft in support of the August Tropical Weather Response. TMD deployed contingency forces to protect life and property. TMD is supporting TX-TF1 with search, rescue and other missions.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD has rostered and prepared department resources consisting of Texas Game Wardens and State Parks Police Officers equipped with swift water boats, shallow water boats, and a rescue helicopter with swimmer to support boat rescue operations in areas affected by Hurricane Marco and Tropical Storm Laura.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): TxDOT is standing by to help with any requests. Crews are prepared to respond to any highway condition related issues. Seven miles of water barrier have been pre-staged along the coastal districts for post incident deployment. Austin, Brownwood, Dallas, Laredo, San Antonio, Tyler and Waco Districts have been put on notice for a possible response, which would bring an additional 120 employees for incident

response. TxDOT is currently working through M-Sat checks agency-wide, and is checking IRAT plans to prepare for possible crew assignments.

Federal Communication Commission (FCC) The FCC has activated their EOC, with particular interest in the status of Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) in the path of either tropical system.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster (VOADs):

The Salvation Army: TSA has been in communication with all affected field units and placed several feeding units on standby for staging. Coordination calls with local, state, and federal partners to include VOAD partner agencies have commenced. All teams will be adhering to safety protocols put into place due to COVID19, wearing PPE and social distancing where applicable. The Salvation Army State Operations Center Liaison will be supporting virtually. Ten mobile feeding units (capacity: 1,500 meals per day per feeding unit) in Texas and an IMT have been placed on standby for staging. Meals are being delivered to the Ford Park RSA for first responders. The Salvation Army assigned four boats and two high profile vehicles.


