STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: The State of Texas continues to assist Louisiana with sheltering and basic needs, while volunteer organizations active in disaster (VOADs) continue providing recovery assistance to Texas residents who were also affected by Hurricane Laura.

On September 30, Governor Abbott sent a letter to President Donald Trump requesting a major disaster declaration for Ten Texas Counties to assist in recovery efforts following Hurricane Laura. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) previously granted the state's request for a Federal Emergency Declaration ahead of Hurricane Laura's landfall in Texas.

In his letter, the Governor specifically requested Individual Assistance for individuals and households, crisis counseling, disaster unemployment assistance, disaster case management, disaster legal services, and Small Business Administration (SBA) disaster assistance. The Governor also requested Public Assistance for Debris Removal (Category A), Emergency Protective Measures (Category B), Permanent Work (Categories C-G), and Direct Federal Assistance for the counties of Brazoria, Chambers, Galveston, Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Newton, Orange, Sabine, and Shelby. The Governor also requested the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program statewide.

On September 22, Governor Abbott renewed the disaster declaration for Hurricane Laura.

On September 15, Governor Abbott announced that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) has received federal approval to automatically provide replacement benefit's for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients for food lost or destroyed due to Hurricane Laura in eight of the impacted counties: Hardin, Jefferson, Newton, Orange, Sabine, San Augustine, Shelby and Tyler. Those eight counties met federal criteria for mass replacements of benefits based on the severity of storm impacts in their area.

FEMA has approved the emergency declaration for the State of Texas (FEMA-3540-EM) for the counties of Anderson, Angelina, Aransas, Bexar, Bowie, Brazoria, Calhoun, Cameron, Camp, Cass, Chambers, Cherokee, Dallas, Ellis, Fort Bend, Franklin, Galveston, Gregg, Grimes, Hardin, Harris, Harrison, Houston, Jackson, Jasper, Jefferson, Kenedy, Kleberg, Leon, Liberty, Madison, Marion, Matagorda, Montgomery, Morris, Nacogdoches, Newton, Nueces, Orange, Panola, Polk, Red River, Refugio, Rusk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, San Patricio, Shelby, Smith, Tarrant, Titus, Travis, Trinity, Tyler, Upshur, Victoria, Walker, Waller, Wharton, Willacy and Wood for reimbursement for eligible emergency protective measures (Category B), limited to direct Federal assistance and reimbursement for mass care including evacuation and shelter support.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Recovery
2. Sheltering and Mass Care
3. Accurate Damage assessments
4. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
5. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS:

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM): The Daily Operations staff continues to process disaster declarations, letters to the Governor, Disaster Summary Outlines, State of Texas Assistance Requests (STARs), preparing Snapshots and the State SITREP. The State Management Team (SMT) continues conducting operations in the alternate State Operations Center, working together with activated members of the State’s Emergency Management Council. TDEM District Coordinators are working closely with their local emergency management partners to assist with any unmet needs and resources.

TDEM Mass Care / Disaster Recovery Task Force: TDEM Mass Care continues to coordinate the state-supported non-congregate shelters for evacuees throughout the state. TDEM is working with the state of Louisiana on the repopulation of their residents.

As of October 12, there are 2,238 (+270) evacuees in 2 non-congregate shelters throughout the State in 791 (-23) hotel rooms.

The process of consolidation from 5 shelters into 2 started Saturday, October 10 and concluded Monday, October 12. All eligible Hurricane Laura evacuees with major/destroyed damages and households with unknown determinations consolidated into the Hilton Anatole. Hurricane Laura evacuees with no damage, minor damage and affected damage transferred to the Crown Plaza until a return date to Louisiana is established.

Louisiana proposed a 2-phase repopulation plan:

- Phase 1 – Evacuees with Major/Destroyed Properties – Receive notification on October 14 of an October 16 transition back to Louisiana shelter.

- Phase 2 – Evacuees with Affected/Minor Properties – Receive notification on October 16 of an October 19 transition back to Louisiana shelter.

HUD reports contact with 95% of identified households. Outreach remaining for 34 households. Two staff members will be available to support shelter re-registration.

DRTF Shelter team planned the logistics to meet with all evacuees assigned to their new relocation at the Anatole or Crowne Plaza in Dallas, Tuesday, October 13, 2020.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ): TCEQ staff are conducting weekly inspections on twelve authorized Temporary Debris Management Sites (TDMS) in Newton, Orange, Sabine, and Jasper Counties.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster (VOADs):

Supporting Organizations: Trusted World, Catholic Charities, Dallas County VOAD, Tarrant County VOAD, Collin County VOAD, Denton County VOAD, Central Texas VOAD, McCares Montgomery County, Lions Club International. Crisis Response Ministries, St. Vincent DePaul, Salvation Army, North Texas Food Bank, Central Texas Conference UMC, North Texas Conference UMC, Children’s Disaster Services, United Way Houston, Austin Disaster Relief Network

Local, State and National mission-driven organizations, to include VOAD member agencies are working in coordination to support the ongoing sheltering efforts and identified evacuee unmet needs in Region 1. Assistance to include: clothing, hygiene and comfort kits, baby items, personal items, emotional and spiritual care, transition support

Texas and Louisiana VOAD calls are on hold until post Hurricane Delta landfall. Organizations are on stand-by and ready to respond as needed.

American Red Cross (ARC): American Red Cross has staffing and supplies for two congregate shelters on stand-by to support local jurisdictions for evacuees seeking shelter from Hurricane Delta. Although they ARC has received calls from evacuees seeking shelter, no one has arrived at the facility they were directed to. American Red Cross will be updating their Social Media sites to provide information transition instructions for evacuees headed back to Louisiana.

On October 10; ARC’s total outreach included; 294 contacts, 74 identified plans, and 116 households transitioned out.
